

Flourish Market

Jennifer Knopf has opened Flourish Market on the banks of the Shaker Mill Pond at 2 Albany Road, next to SoMa and across the street from Troy's Garage. Parking is right next to the side entrance. Flourish Market takes vintage and not-so-vintage furniture and lamps and revitalizes them. There are new items for the home and other gifts such as jewelry (a friend bought a handsome pair of earrings for \$10 when I took her there). Flourish is a wonderful shop, very comfortable to be in, with Jennifer's workshop and tools at the center of the space. I recommend a visit to both Flourish and SoMa, followed by a stroll along the pond and Troy's old car and tractor display.

Previously fundraising events coordinator at the Lenox Library (where she did a great job organizing the library's 200th anniversary celebration), Jennifer also served as treasurer of the Muddy Brook PTA for three years and as a planner of school events such as the Winter Wonderland, Spring Family Dance, and Mud Day.

Jennifer said she has collected items her whole life and decided to open a retail store that also serves as her workspace. She describes her new business as "an upcycled and vintage home furnishings store." The eclectic store contains vintage tables, cabinets, ceramics, and upcycled lamps. You can also find new items such as jewelry, tote bags, wall hooks, and wire baskets. "I like the collected look, something

old and rusty paired next to something shiny and brassy; it's about telling your story—where you've been, what you like anything goes!" says Jennifer.

Flourish Market's winter hours will be Wednesday through Friday 10 to 3 p.m., and Saturday 10 to 5 p.m. The business has a website at www.flourishmarket.com and can be followed on Facebook. The store's phone number is 232-8501.



Notes from the Collector's Office

Actual real estate and personal property tax bills for FY16 were mailed at the end of December and are due February 1, 2016. Interest begins accruing on unpaid bills on February 2.

To ensure that your payment arrives on time (we do not use postmarks to determine timely payment), please note the following:

- Mail *at least a week* before the due date (a misdirected letter is still late).
- Be sure to use the correct address (because most town employees are part timers, mail directed to another office can be delayed up to a full week or more). My P.O. box number is 365.
- If you hand-deliver payments to Town Hall when my office is closed, be sure to place it in the drop box beside *my* window (mail left in other locations may not reach me in a timely fashion).
- For same-day crediting, use your checking account or debit card to pay online at www.weststockbridge-ma. gov and click on "Pay Real Estate...". There is a \$0.25 charge, but it's available 24/7 until 11:59 p.m. on May 1, and payments are time-stamped and receipted via e-mail. After May 1, late payments should be handled in person.
- Be aware that delivery times with all other online services range from 5 to 7 business days.

If you question your valuation, you have a 30-day window (until February 1) to file an abatement with the Assessors' office. Forms for filing are available in Town Hall and online. Forms received after February 1 will not be considered.

Excise bills are issued in multiple batches throughout the year (the first and largest batch goes out by late February). They are due on the date indicated on the bill, generally 30 days from the date of issue. *There is no grace period, and partial payment is not accepted.* Please pay your excise bill in full even if you plan to file for an abatement. When the abatement is approved, you will be issued a refund. This will avoid interest, late charges, and restrictions being placed on your license.

Board of Selectmen Meeting Summaries

Note: Copies of official board minutes may be read at the West Stockbridge Public Library.

November 23, 2015 Open Meeting

Annual Tax Classification Public Hearing

Jeff Reynolds, associate assessor on the West Stockbridge Board of Assessors, provided information on the tax rate needed to raise the funds the town needs. The selectmen considered the balance between taxes on residential and commercial property. The town would have to raise the commercial tax 20 cents to reduce the residential tax rate 1 cent.

The selectmen voted to maintain a single tax rate, noting they were acting three weeks earlier than last year.

Officer Accepted to Police Academy

The board received notice that Officer Santana has been accepted into the full-time Police Academy. Curt Wilton asked Mark Webber to remind the police chief not to "cap out" because it is not allowed by state law. Mass. General Laws allow only full-time academy-trained police to be full-time officers. Part-time officers cannot work more than 19 hours per week because 20 hours per week is full time and requires different credentials. A part-time officer has less standing in court than a full-time officer.

