## **Board of Selectmen Meeting Summaries**

July 20, 2015

### **Downtown Paving Project**

Curt Wilton reported that he is not happy with the paving contractor that had a paver breakdown and left the work site. Curt is meeting with the VP of the company on July 21. The contractor also failed to inform the Police Department in a timely manner about his need for detail officers, who are in scarce supply. Curt said the contractor asked for five officers with only 12 hours of overnight notice, which is unreasonable.

Because paving has to be done during the summer, Curt asked for patience, noting 5,000 vehicles per day use Main Street. The process involves grinding the surface to level and raising all structures such as drains. After paving, there will be temporary yellow marks for parking prior to the permanent lines being painted. No impact on the Farmers Market is anticipated.

#### **Downtown Improvement Project**

Mark Webber reported that the improvement project is completed except for two items at the 1854 Town Hall: a cutback for the historically quarried marble and adjusting the depth of the spaces in front from 18 to 12 inches. Mark commented that contractor Caracas has been cooperative and easy to work with. Curt Wilton added that another item coming soon is the Baldwin Hardware parking lot.

#### **Parks and Recreation Department**

Roland Dudney discussed plans for repairing and maintaining the tennis court and basketball court. Mark Webber said the department has money for capital improvements that require seeking three competitive bids. Parks and Recreation will solicit bids in collaboration with Curt Wilton. The plan is to fix the cracks ASAP and the Highway Department to cut the shrubbery.

A party at Card Pond, canceled due to weather, has been rescheduled for September 13.

#### **Farmers Market**

The town's public restrooms continue to present a problem for the Farmers Market, which receives visitor complaints. Because there are issues with both supplies and maintenance, it was proposed the town handle stocking supplies and the Farmers Market maintain the restrooms, providing accountability and shared responsibility. Curt Wilton will buy and install more single-roll dispensers that are standard in town.

#### Rouge Liquor License

Mark Webber reported that the amended liquor license for Rouge Restaurant & Bistro was approved on July 14 in record time. The license was revised for the remainder of this year and can be renewed annually.

#### **Other Business:**

- The selectmen approved the Josh Billings race using the same route through town as before. The race will be on September 20.
- The selectmen appointed Phillip Gorth as alternate representative to WiredWest.
- The town continues to be in negotiation with Charter Cable about renewal of the license, which expired a year ago. The town is in compliance as long as negotiations are underway.
- Curt Wilton proposed that the pay rate for the town custodian be raised from \$16 to \$18 per hour.
- The selectmen and the Board of Health are in communication about hiring a new Transfer Station attendant.
- Mark Webber said that web manager Bill Biggs is planning to post request forms for use of town facilities on the town website.
- The next Board of Selectmen meeting is July 27.

## **Collector's Notes**

Two questions have crossed my desk since the last issue.

The first question involves how water/sewer bills are calculated. The bill is computed in two parts. First is a flat rate of \$35 per billing period for water; then \$0.036 per cubic foot of metered water is added. (A hike to \$0.039 was approved by the Water/Sewer Board and will be implemented soon.) The second sewer portion consists of a flat rate of \$25 plus \$0.06 per cubic foot of metered water.

As an example, if you currently have water and sewer service and used 1,200 cu ft, the water portion of your bill will be  $\$35 + 0.036 \times 1,200 = \$78.20$ . The sewer portion will be  $\$25 + 0.06 \times 1,200 = \$97.00$  for a total bill of \$175.20.

Please note that the last bill you received recorded usage for a four-month rather than the normal three-month billing cycle because of delays in reading the new electronically scanned meters. The next cycle will cover a two-month period.

The second question involves several bills that failed to make their way to their destination. Quarterly bills are mailed at least 30 days *prior* to their due dates: by June 30, September 30, December 31, and March 30. They typically are due on August 1, November 1, February 1, and May 1.

As your collector, I am legally bound to mail bills by the dates just listed and must file a notarized affidavit to that effect. Massachusetts law states that taxpayers are to expect delivery shortly thereafter. Should you not receive your copy, you are still bound to the due dates and should contact my office to determine the amount due. The law does not waive late charges for mailing snafus or your failure to notify the assessors' office of an address change.

Whether or not you use the Unibank online bill payment service available on the town's website (www.weststockbridge-ma.gov) to make your payment, you can still go there and find the amount of your bill simply by using the name on your account if you do not receive your bill.



## July 27, 2015

#### **Massachusetts Broadband Institute**

Director of MBI Eric Nakajima described the work ahead to bring fiberoptic communications to the town. He summarized the timeline: a year ago the legislature authorized up to \$50 million, and in February 2015 Governor Baker put \$19 million into the FY2016 plan that enables MBI to get to work. Eric said the work begins with issuing requests for proposals for a pole survey.

