
Planning Board Proposes Changes to Village Center Zoning

The planning board has been working on changes to the zoning bylaws for the village center. A final proposal will be presented for approval at a special town meeting on February 27. In anticipation of that, and as required by the state zoning statute, a formal public hearing about the proposed changes will be held on February 6 at 7:15 p.m. at the Town Offices.

Two key goals have defined our mission and guided our work in considering upgrades and improvements for zoning for the village center. These are to:

- \rightarrow Reduce the permitting burden
- → Provide regulations that better enable the village center to maintain, replicate, and reproduce its inherent character

Our current zoning regulations were a product of an era when no one thought about making regulations that actually related to the physical characteristics of the village. As a result, in the village center most lot sizes, frontage, and setbacks, products of the historical development of the village, are nonconforming. The current zoning does not reflect and embody the essential nature of the village center.

These existing regulations have various negative effects, for example:

1. They prevent anyone from building anything new that would follow the historical patterns of the village center in terms of lot size and relationship of building to street.

2. The nonconformities that exist for virtually every property in the village center trigger the need for variances or special permits for most changes to existing buildings. A reduction in this permitting burden is one of the benefits that we hope to realize with these new regulations.

The proposed zoning changes for the village center are in four areas:

- → Change the commercial district boundary to encompass the old Town Hall, Wisdom Lodge, former Card Lake Inn, and an existing mixed-use property adjacent to the former Card Lake Inn.
- → Create a Village Center Overlay District (VCOD) zoning district for the core of the village with new dimensional requirements for lot size, frontage, and setbacks within the overlay district. The intent of the changes proposed is to make more of the existing fabric of the village core conforming, and to enable new development to re-create more easily the village fabric as it is.
- → Make changes in the table of uses to allow mixed uses because (a) mixed use is of value in the vitality of the village, and (b) that would make existing mixed uses no longer nonconforming.
- → Provide improved parking regulations including better mechanisms for shared parking and relief from onsite parking requirements in the VCOD where most of the lots are very small.

The full text of the proposed changes and maps showing the proposed boundary lines are available for review at the Town Offices.

Prior to the Planning Board's decision at the beginning of the new year to move forward and bring the proposed changes to the annual town meeting, we have held informal meetings to present these ideas to townspeople, explaining the proposed changes and soliciting their input. Those meetings provided us with very helpful comments, and as a result the current proposal that will be presented at the public hearing, and then brought to town meeting includes adjustments such as the following:

1. The new VCOD boundary on the east side of Main Street is extended to incorporate a parcel adjacent to the former Card Lake Inn.

2. In the VCOD if a new use or change of use would result in a parking requirement of seven or fewer spaces, there will be no onsite parking requirement for that new use or change of use. Any parking requirement greater than seven spaces in the VCOD will be subject to the same parking requirements as required elsewhere in the commercial district.

3. We decided to keep the language in the existing zoning that provides latitude for the zoning board of appeals (ZBA) to reduce parking requirements in particular cases via special permit.

The public hearing will be another opportunity for public input and comment. Based on input from the public hearing, the Planning Board can consider further adjustments to the proposed changes before making their final recommendation to the select board for inclusion at the February 27 special town meeting.

We would also like to note that we have done our work with the help of the Berkshire Regional Planning Commission (BRPC) and in particular with funding from the "District Local Assistance" grant program.

BRPC has provided research about existing conditions in the town, provided information about what similar towns have done to update their village zoning regulations, and has helped with drafting and review of the proposed zoning bylaw changes.

Zoning regulations are about use and dimension. Over time these regulations result in spatial patterns that are the underlying generators of village character. The changes in zoning proposed for the village center aim to confirm the character of our village center and to enable an essential spatial patterning and character to be the stability through which vitality and energy in our village center can thrive.

February History Quiz Question:

Among the early settlers in western Massachusetts were the Congregationalist ministers. They came primarily from the Connecticut River Valley seeking to convert local residents and at the same time secure the land and keep it away from the Dutch traders moving in from the Hudson Valley.

