#### Select Board Meeting Minutes April 22, 2020 Remote Access by Free Conference Call.com

6:00 PM:Open Meeting

Quorum present: Select Board Members: Bernie Fallon, Chair; Eric Shimelonis, Member, and Town Administrator Marie Ryan.

Review and act on previous meeting minutes.

#### Agenda Items/Action/Discussion Items: Meeting Opened at 6:00 PM

#### Vote/Discussion renewal of agreement with Colonial Power Group:

Bernie asked Marie to explain what this was about. Marie stated that this is an agreement the Town has with Colonial Group to assist in purchasing group rate electricity along with most of all of the other Berkshire County Towns to get the best rates.

Bernie a motion to renew the Town's consulting agreement with Colonial Power Group for municipal aggregation. Eric seconded the motion, no further discussion, all were in favor.

#### **Vote/Discussion renewal of Community Compact Agreement:**

Bernie explained that this Community Compact Agreement was first completed in 2015. This agreement helps to unlock state funding and allows the Town to be eligible for grants while working with Berkshire Regional Planning Commission.

Bernie made a motion for the Town to renew its Community Compact Agreement by using best practices for continuous improvement.

Eric did not second, he explained that as of today, he got more information on making the motion for this renewal. The motion failed.

Eric made a new motion to renew the Town's Community Compact agreement:

- 1. For Sustainable Development and Land Protection by using Best Practice: Complete a Master or Open Space & Recreation Plan to guide land conservation & development decisions including zoning & land acquisition
- 2. For Housing by using Best Practice: Amend Zoning By-Laws to allow for increased density and housing opportunities in a manner that is consistent with neighborhood character and supportive of aging in community.

Bernie seconded the motion, there was no further discussion and all were in favor.

#### Vote/Discussion of Annual Town Caucus, Annual Town Meeting and Annual Town Election Dates:

Marie explained that she had discuss setting the dates for these events with Town Council and that if for some reason they need to be rescheduled again that it can be done. She also stated that there will be social distancing kept in mind as well as the safety of the poll workers and the voters by having masks and gloves available at the polls. The Caucus will also have chairs 6 feet apart as well. The Town Election will also be shortened by 2 hours to allow less time for poll workers to be exposed.

Bernie made the motion to schedule the Town Caucus for May 21st, 2020, the Annual Town Meeting for Monday, June 22, 2020 and the Annual Town Election for Monday, June 29 with reduced hours of 11 AM until 6 PM.

Eric seconded the motion, there was no further discussion and all were in favor.

Bernie made a motion to adjourn, Eric seconded, the Select Board adjourned at 6:15 PM.

Annual Town Meeting will be held on Monday, June 22, at 7 p.m. Please come with your masks and gloves. Social distancing will also be in place to conduct a safe meeting. As a reminder, you may not vote by absentee for town meeting articles. Only-in person voting is allowed.

Annual Town Election will be held on Monday, June 29, from 11 a.m. to 6 p.m. You may go to the polls and vote in person, and we will do our best to have safety protocols in place. Or you may apply for an early ballot, or if applicable, an absentee ballot. Both forms are available on the town's website, https://www. weststockbridge-ma.gov/home/news/annual-town-meeting-and-town-electioninformation. Whichever form is applicable, print it, fill it in, sign it, and return it to the town clerk's office at PO Box 525, West Stockbridge, MA 01266. The town clerk will then mail you the ballot, which you will then fill out, mail back, and your ballot will be cast.

#### **Annual Town Budget & Warrant Highlights FY 2021**

#### To the Townspeople of West Stockbridge:

The budget, as proposed below, reflects many expenses that are out of the town's control. Along with the insurance expense, the largest impact that we will feel is from the school budget. Our town has been playing catch-up with many repairs that have been needed for years, such as cemetery maintenance, parks and recreation, and the library. Along with that, certain employee salaries come with increased responsibility, making a positive investment in our future.