Selectman Earl Moffatt asked which poles. Eric said surveying poles will be batched by area and will be a physical survey of mountings on 3,000 poles in West Stockbridge. Next there will be a network design process over six to nine months. Earl asked if there are any holdups on the \$50 million. Eric answered no and said the funds are flowing and MBI is invoicing the money. Eric said there are many co-owned poles—by National Grid, Verizon, and Eversource Energy. Selectman Curt Wilton urged Eric to produce rapid results.

### **Charter Cable**

Carol Kuller asked the selectmen for support for sending an e-mail to Charter. Mark Webber approved sending it as is. Earl said a written correspondence is important even though the town is getting nowhere with Charter. Carol said Charter runs a sloppy process and does not use information provided by the town. There have been five or six drafts of the town's license with Charter. Curt thanked Carol for her work.

#### **Downtown Projects Update**

Curt Wilton said two items are still ahead in the sidewalk project: the railings in front of the 1854 Town Hall and the fence around the Baldwin Hardware parking lot.

Curt said he is frustrated with the slow work by the contractor in the paving project. He said leveling of drains, manholes, and catch basins has been done.

Paula Farrell asked about the curb at the beginning of Swamp Road that is causing flat tires and pushing trucks into traffic. Earl said the curb is in the same place as its predecessor but is bigger and higher. There is a 10,000-pound weight limit on Swamp Road.

Regarding the Cobb Road bridge work on Route 41 south, Curt said there have been detours while the bridge is shored up for safety's sake. Although bridge construction has not started yet, completion is still projected in September 2016.

#### **Town Custodian**

The selectmen discussed how to bring up concerns regarding the town custodian's tasks. In particular, the issue is whether to contact Custodian Dominic Luchi directly or his employer, the Board of Selectmen and their assistant Mark Webber. Dominic said there is too much indirect telephoning and urged that he be contacted directly.

Curt said Dominic is the town's first Building and Grounds Superintendent and should be contacted directly. Curt commented that he has succeeded in raising the pay for Highway Department employees and wants to do the same for the custodian, who has not had a pay raise.

#### Net Metering

Net metering means using solar power generated from Cheshire that will save the town \$12,000 per year. Town counsel says a town meeting is required for adoption. Curt asked about any risk. [Mark recommended a solution in a later meeting on August 10.]

## **Transfer Station Attendant Update**

The selectmen favor a full-time attendant because there is more responsibility. Full time means over 19 hours per week, \$18,000 in benefits, and a \$18,000 to \$21,000 annual salary. The selectmen hire the attendant, and the Board of Health supervises.

## August 10, 2015

#### Parks and Recreation Update

Ginna Dudney brought the issue of maintenance of the tennis and basketball courts to the Board of Selectmen. After discussion, the selectmen decided to repair the tennis court this year and the basketball court next year. They unanimously voted to appropriate \$8,261 to pay Piretti Repair and Resurfacing for the tennis court work.

Mary Thibeault reported the good news that the TV show *Living Well* with *Carmel* will film an episode at the Farmers Market on August 20.

### **Artist and Merchant Festival October 3 Presentation**

President of the Richmond-West Stockbridge Artists' Guild Howard Greenhalgh presented a plan for an artists' and merchants' festival on Saturday, October 3, 2015, from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. After mentioning the guild's art shows and describing the festival plan, he asked for input from the selectmen on banners, tents, and road signs. Selectman Peter Skorput said the buildings on Main Street are not high enough for a banner. Curt Wilton said traffic control is not necessary, but Howard





should inform the police by sending them the fact sheet. Earl Moffatt and Peter said the project sounded good, and Curt asked for ongoing communication. They said no permits are necessary, but asked to be notified about signage. They noted that the parking lot next to the 1854 Town Hall is privately owned. The Farmers Market organizers offered their four tents for use by the festival.

#### **Shaker Mill Dam Report**

Curt described the Office of Dam Safety report on the inspection of the dam. He said maintenance is needed on slippery elms growing along the riverbanks, on sinkholes, and on the retaining wall downstream on the east side of the river that is pulling away and will be filled in.

### **Net Metering Presentation on August 24**

Mark Webber advised the selectmen on how to best take advantage of the offer that will save the town \$10,000 per year: make a one-year agreement by executive action as permitted and a twenty-year agreement by special town meeting as required. The Board of Selectmen will consider further in meetings on August 17 and 31. Mark said the program has a proven track record and is based on a generating facility in Cheshire.