Sewer System Receives Approval from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA)

After five years, the town has received word that the sewer's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System is certified to be in good standing with the EPA. Curt commented that the regulations are strict.

BHRSD Regional Agreement Committee Update

Mark reported that his appointment to the new Berkshire Hills Regional School District Committee (at the October 26 board meeting) was not acceptable to the committee, which requires a selectman rather than an administrator be appointed. Curt was then nominated and agreed to serve.


Other Business:

- Curt reported that the new business Boundless has a sign up but should have gotten a permit first. Boundless should comply with the town sign bylaw that specifies square footage. Mark and Curt said they will review the sign.
- Curt agreed that the Highway Department will swap the Council on Aging van snow tires for winter but said he does not want to get involved in any mechanical work.
- Joe Roy raised the issue of the Village Association information board and rack in the public rest room building. Curt said the toilet is open only in warm seasons due to the cost of snowplowing around the building and heating it. Earl Moffatt said placing an information booth next to a commode is odd.
- Roland Dudney of the Parks and Recreation Committee presented plans for the West Stockbridge Sparkles event, 3 to 7 p.m. on December 4, including the Holiday Stroll, tree lighting, caroling, Santa and his sleigh, Farmers Market, and live music. Roland also presented the committee's outline of the Parks and Recreation calendar.

Executive Session

The Select Board went into executive session to consider the purchase, exchange, lease, or value of real estate.

December 7, 2015, Open Meeting

Recapitulation of Tax Rate (RECAP)

Concluding the RECAP process used to set each community's annual tax rate, the selectmen approved a tax rate of \$12.33, an increase of 49 cents.

Driveway Issue on Pixley Hill Road

Residents of 24 and 27 Pixley Hill Road are asking the Board of Selectmen to require repairs to remedy drainage problems. Curt Wilton provided background: both driveways are preexisting and nonconforming with permits from 1994 and 1995 and in violation of the zoning bylaw. Earl Moffatt commented that the parties are changing property ownership to make improvements. He said they should aim for conformance and recognize their responsibility for maintenance. If the driveways are conforming, the town will fix the road.

Public Rest Room Information Area

A building permit application has been submitted by the Merchants Association, but Mark Webber commented that only the town can apply for a permit for a town-owned building.

WiredWest/Finance Committee Update

The West Stockbridge Finance Committee wants to speak with representatives of WiredWest, whose revised business plan is delayed. The funding authority, the Massachusetts Broadband Institute (MBI), wants WiredWest to revise its plans. MBI was expected to explain its concerns at meetings on December 14 and 17. MBI has installed fiber wires into the Town Office building. WiredWest plans to install broadband connection to dwellings.

Mark said that the town is in parallel discussions with Charter Cable, raising the possibility that Charter might take over the role of WiredWest. Mark reported that he saw a Nextel truck working near Berkshire Bank possibly for MBI or Charter.

Curt said that WiredWest personnel seem sincere, dedicated, and intelligent, but if a town in the WiredWest consor-

tium drops out (as Otis has), the cost for West Stockbridge goes up. Representatives of WiredWest and MBI have said West Stockbridge's cost would not go up.

Earl Moffatt commented that a Time Warner/Charter merger seems more doubtful and that Charter may have hired Spectrum for work. A citizen in town asked if the selectmen know why his Charter bill has gone up \$23, and they replied they did not.

Flourish Market Sign Permit

The selectmen discussed the sign permit application by Jennifer Knopf for Flourish Market, her new business at 2 Albany Road (see feature story about Flourish Market in this issue of *The Local Yokel*). The selectmen determined that the size of the two signs is OK, but the location needs to be reviewed by Mass Highway.

Village School Use Permits

The selectmen approved requests to use the Village School on December 10, January 14, and February 3, and for a nutrition program on Saturday mornings from 10 to 11:30.

Community Compact Meeting

Curt will attend the Community Compact meeting in the Great Barrington Town Hall, where representatives from 17 towns will discuss working together.