During the colonial period, the Congregational Church was the major force. It controlled the political, economic, and social fabric of the Commonwealth. Church attendance was required. Town taxes paid for the minister, funded the building of the church, and supplied wood for heat and grain to feed the minister's family. Tolerance of other religions, or even no religion, was nonexistent. Any deviation from Congregational beliefs usually got people exiled at best, or more likely their land was confiscated and they were then fined and imprisoned. State law required church membership.

West Stockbridge had a slightly different relationship with the powerful Congregationalist Church. What was that relationship, and how did it evolve?

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Board of Selectmen Meeting Summaries

Open Meeting: January 9, 2017

Police Department Update

Since starting work on December 19, Chief Marc Portieri has been introducing himself to people in town and has received a positive reception. Marc said he has been getting speed radar units certified, the same key to work in both cruisers, and training for all officers.

Marc recommended that part-time officer Cameron (Cam) Ford be considered for a position as a full-time officer. Curt Wilton said that he is not against another full-time officer, but the selectmen have not yet discussed it. He observed that it is a big commitment in light of the town's experience of spending money for no result, since one such officer was hurt and another left for another town. Curt is not willing to just take their word for commitment. He added that the town is seeking college-educated and female officers. Peter Skorput said he would want some kind of agreement, noting that some towns are requiring a three- or five-year commitment.

Curt said he has heard lots of positive comments from townspeople about the new chief. Curt cautioned Marc to be careful about complying with part-time salary regulations because there are investigators who will come in.

Shared Services

The board accepted an invitation from the towns of Sheffield and New Marlboro to send a representative to a meeting on January 23 regarding shared services. The purpose is to discuss shared services in information technology, financial services, highway, conservation, and shared purchasing in equipment and gravel among the three towns of Sheffield, New Marlboro, and West Stockbridge.


The selectmen also discussed meeting with the Richmond Board of Selectmen to explore shared services. Peter said the idea was prompted by issues around the Richmond ambulance and the towns' experience already working together.

Downtown Zoning Amendments

The Board of Selectmen approved a request by the Planning Board to proceed with a special town meeting proposing amendments to downtown zoning (overlay district and commercial district). Members of the Planning Board commented that the current zoning is over 50 years old and needs improvement, and there have been no changes to the proposal after two hearings.

Rescheduled Special Town Meeting

Because Stockbridge leaders have decided to hold their special town meeting on the school district along with their regular May town meeting, West Stockbridge, which had been planning to meet on the school issue after Stockbridge considered it in January, now plans to hold a special town meeting on February 27 to consider the Planning Board zoning proposals along with the revised regional school district agreement.

Fire Services Audits

Mark Webber announced that the town has received the results of an independent audit of the Fire Department as approved at the last town meeting. Curt explained that the audit was the result of allegations by a citizen regarding Peter's leadership of the department. Surplus Equipment

Curt announced that three vintage vehicles belonging to the town are going out to bid: a 1985 truck, a 1989 tractor, and a 2008 conversion van. The vehicles can be seen at the Highway Department yard.

Other Business:

- Upcoming meetings were scheduled as follows: January 15, Board of Selectmen; January 23, Sheffield; January 30, Rent Control Board.
- Curt signed the disclosure forms required because Peter receives two salaries as selectman and fire chief.
- Mark reported that the Massachusetts Department of Transportation has scheduled the next meeting on the Interchange project for February 7 at 6:30 p.m.
- The selectmen approved a building use request for four Thursdays, 4:30 to 6 p.m., in February through April, unless there is a conflict with other users.
- The Office of Dam Inspection has sent the town a reminder of responsibility for inadequate spillway capacity. The selectmen are acknowledging the communication but do not agree, commenting, "In 45 minutes the river would be a brook."
- Curt reported on the status of the retaining wall along the Williams River that broke down by the Shaker Dam Café. The town is seeking a 30-day emergency temporary work permit from the Conservation Commission. Foresight and Maxymillian will be involved in the

• Peter asked Mark whether there were plans to recreate the Cable Commission. Mark said not yet.

