

Board of Selectmen Meeting Summaries

December 29, 2014 By Doane Perry

Chief of Police Update

Chief Tom Rubino reported that he attended the police funeral in New York City. He also updated the selectmen about police activities. The biggest issue for the police has been responding to scams. There have been three complaints. They advise citizens not to give out information, and say, "If you didn't call them, you don't need them."

Chief Rubino also reported on two new police officers, who he said have adapted well to the town; the acquisition of two bulletproof vests; and the installation of IMC public safety software to share information with surrounding towns. The system is efficient, secure, and auditable, and it provides reports and links across the state and country, enabling the sheriff's office to provide assistance if needed.

The chief thanked the town for improvements to the police parking lot and lighting. He also informed the selectmen about issues he hopes to bring to the town meeting for a vote:

- A new cruiser. The cruiser will be four years old in July 2015. A new one costs \$38,000. SUVs are more practical than sedans.
- An additional police officer. There are currently two full-time officers and six part-time officers. Selectman Karen Zick said more activity in the town will justify an additional officer. Mark Webber said he would help the chief prepare a town meeting article for a vote. A new officer could start in July 2015.

Chief Rubino also asked for assistance in getting a responder on the Route 41 cell tower to bridge the gaps in radio reception along Route 41.

Litigation Pending on Trailer Park

Notice of appeal was received from Kraus/Hummel, attorneys for the Mill Pond trailer park owner. Selectmen will meet in executive session on January 12 to discuss pending litigation. Town counsel Pat Cantor will attend. The appeal will be heard in Superior Court on January 14. Speaking for the tenants, Evie Kerswell asked the selectmen to request that the case be moved to Housing Court because it is more familiar with the issue.

Other Business:

 The tax rate was approved December 22. Bills were mailed on December 29. Mark Webber said the increase is entirely attributable to the cost of the schools.

- Peter Skorput said he would fill the position of Berkshire Regional Planning Commission alternate.
- The selectmen approved a motion to extend the contract with RRG assessing services. Mark Webber commented that RRG has done a great job for four or five years. They have provided better and more professional service because they don't know anyone in town. The cost is \$23,000 to \$24,000. The town has appropriated \$38,000. RRG's proposal was the only one the town received.
- Dominic Lucci, the town custodian, submitted a handwritten complaint about the bulletin board in the fire station and asked that Selectman Peter Skorput be fired.
- The selectmen approved a request by the Artists' Guild to use the Town Offices Community Room.

Executive Session

Prior to the open meeting, the selectmen met in executive session to discuss the upcoming (January 14) RCB appeal in Superior Court.

FY 2016 Budget Process

Mark Webber gave the selectmen a standard budget request for FY '16 for their review. He also gave them a timeline he described as "fluid."

MA Department of Transportation Solar Project

The MA DOT will attend the January 26 meeting to review a solar project that will have installations on the turnpike from West Stockbridge to Stockbridge. It will be funded entirely with state funds. The power generated by their current solar project is all sold to the state, but it is possible that some could now go to others.

Repairs Needed

The Police Station door and the Village School furnace both need attention. Mark Webber will get more specifics on what needs to be done. The school furnace circulators on one of the two boilers

Fresh Air Fund Seeks Host Families

Gabrielle Murphy of West Stockbridge learned about the Fresh Air Fund from reading an insert in the *New York Times* many years ago. She was reminded of the fund, however, by a sign that neighbors placed on their lawn, telling the world that they were a host family. This past summer, Gabrielle and her husband David Edgecomb decided that hosting a New York City child would be a perfect addition to their summer, so they signed up for the Fresh Air Fund's Volunteer Host Family Program.

The Fresh Air Fund, an independent not-for-profit agency, has provided free summer experiences to more than 1.8 million New York City children from low-income neighborhoods since 1877. Each summer, close to 4,000 inner-city children visit suburban, rural, and small town communities across 13 states from Virginia to Maine and Canada through the Fresh Air Fund's Volunteer Host Family Program.

With Gabrielle and David's help, 9-year-old Alexander of Manhattan experienced a summer like never before. Alexander, or AJ, spent most of his 10-day stay swimming and building sand castles. The three of them had such a great time during the summer that they vowed to spend more time with one another during the year. Recently, AJ was reinvited to Gabrielle and David's house during the winter break, where they built a gingerbread house and visited the Berkshire Museum

When asked about the Volunteer Host Family Program, Gabrielle said, "It is a fabulous and rewarding experience that will broaden your horizon and teach you as much about yourself as it will about

the child you host." Although Gabrielle and David don't have children living in the house with them, the Fresh Air Fund's Volunteer Host Family Program is designed for any family with an open heart and an extra bed. They hope to maintain a strong relationship with AJ and his family for many years to come.



Broadband Fiber Network Is Moving Forward

WiredWest and the Massachusetts Broadband Institute (MBI) are building a fiber network to bring high-speed Internet and much more to people in small towns in western Massachusetts. The state is providing \$40 million to partially fund the project. For a town to qualify as a "fiber town" and be included in the network, 40% of its households must sign up for service with a small refundable deposit, and the town meeting must authorize its share of the funding.