Annual Liquor License Renewals

The selectmen approved all seven applications for renewal of liquor licenses, effective January 1. The town's allotment of full retail licenses is filled; the restaurant liquor licenses are only partly used. The town's wine and beer licenses are not in use. Current licensees include Truc Orient Express, West Stockbridge Public Market, Queensboro, Rouge, Williamsville Inn, Six Depot, and Shaker Mill Tavern.

New Police Cruiser Update

The town is receiving a \$4,000 discount on a new cruiser, due to arrive in February 2016, because the last police cruiser for the town came with the wrong tires and colors.

The Select Board went into executive session to discuss the purchase, lease, or value of real estate. *

WiredWest Update— Back to the Table with MBI

On December 1 the Massachusetts Broadband Institute (MBI) issued a statement denying state funding to the WiredWest project, chiefly because of differences over ownership. MBI is the state agency charged with overseeing the last-mile build-out for remote portions of the state. MBI oversees \$40 million in state money allocated for bringing broadband to unserved towns. WiredWest responded with a press release and a point-by-point rebuttal that can be seen in their entirety on the www.wiredwest.net home page.

"WiredWest has been the driving force in moving the last mile project forward," said Monica Webb, chair of WiredWest, "starting with having our towns form Municipal Lighting Plants (MLPs), incorporating the organization, conducting market research, procuring early high-level cost estimates and network design, completing financial modeling, signing up 7,000 subscribers, helping 24 towns pass bond authorizations, and putting together an exhaustively vetted business plan and Operating Agreement. And our citizens are impatient to make this happen. We need the state to stop throwing up unnecessary roadblocks."

WiredWest's plan calls for creating a regional broadband network, paid for through town spending and allocated state funding, with the WiredWest collaborative owning the network and the towns owning a share of the company in proportion to how much money they invested in it.

At the MBI municipal meeting in Greenfield on December 14, town representatives chastised MBI's behavior for not working with WiredWest in good faith and not respecting the wishes of the towns to work as a cooperative. A majority of the towns are part of WiredWest and believe that WiredWest is still the best option for the small towns of western Massachusetts to build and operate a regional fiberoptic broadband network by working together as a cooperative of towns. The rescheduled MBI municipal meeting in Worthington was canceled for a special MBI board meeting with WiredWest.

Two days after a volatile informational meeting in Greenfield, MBI officials met with WiredWest executives in an effort to resolve their differences over how to build a broadband network throughout unserved, sparsely populated western Massachusetts towns. MBI's board of directors told MBI and WiredWest to go back to the table to work the issues out and then return for a joint presentation with their resolutions. MBI issued this statement: "(Wednesday) MBI and WiredWest had a constructive meeting about how to move forward. Based on that session, we will implement a negotiation framework after WiredWest meets with their board on Saturday." MBI director Eric Nakajima said, "We're absolutely committed to working with the towns . . . and the money is not in jeopardy at all." At WiredWest's board meeting on Saturday, December 19, they designated a negotiation team composed of a broader representation of directors from the town delegates to work with MBI to resolve issues around the business plan, governance, and technology.

Once WiredWest and MBI finalize the Operating Agreement and Business Plan, they will be issued to the towns for review and comment by our town's Finance Committee and Board of Selectmen before signing to join WiredWest officially.

Winter: The Wisdom of the Water Element

According to Chinese medicine's Five-Element theory, winter is the time of the water element, which relates to the kidneys, urinary bladder, and bone. Supporting your water element is particularly important if you suffer from poor circulation, lethargy, back, or other joint pain that worsens in cold weather, a low sex drive, lowered immune function, or find it harder to maintain a healthy weight this time of year. Winter offers an important opportunity to strengthen your kidney and bladder systems and address these as well as other seasonal symptoms.

Winter is a time to hibernate and conserve energy; it is normal in cold months to put on a few extra pounds, though hopefully not too many. And while spring is when people, along with the birds and the bees, get extra frisky (which is why more births happen in December than any other month), people are less inclined toward sex during the winter when temperatures drop precipitously. Our nightly inclination to snuggle up by the fire means being less active, but we are also likely to sleep more deeply and longer.