### **Transfer Station Update**

The selectmen decided to add two hours of operation to the Transfer Station on Saturdays. The new hours will be 10 to 6 on Tuesday and Thursday and 8 to 6 on Saturday. The selectmen discussed adding hours on Sundays but decided against the option due to the cost of snowplowing and because users may just leave trash outside the gate if they get the hours wrong. Mark commented that many of the several hundred second homeowners have private contractors. Peter commented that the West Stockbridge transfer station is very generous compared to other towns where users pay fees. Mark said the recycling program makes \$85,000 annually that covers the cost of transporting the trash away from West Stockbridge. The selectmen agreed unanimously that one full-time attendant will be hired. The selectmen decided to use an executive session on August 17 to evaluate the seven candidates so as to recommend just two. The new schedule of operation will begin when the new attendant is hired.

### **Administrative Assistant Vacation**

Mark Webber will be on vacation from September 6 to 18.

### Bike Ride Fund-Raiser Rest Stop

The selectmen approved use of the parking lot and the portable toilets at the new Town Offices on September 7 for 25 people.

### Mill Pond Trailer Park Update

The situation at the Mill Pond Trailer Park is unclear according to Evie Kerswell who spoke for the tenants. There is a July 29 sale agreement between the current owners, the Gennaris, and the previous owner Eric Levesque. The tenants are not interested at the current price. It may be that the Gennaris get the park and Eric gets the money. But there are outstanding appeals. Earl Moffatt commented that nothing is going to happen overnight.

Evie said, "The water and sewer systems in the park can fail at any time leaving 35 homes without these services." Eric has stopped negotiating with ROC USA that represents the tenants. Earl asked Mark Webber if the town has any leverage. Mark said he has informed the town counsel that the town is owed money.

## **Downtown Projects Update**

Selectman and Highway Chief Curt Wilton said he is satisfied with the paving job. The line painting will be done as an overnight procedure. Curt said that Caracas still has a few things to do on the sidewalks. Mark said the selectmen and the Planning Board will meet to discuss planning,

parking, and zoning matters including 15-minute parking signs. Karen Carmean asked if there isn't room for more parking by the Shaker Barn, but Earl Moffatt said there is not.

#### The 3 Cross Road Property Disposition

There are no takers for the 0.99 acre plot that has no house, two abutters, and an assessed value of \$87,000. The selectmen established a minimum bid of \$10,000.

#### **Other Business**

The selectmen approved use of the Community Room by the Artists' Guild for two critiques on Wednesdays and one meeting on a Wednesday. There was discussion of a conflict with the Friends of the Library for the selectmen's room.

The Artists' Guild received permission for signs for the September show on the day of the show that will take place over six days in Richmond.

## August 17, 2015

**Kirt Mayland to Discuss Solar Net Metering Project and Agreement** The meeting was postponed until August 31.

#### **Lenox Road Paving**

Curt announced that the town will pave the final unpaved segment of Lenox Road this fall. The portion of Lenox Road to be paved extends 6,200 feet from the end of the sewer to Deer Hill Road. The job will require 1,700 tons of 2-inch overlay paving and will cost \$137,000. Some repairs to culverts will be done. Bids from contractors will be opened on September 14. Funding for the paving comes from the Commonwealth of Massachusetts under Chapter 90. Curt said that Lenox Road has become a busy road.






# West Stockbridge Cultural Council Invites Grant Proposals for 2016




## September History Quiz Question:

## West Stockbridge Rocks! Fine Art Sale and Artists and Merchants Festival

The Richmond-West Stockbridge Artists' Guild is having a Fall Fine Art Show and Sale at the Historic 1854 West Stockbridge Town Hall, 9 Main Street, from Thursday, October 1, through Sunday, October 4, and from Thursday, October 8, through Monday, October 12 (Columbus Day Weekend).

It is free and open to the public.

In connection with the show, a West Stockbridge Rocks! Festival of Artists and Merchants is planned for Saturday, October 3, from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Carolyn Kay Brancato, the guild's secretary, said, "The festival is based on the theme of 'rocks' because West Stockbridge marble from the quarry enabled the town to flourish as it was shipped by train and used to build many historic buildings in Boston as well as throughout Massachusetts." The Artists' Guild is coordinating with the West Stockbridge Historical Society and the Merchants Association as well as individual merchants to create a town-wide event to celebrate West Stockbridge's historic heritage and allow visitors to enjoy the town's visual and culinary arts.

Visitors will come to the 1854 Town Hall to get badges and maps showing all the participating merchants. Banners and signs will herald the event. Prizes for visiting all the merchants on the map will be handed out at a drawing to be held during the reception on Saturday, October 3, from 5 to 7 p.m. Organizers hope this event will engage families and lead them to discover historical as well as scenic October fall leaf overlooks.