- Article 36: Appropriate \$6,250 to pay the town's share (with grant awarded) of a Hazard Mitigation Plan.
- Article 37: Appropriate \$6,000 to pay the town's share of a new paver with the Town of Richmond.
- Article 38: Appropriate \$25,000 for the resurfacing of the Transfer Station.
- Article 39: Appropriate \$11,500 for plantings at the solar array near the Turnpike entrance/exit.
- Article 42: Appropriate \$12,600 to repair the Transfer Station roof.

#### Peter Skorput | Candidate for Select Board

# The West Stockbridge Farmers Market Is Open with Changes for Everyone's Safety in Place

Life in the time of Corona Loca. So much has changed in the last couple of months!

We have studied safety guidelines, measured The Green, drawn lines and moved little squares around on graph paper, had lots of Zoom meetings, made plans, read new guidelines, more meetings, changed plans . . . well, I think you are starting to get the picture. And what we have learned is that we are nothing if not adaptable.

We knew there would be challenges and many things to consider, with everyone's safety our biggest concern. But we really wanted to find a way to bring the Farmers Market to The Green again this season. And so we have.

Amy Brentano, owner of The Foundry, has once again generously donated the use of The Foundry Green so that we may continue to provide our vendors a place to sell

their products and give our community access to fresh local food. We are very grateful for that. Please check The Foundry website and social media for their upcoming events (thefoundryws.com).

In compliance with state guidelines and the West Stockbridge Board of Health, we have made changes and taken steps to protect everyone's health and safety. At this time we are a Farmers + Food Producer Only Market. Some of our vendors are offering pre-ordering and
pre-payment as well as bringing their goods to market. We encourage pre-ordering/pre-paying when possible with vendors who offer
it. You can find this info on our website and in our weekly e-newsletters. If you're not on our mailing list and would like to receive our
newsletter, you can also do so on our (new!) website.

This also means we will have no live music, seating areas, artisans, children's activities, or eating on the premises. Prepared food is for takeout only. You're probably thinking that without the social element, it just won't be the same. And we agree. That being said, we know this too shall pass, and in the meantime, we want to continue to support our farmers and our community.

We ask that you respect the guidelines such as wearing a mask and maintaining a 6-foot distance from others. You may have to wait in line a bit, and we ask you to shop as quickly as possible to help our vendors move things along. There are specific entry and exit points, hand washing stations are available, and vendors are required to wear gloves and masks. Please see our website for more information on safety guidelines for vendors and shoppers.

Although we may be 6 feet apart, we are still here for you and look forward to seeing you on Thursday afternoons. Our new hours are 3 to 6 p.m., rain or shine! If you have some free time on Thursday afternoons, we could always use a few volunteers to help out.

And just one more thing: please remember to thank your farmers. They are working hard to feed us. See you on The Foundry Green!



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


Gabriel García Márquez wrote *Love in the Time of Cholera* in 1985. I can't remember much about the book, but the title, for obvious reasons, stays with me. So here's "Life in the Time of COVID," Berkshire County edition, with special consideration to those who actually *stay home* and are wondering what to do.

Two years ago this spring we were buying our piece of land across town. We then designed and built our new smaller and much more energy-efficient house. (See back issues of the *Local Yokel* for exciting episodes of "Thom and Anne's Excellent Adventure.") The adventure all worked out well, and about 13 months ago we were already living in our new house. But there was no time then for much consideration about our landscape.

This spring I've been busying myself setting up a new raised bed vegetable garden, as I reported last month. I find digging in the dirt keeps things in perspective for me. Just below the surface lies a whole world of living things vying for space and nutrients. It's just another reminder that, in fact, it's the microbes who are at the *top* of the food chain, as well as the bottom. They'll be munching on me one of these days. Maybe sooner if I forget to wear my mask in public.