Coldness not only decreases circulation to the extremities, it can also damage the kidneys and bladder. One of the best ways to protect these vital organs is switching from iced beverages to drinking only warm or room temperature water and teas. This kidney- and bladder-friendly habit allows you to better absorb and metabolize fluids. You might try adopting the Asian habit of drinking a hot broth-type soup *at the end* of a meal rather than beverages *during* the meal so you don't dilute your stomach acid, vital for good digestion.

Just as warm water is better in winter, so is warm-cooked food versus raw food. Instead of salads, choose warm, hearty soups, stews, roasted nuts, and cooked (not baked) grains. It is also helpful to rub a warming liniment or herb-infused alcohol on achy arthritic joints.

Staying healthy in winter extends beyond just taking care of the body. Like all of the Five Elements, the water element includes its own unique personality type including being clever, articulate, and introspective. Water people have a calm energy and a lucid mind. They are resilient and constant with great integrity. Water types need plenty of downtime to be alone and recharge. They are easily exhausted by too many social interactions.

When the kidney system is in good balance, you can be courageous and accomplish great things without feeling

taxed, fearful, or overwhelmed. However, when the kidney system, which is more or less synonymous with adrenal function, is overworked, you may feel a deep sense of lethargy and fatigue, eliminate more liquid than is going in, experience a low sex drive, or feel unusually fearful or anxious.

The West Stockbridge Library has joined hundreds of other Massachusetts libraries to provide a new service called the Commonwealth Catalog that makes it easy for patrons to get resources from across the entire state. 

Recipe Corner by Lynn Ryan

CREAMY CHICKEN GNOCCHI SOUP

It's comfort food time, and this is a great one for a COLD January day! Yield: 8 servings (2 quarts)

1 pound boneless, skinless chicken breasts, cut into ½-inch pieces

1/3 cup butter, divided

1 small onion, chopped

1 medium carrot, shredded

1 celery rib, chopped

2 garlic cloves, minced

1/3 cup all-purpose flour

3½ cups 2% milk

11/2 cups heavy cream

1 Tbsp. reduced sodium chicken bouillon granules

½ tsp. coarsely ground pepper

1 package (16 oz.) potato gnocchi


½ cup chopped fresh spinach

- 1. In a Dutch oven, brown chicken in 2 Tbsp. of the butter. Remove and keep warm. In the same pan, sauté the onion, carrot, celery, and garlic in the remaining butter until tender.
- 2. Whisk in the flour until blended; gradually stir in the milk, cream, bouillon, and pepper. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat; cook and stir for about 2 minutes or until thickened.
- 3. Add the gnocchi and spinach. Cook 3–4 minutes or until the spinach is wilted. Add the chicken. Cover and simmer for 10 minutes or until heated through. Do *not* boil!

West Stockbridge History Quiz Answer:

The smaller building next to the former Town Hall was built sometime between 1855 and 1858, based on early maps. Commercial directories in the late 1800s do not list businesses by location, but it very likely was a general store. By the 1880s, the building was owned by James Moore. (Across the street, where Equator is located now, James Moore had his apothecary that also sold books and candy. Think of an early CVS.)

Our building's claim to local fame was in the mid-1890s when it housed the post office. In 1893, Lena Moore, daughter of James Moore, took over as postmistress, and the post office was moved into her family building from its previous space in the old Town Hall. The town was growing, and it needed the space in the Town Hall for other services.

Lena had the dubious honor of serving during the period when robbers blew up the post office safe seven times. (However she hung in there, remaining in her position until 1909, when she finally married at what was then the shockingly old age of 40.) The Reverend Dubois took over as postmaster, and the post office remained on the first floor until the 1930s when it moved across the street, next to the Queensboro Package Store.

The second floor was the town's barbershop. The early photos show the traditional barber pole in front of the door leading upstairs. Isaiah D. Crispell was the only barber in town, according to both the commercial directories of the 1870s and 1880s and the federal census. He was African American, born in Kingston, New York, and moved into town sometime in the 1870s. Isaiah is described in the directories as a "tonsorial artist." In 1905, the business changed hands as Samuel Baldesarre, a recent Italian immigrant, moved into the space and became the local barber.

The building survived until the 1930s when the Battistoni building next door burned in a major fire. The barbershop moved across to the brick building next to the Public Market. The funny-looking little building had more excitement than many others that remain in the town center.