I hope you have received the WiredWest sign-up letter in the mail. It includes information on packages, pricing, and how to sign up online or by mail. WiredWest will be offering Internet, phone, and high-definition TV with a DVR option to every residence, even those not currently served. Internet speeds will start at 25 mbps, with higher speeds available up to 1 gbps. For comparison, my satellite Internet speed is only 1–1.5 mbps. At 25 mbps, you will be able to do online streaming without buffering and download HD movies from sites such as Netflix. The goal is to get at least 40% of the households signed up by the end of March. Towns with higher sign-up rates will be preferentially built out first for broadband service. WiredWest is the municipal cooperative made up of 36 member towns, including West Stockbridge, to build and operate a regional fiber network. The resolution letter has been passed by 34 of the member towns' board of selectmen to be part of MBI's detailed engineering study to refine the project cost estimate of running fiber to every home and upgrading poles where necessary. Construction of the fiber network would then start on qualified "fiber towns" with pole make-ready work beginning in 2015 and running fiber in 2016. Service to customers would begin in the spring of 2017 as network segments are completed.



Sharon's February exhibit features vistas of West Stockbridge. The show consists of reproductions of hand-tinted Polaroid manipulations.

Polaroid manipulations are photos taken with an "antique" Polaroid camera and special film that is no longer manufactured. While still warm and before setting, the chemicals are manipulated by hand to give a painted look. Once out of the camera it takes the chemicals approximately 15 minutes to set.

After enlarging and reproducing onto acid-free photo paper or printing giclées on high-quality archival watercolor paper, they are hand tinted using watercolor and oil pastels. No two photos ever end up looking the same.

Recycling Tip February Disposing of Scrap Steel


Used cookware—frying pans, saucepans, cookie sheets, tea kettles, and so on-must go in the open scrap steel container located to right of the trash compactor. These items should not be put in the recycling container for cans and bottles. When disposing of anything in the scrap steel container, please be very cautious. There is a gap between the container and the cement blocks in front of it. Please stand on the ground, not on the cement blocks, if possible.

West Stockbridge History Quiz Answer:

The brick building next to the Public Market might be one of the earliest buildings in the town center. It dates to sometime before 1847, with its original owner none other than Benjamin Cone (1797–1866). He had major land holdings (think Cone Hill Road) in Richmond. He also was a major property owner in the town with over 34 parcels.

The first recorded deed for the property was dated 1847 when Cone sold his property to Caleb Snow, another major landholder in town. The deed describes the building as a "certain brick shop." We don't have business directories for that period, and Cone is listed as a farmer in the census, so there is no indication what kind of shop was originally there.



The building is shown on the later maps of 1855, 1858, and 1878. On the 1904 map, the building is labeled as "J. Keresey," identified in the 1900 census as John Keresey (older brother of Joseph, a prominent local farmer). John was listed as a "day laborer," so the building was likely a residence and not a shop.

The accompanying 1974 photograph shows the building in its original shape with a sign for the Baldassare barbershop on the building. The family also lived there. The building assumed its current form in the 1980s when Gordon Rose altered the roofline and installed the bay window in the front. It is now a private residence.

Recipe Corner

Polenta Fries

Serves 6-8

Basic Aioli

½ cup mayonnaise 2 garlic cloves, minced 1 Tbsp. fresh lemon juice salt and pepper to taste

Place all the ingredients in a bowl and whisk until blended. Set aside.

½ cup marinara sauce (store bought or your own homemade)

Polenta Fries

4 cups low-fat milk

1½ cups coarse-ground yellow cornmeal

2 Tbsp. unsalted butter, softened

2½ ounces goat cheese


1 tsp. salt

½ tsp. pepper

3 Tbsp. vegetable oil or light olive oil

Pour the milk into a medium saucepan, place over medium heat, and simmer. Slowly whisk in the cornmeal until fully incorporated, lower heat, and continue to stir for about 5 minutes. Fold in the butter and goat cheese and season with salt and pepper. Stir until no lumps remain. Pour into a lightly greased rimmed 9×13 -inch baking sheet. Evenly spread and allow mixture to cool for about 20 minutes before placing in the refrigerator. Refrigerate for about an hour.

Remove the polenta from the fridge and invert onto a clean cutting board. Cut polenta into $\frac{1}{2} \times 3$ -inch sticks. Place a large skillet over medium-high heat and add oil. Lightly fry polenta sticks for 2 to 3 minutes on each side, in batches, making sure not to overcrowd the pan. Place the finished sticks on paper towels and season with salt and pepper. Serve the fries with your choice of aioli and/or marinara sauce. Enjoy!

Collector's Note

FY 2015 motor vehicle excise bills, along with a few end-of-the-year FY 2014 bills, will be going out by February 17 and be due on March 17. If you turned in the registration on a particular vehicle *prior to January 1, 2015*, please complete the back side of the bill and send it along with the required documentation to the Assessors' office immediately. If you disposed of a vehicle and either transferred the registration or turned the plates in to the Registry of Motor Vehicles *after January 1, 2015*, you should still pay the bill. Having done so, you may then apply for an abatement. Excise bills not paid in a timely fashion can incur up to \$69 in fines and interest per vehicle and result in loss of the right to register or reregister and/or renew a license.


Please be sure to clearly note the parcel ID and/or local street address on all payments not accompanied by a stub. This is especially crucial for real estate and personal property bills that are in many cases issued to someone other than the person who signs the check or when the bill is paid through a bill payment service. I recently received a check through such a service from Sam Smith (I'm changing the name to protect the guilty!) whose bill was sent to John Jones for a property owned by XYZ Corp. Mr. Smith was *not* in my system. He had an out-of-town address, and his check memo was PAYMENT! It took a 20-minute manual search through 1,500 unpaid bills to match the "amount" on his check to an account. In the future, such checks will be returned to the sender.

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

The committee is currently working on developing a plan to ensure that the 2015 lights are installed without a problem!



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