Another activity I mentioned last month is pulling out bush honeysuckle, an invasive listed on Massachusetts Audubon Society's site (massaudubon.org/learn/nature-wildlife.invasive-plants). "Invasive plants are one of the greatest threats to the nature of Massachusetts because they out-compete, displace, or kill native species. These non-native species—many introduced to Massachusetts accidentally or on purpose for garden or landscape use—thrive and proliferate."



Invasive Garlic Mustard. Photo by Cornell Cooperative Extension


Listed along with honeysuckle are "pests" (i.e., plants I don't like) such as Japanese knotweed, goutweed, oriental bittersweet, and purple loosestrife. But the list includes items that really surprised me: sycamore maple, black locust, and yellow iris, among others. At what point does the invasive become native?

Which reminds me, when the Pilgrims landed in this part of the world in the early 1600s, there were *no* earthworms! The glaciers that covered our neck of the woods scraped off all the woods and the earthworms that lived there about 40,000 years ago and only receded about 10,000 years ago. The worms we count on today to aerate our soil and lure fish and transform our food waste into luscious compost only arrived with the Europeans in the ballast of their ships. So they're essentially invasive, I guess—undocumented immigrants.

I've also noticed that this year we have a bumper crop of garlic mustard. An Asian plant introduced in the 1860s as a culinary herb, it has become an aggressive invasive. Not only does it crowd out other so-called native plants, but it actually alters the soil chemistry to inhibit the growth of other species. My daughter-in-law picks the leaves before it flowers and makes pesto out of it, but we'd need to consume many truckloads of garlic-mustard pesto to make a dent in it this year. Adam Weinberg from Second Nature Garden Design in Richmond calls it a "zombie" plant because it will still spread its seeds even after it's been pulled up. You can't compost it and need to discard it in black plastic bags to kill it.

And of course black plastic is made from petroleum, which is, in effect, million-year-old plant life, some of which, I'm sure, was invasive in its day. If only we had a wall . . .

# West Stockbridge Historical Society Awarded Major Grant

The Mass Cultural Council announced this past week that the West Stockbridge Historical Society is one of the organizations

awarded a grant from the Cultural Facilities Fund for the next phase of restoration of the Old Town Hall. This is an \$80,000 matching grant to replace/repair the 1914 metal roof and restore the windows and the building's cupola.

Although the roof and windows in the Old Town Hall are "historic," they leak like a sieve. The metal roof was installed in 1914, has had sporadic maintenance over the years, and is probably 10 years beyond its

useful life. The chimneys need repair. The cupola has sheltered squirrels, and the bell doesn't ring. It's critical that this work be done before we can move forward with heat and air conditioning. We can stop pumping heat out onto Main Street every time the furnace goes on. It's not very sexy or exciting as an elevator but crucial in making the Old Town Hall usable year round.

We have some distance to go. We have to raise the matching funds first within a year, do the work, and then we get reimbursed. (There is no free money.) Hopefully, there won't be many unexpected surprises.

Winning this grant was very important for the Historical Society and our town. We competed statewide against all the major cultural institutions. Every year Mass Cultural Council receives requests for about four times what it has available in the budget. We feel very honored to be in the company of groups like The Mount, the Clark Art Institute, and Barrington Stage Company.

When we applied for the grant, we received a lot of support. Our merchants and town government, State Representative Smitty Pignatelli, Senator Adam Hinds, private individuals, and civic groups all contributed letters. Most important, though, we were able to demonstrate commitment from our members and the town. We appreciate everyone's help and support. It's why West Stockbridge is a wonderful community.




#### **Library News**

# Grist from the Mill by Kelt Wilska

#### Musings on Books and Writing

#### This Project Is for the Birds


On one of your drives through town last month, did you happen to notice someone on a ladder climbing the pond-facing side of the historic Shaker Mill? If you did, you were witness to the welcoming party for West Stockbridge's newest residents: cliff swallows.