Public Comment

- Paula Farrell asked about repairs to the Town Office building's front steps that are giving way. The selectmen said they are asking Facilities Manager Dom Luchi to make repairs.
- Paula asked for more heat in the Community Room. The selectmen said they will provide a space heater.

Open Meeting: January 16, 2017

Berkshire Hills Regional School District Budget

The Board of Selectmen discussed a letter from BHRSD superintendent Peter Dillon and school committee chair Steve Bannon inviting them to (1) a meeting of the School Committee on Thursday, February 16, 7 p.m., at Monument Valley Regional Middle School, for a presentation of the proposed budget for FY 18, and (2) a joint meeting with representatives from all district town boards on Tuesday, February 28, 6 p.m., in the Stockbridge Select Board meeting room, for each town to hear the perspectives of others at the meeting.

Fire Services Report

Curt Wilton announced that there would be no public

discussion of the report at this meeting. The selectmen will read the report and discuss it at another meeting.

Dirty Properties

As a result of tax liens, the town now owns several properties that may be "dirty," or contaminated with gas and fuel oil, and consequently are difficult to sell. One of these properties is at 21 Great Barrington Road, just south of Card Lake on Route 41, previously owned by Everett Wamback.

The selectmen discussed what to do with the property. Mark Webber reported town counsel's advice that the town is not responsible for cleanup but does have to disclose what it knows. Curt suggested a public auction with disclosure of what the town knows. Earl Moffatt suggested further investigation and that zoning classification may suggest a use. Peter Skorput commented that the tanks may have been removed.

Other Business:

- Mike Skorput asked why the board scheduled a meeting on the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday. Curt replied that they decided it was necessary because they are unusually busy with meetings about finance, schools, and shared services.
- Karen Carmean's request to use Town Offices rooms for the Artists' Guild was approved.



Regional Agreement Amendment Up for Vote

at Special Town Meeting

At a special town meeting on February 27, West Stockbridge residents will vote on a proposed amendment to the Berkshire Hills Regional School District (BHRSD) Regional Agreement that, among other things, will change how debt for future capital projects is assessed.

In his January 22 letter to the *Berkshire Edge* (http://theberkshireedge.com/bhrsd-finance-revisionneeds-public-support-at-special-town-meetings/), BHRSD superintendent Peter Dillon explained that the district was formed in 1965 through the creation of a regional agreement that was updated in 1977, 1979, and 1990. In 2016, a committee was formed with citizens from the three member towns to review and update the agreement.

The committee is chaired by Bill Fields, Mark Sprague, and Lou Oggiani. West Stockbridge representatives are (at large) Alan Thiel, Henry Baldwin, and Lou Oggiani; (School Committee) Kristen Piasecki; and (Selectmen and Finance) Curt Wilton and Andrew Krouss.

The committee focused on three main areas:

- Removing inaccurate or outdated language
- Complying with state laws, regulations, and practices, and
- Reworking the assessment formula for capital projects.

The committee proposed changing how debt for future capital projects is assessed. Currently, capital projects are assessed based on October 1 student enrollment. Each town pays its share based on its percentage of students. The revised formula is based on equalized valuation. Each town's assessed value would become the basis for each town's allocation for capital projects. Operating budgets would continue to be assessed as they are now based on October 1 student enrollment.

After meeting for more than a year and working with the Massachusetts Association of Regional Schools and the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education, the committee unanimously approved a revised agreement, sent it to the School Committee that also approved it, and to the state for review and feedback. The revised agreement can be found at the district's website, http://www.bhrsd.org/bhrsd-proposed-regional-agreement/.