Guild president Howard Greenhalgh told the *Local Yokel*, "We hope that the West Stockbridge Rocks! Festival and the Guild Show will bring people from the broader Massachusetts, New York, Connecticut, and Vermont areas into the town to enjoy its richness and beauty, attend our art show, and wander throughout the historic town to visit the unique merchants and galleries."

About the Artists' Guild: The guild encourages the work of fine artists to educate its members and the public about how art can contribute to the quality of life in the Berkshires. Over 50 members work in a wide range of visual media including painting, sculpture, photography, film, pottery, textiles, wood, stained glass, and mixed media. Guild members have frequent "meet the artist" luncheons and hold workshops in drawing and painting in various members' studios and outdoors. Board member Karen Carmean noted, "You may see our artists painting in West Stockbridge, at The Mount, at the Hancock Shaker Village, and at scenic Richmond Land Trust locations throughout the area."

## Parks & Recreation Improvements for You


The West Stockbridge Board of Selectmen has signed off on tennis court resurfacing to be done this fall. A new net will be installed in the spring.







## Recipe Corner

# Crispy Eggplant, Tomato, and Provolone Stacks with Basil

**Yield: About 5 servings** 

We can't get enough of those wonderful ripe tomatoes right now along with the fresh out-of-the-garden eggplants and basil, so here's a recipe that's *amazing*!

½ cup all-purpose flour

1 tsp. salt

½ tsp. fresh ground pepper

2 large eggs, beaten

2 Tbsp. cold water

2½ cups of panko (Japanese breadcrumbs)

½ cup finely grated parmesan cheese

2 tsp. dried Italian seasoning

1 cup loosely packed fresh basil leaves

1 tsp. lemon zest

1/4-1/2 tsp. fresh garlic, minced

2 large eggplants cut into 20 (½-inch-thick)

slices

Vegetable oil

Parchment paper

10 provolone cheese slices

10 tomato slices

Preheat the oven to 400°F. Stir together the flour and salt and pepper in a medium bowl. Whisk together the eggs and cold water in a second bowl. Stir together the panko and parmesan, Italian seasoning, basil, lemon zest, and minced garlic in a third bowl.

Dredge each eggplant slice in the flour mixture, then dip in the egg mixture and dredge in the panko mixture.

Pour the oil <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of an inch deep in a large skillet. Fry the eggplant slices, in two or three batches, in hot oil over medium-high heat 2–3 minutes on each side or until browned. Drain on a wire rack over paper towels or another pan.

Place 10 eggplant slices in a single layer on a baking sheet lined with parchment paper. Top each one with a slice of provolone cheese.

Bake for 3–5 minutes or until the cheese is melted. Top each stack with a tomato slice and one basil leaf. Add desired amount of salt and pepper, and finish with the remaining eggplant slices.

Note: I like them as is, but you can add cooked bacon or prosciutto just before baking for a more savory flavor. EAT, EAT those yummy tomatoes while they last, and ENJOY!

## West Stockbridge History Quiz Answer:

In the early 1800s, photography was in its infancy. There were no cell phone pictures, selfies, or family snapshots. Formal portrait paintings were the only way the affluent could retain a memory of the family. To fulfill that need, many itinerant folk artists traveled around painting the father and mother and possibly a child or two for those who could afford it.

One of the most prolific and important folk artists was Ammi Phillips (1785–1865). Born in northeast Connecticut, he lived in Duchess County and died in Interlaken. During his career, he painted portraits on both sides of the New York/Massachusetts border (including West Stockbridge). Phillips was one of the most significant American folk artists, with pieces in the Metropolitan Museum of Art, Museum of American Folk Art, and the Berkshire Museum. His portraits regularly sell at auction for over \$100,000, and his *Girl in a Red Dress* sold for \$1.2 million.





The West Stockbridge connection was


the Barnes family of Williamsville. This family dates back to 1777 when Timothy Barnes bought one of the first lots from James Kusk from the Mohican tribe.

Timothy and his descendants were major settlers in the Williamsville and Pixley Hill areas, with multiple homes and industrial enterprises. Barnes family members lived in Williamsville up to the 20th century.

Timothy's descendants, Elisha and Seth, and Seth's wife, Caroline, were painted by Phillips. They were obviously more affluent than others in the neighborhood to be able to afford a portrait. Elisha's portrait is in the Berkshire Museum; Seth and Caroline are in a private collection. (Other portraits of the Barnes family are in the Stockbridge Library collection, but they cannot be attributed to Phillips.) There is no recent appraisal of their worth, but they could certainly be in the big-dollar range. At this time, we know of no other Ammi Phillips's painting of West Stockbridge folk.