Most Berkshirites are probably quite familiar with the barn swallow, that beautiful but noisy fork-tailed neighbor that darts in and out of dusty attics to build its nests and leave its droppings. Far less common are cliff swallows, the square-tailed and red-rumped relatives of the barn dwellers. As European settlers began to build and farm in the Northeast, these birds likewise moved in from the South and West to take advantage of the agricultural spoils—a perfect blend of easy shelter, nutritious insects, and mud for building nests.

These nests are painstakingly constructed one bead of mud at a time as the birds fly back and forth from streamside quarries to their build-

ing sites, often tucked under the eaves of barns. The result is a rough cone-shaped structure with a simple hole for entry and exit.

Sadly, as agriculture fades in importance from our day-to-day lives, so too fades the habitat for the cliff swallow. Suburbanization, forest regrowth, and competition from nonnative house sparrows all contribute to their decline. Cliff swallow populations

have declined 48% in Massachusetts since 1985 and are designated as threatened species in New Hampshire. They have stopped breeding entirely in Rhode Island.

Which brings us back to West Stockbridge. A few years ago, Mara Silver, founder of western Massachusetts-based Swallow Conservation, noticed that cliff swallows were taking a particular liking to the eaves of the Shaker Mill. This nesting site is one of fewer than fifty in the entire state. Using fired clay pots (Mara is a ceramicist), she affixes new nests to these hot spots in the hopes of encouraging colony growth.

So next time you take a walk across the Mill Pond bridge, keep an eye out for some watchful swallow heads poking out of their new homes. Shaker Mill Books is proud to sponsor this bright moment of conservation during such worrisome times. For more information about cliff swallows, visit swallowconservation.org.

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## "We Remember When . . ." Growing Up in West Stockbridge in the 1950s

A Series of Recollections by John Bormolini and Friends

#### Still More West Stockbridge Businesses of the 1950s

...in which the familiar family names Baldwin, Moffatt, and Skorput take center stage!

#### A.W. Baldwin and Co.

The Baldwins were true entrepreneurs, recognizing the needs of the populace and filling those needs. A.W. Baldwin operated the hardware business. Yet it was much more than just hardware. I recall that we bought coal to use for home heating in the winter. Even after my mother Anna and father Joseph saved enough money to install central heating, heating oil was needed, supplied by Baldwin's Hardware. (We still used coal in the winter to save money; it was an Italian thing!) Other items available at Baldwin's included lumber, cattle feed, lawn mowers, tools of all kinds, paint, ladders, fencing, and everything else you expect to find in a hardware store!

#### Charles H. Baldwin and Sons

Across the street from the hardware store was, and is, Charles H. Baldwin and Sons, specializing in their own brands of in-house produced extracts, especially pure

vanilla extracts, table syrups, and stove polish, Stazon, which was shipped throughout the United States. In those days, there was a plethora of pot belly stoves needing polish!

The business originated in 1888. Dick Moffatt took over the business in 1958. I worked for Dick during the summer of 1959. One of my jobs was to make the table syrup. There was a rectangular vat in the back room that sat on a support and was heated by gas jets underneath. The formula for table syrup was to mix water, granulated sugar, and about 2 gallons of 100% maple syrup, and heat it to a certain temperature. When done there was a small pump used to fill gallon containers with the newly prepared syrup. C.H. Baldwin's Table Syrup was very popular because it is lighter than regular maple syrup with the same taste and less expensive.

The sugar used for the table syrup came in 100-pound bags. One day, Dick sent me to Pittsfield to pick up 10 bags. The only vehicle available was a mid-1950s VW Beetle with no seats. It was easily big enough for 1,000 pounds of sugar. Sometimes I took my dog

with me, a full-size collie, and this was one of those times. After loading the ten 100-pound bags into the Beetle, there was little room left for my dog. Fortunately, the car had a sun roof: I got the dog in, and he stuck his head out the sun roof. He had a great perch on top of the sugar for the trip home!