West Stockbridge History Quiz Answer:

The rural towns in the western districts weren't under the control of the church hierarchy quite as much as the Connecticut Valley or eastern cities. Remote geography and the need to develop a "wild and howling place" eased some of the dogmatic requirements. For West Stockbridge, located next to the Dutch New York patroonships and actively trading with a more worldly population from Hudson, Albany, and New York, the townspeople were somewhat more tolerant.

By the 1770s, West Center residents were meeting in various homes and taverns in West Center. The trip over the hill to the Stockbridge Mission to spend a six hours in services on Sunday must have been rough, even more so during harvesttime or winter. By 1774, we received our charter from the General Court and our town formally split with the other Stockbridge. The reasoning was to keep our own church tithing and formally organize our own



First Congregational church built in 1789 on the site of the West Center Chapel. Photo courtesy of Bob Salerno.


congregation—Congregationalist, of course. Our first church meetinghouse was finally built in 1789 on the site of the West Center Chapel.

Just four years later, though, the Baptist Society of West Stockbridge was officially chartered. It actually shared the meetinghouse until 1794 when the Congregationalist Church gave the Baptists a piece of land on their own property to build their own meetinghouse. This was a major step forward in tolerance from the days of Roger Williams and banishment to Rhode Island. (Stones from that foundation might still be found in the woods.) This wouldn't have happened in the other Stockbridge, which was much more dogmatic.

As people from outside settled here, other religions were formally organized in West Stockbridge. Scotch immigrants from the British clearances supported the Methodist Episcopal Church in 1834. Irish immigrants from the famine and British deportations brought in Catholicism in the 1850s. Probably the most famous was the Mormon revivals of 1839. A group of 30 organized a branch of this new religion in 1840, out of which came Daniel Spencer, one of the early leaders of the church.

The formal recognition by Massachusetts of the Congregational Church as a state church ended in 1780, but the official state funding of selected religions didn't end until 1833.


Community Garden







Throughout the past three decades, Hildy Pincus Kronen has created a photographic style resembling movie stills from an Alfred Hitchcock thriller. Like him, her images can be unsettling Lack any night photographs are usually expressed compositionally by placing a long figure for the spare engimatic photographs are usually expressed compositionally by placing a long figure in the frame with an emphasis on the play of light and dark. Her portraits, she says, "would not be described as 'portraits' in your traditional sense. Many times the frame cuts off the identity of the person, creating the sense that the individual could be anyone."

Working with both film and digitally, Kronen is best known for her hand coloring. Through her special sensibility and spare use of color on black-and-white photographs, she has come up with her own unique seductive reality. Kronen maintains an openness when beginning a photo shoot, bringing a depth of meaning to her photographs based on her connection to her subject. With her keen eye for composition, she meticulously places and develops a rapport between her self and the model allowing for their vulnerability to surface, thus creating a level dividence there are her one hor inverse and her builty. of intimacy between the viewer and her subject.

"My work crosses a broad range from serene to wild--from monochromatic paper collage to vivid and highly textured mixed media paintings with found objects and acrylics. My pieces may encompass the symbolism of women's spirituality or my love of the earth and our natural environment or the lore and magic of a place like Monhegan Island, Maine.

"I enjoy working and experimenting with textures and new techniques. It is the uncertainty and search for new techniques and exciting combinations of color that keeps me burning with passion to "do art." I am frequently asked how I come up with some of the images and pairings of materials. The answer is always that these are not from a clear, conscious place but rather something that bubbles up out of the subconscious, a remembering of an ancient symbol, or an image seen or felt in a dream. My art often expresses that which I am unable to verbalize.

"My goal is not to recreate a scene or an apple, but rather to capture the mood or feeling of a time and/or place. I've come to realize that when the Muse stings me I am powerless to concentrate on anything else until I have exhausted whatever theme she is tickling me with. It might be a color combination, a song lyric or the title of a book, or something less specific, a feeling that just has to be explored with different kinds of materials. I am grateful for every one of her little, and sometimes not so gentle, stings."