The job I liked best was delivering orders on Fridays. Many customers were small mom-and-pop businesses. There were four different routes: one across the line into New York State, one to northern Berkshire and Vermont, one to southern Berkshire and Connecticut, and one close to home, that is, West Stockbridge, Lenox, Pittsfield, Lee, and out toward the Springfield area. (Jackie Moffatt observed, "Amazingly, we're still delivering to Deerfield Academy after all these years!")

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

We loaded the truck late in the day on Thursday ready for an early start on Friday. In those days, there was no GPS. Dick drew me a map for each of the stops. Dick called himself a "jobber," the middleman between the wholesaler and small businesses.

Products included beauty aids, toiletries, toothpaste, sundries, and much more, and, of course table syrup and extracts. My favorite was Bay Rum after-shave lotion. Dick was very good at what he did. I recall that he was very personable and easy to work for. To me he was the consummate "nice guy."

#### Skorput's Garage

Skorput's Garage was on Route 41 heading toward Great Barrington. It was operated by Peter Skorput, Sr., and his sons. Behind the garage, where the transfer station is now located, there was a good-sized two-story building where mushrooms were grown. Mr. Skorput called them "Snow White Mushrooms."

There were caves above Skorput's Garage to the east that were used in the summer for growing mushrooms. The mushroom beds were prepared in their buildings and then moved to the caves for the summer. I helped get them there one summer. No need to pay for air-conditioning because the caves were cool and damp.

Peter's son, Tony Skorput, built a second mushroom plant. You got there by taking the road between Troy's Garage and the Square Rigger past the town dump, which was usually smoldering even in the winter months. I still remember the smell of burning trash. After the dump, a right and another quick right brought you to where the twin mushroom buildings were located, with an office building connecting them.

I worked at the plant while I was still in elementary school, sometime before 1956. I would go to the plant after school. I would often accompany Tony to Pittsfield to drop off baskets of mushrooms. For some reason, Tony liked me and allowed me to do most jobs in the plant. The best part was when he permitted me to pick mushrooms, layer them in a basket, and top the basket off with the best-looking mushrooms, market ready. I learned all of the tasks required before one itty bitty mushroom peeked above the dirt. Even today, I think I would be able to give a worthy dissertation on the processes needed to grow mushrooms from start to finish.

I love to reminisce about West Stockbridge, my hometown. For this installment, I had the added joy of talking with Jackie Moffatt about Charles H. Baldwin and especially chatting about Dick Moffatt, who just turned 101 years old in March! Be well . . .

#### History Quiz Answer:

Most citizens have only known the lot next to the Old Town Hall as a parking lot serving Town Hall events and the Card Lake Inn. (Those who go back longer remember the Card Lake Inn as the Westbridge Inn and other names.) In its prior life, it was a thriving commercial hub. The first detailed town maps (1855 and 1858) show a hotel called the 1840 West Stockbridge Railroad House taking the entire space. Unfortunately, we don't have any photos of that early space. The old limestone retaining wall dates back to the original hotel building. The Masonic Lodge on Hotel Street is supposedly built on the hotel carriage barn.

The story about the West Stockbridge Hotel is that it was taken over by the owner of the Card Lake Inn in the 1870s. He wanted to open a bar in the Card Lake Inn, but it was too close to the village school and Congregational Church. Evidently the hotel building across Hotel Street was just far enough away to satisfy the town, and he ran a thriving establishment until the early 1900s.

The next time the lot shows up is on the 1904 map when it was owned by a G.W. Burbank, likely still a hotel. Then it gets interesting. By the 1920 census, the Battistoni family operated a three-story general store, meat market, and furniture

store. It is pictured in this postcard, and you can see how this building took up most of the parking lot. It was the largest structure in the town center. The building served as parade central during the 150th anniversary celebration parade. Unfortunately, the building burned down in a spectacular fire in 1938. Parts of the building's foundation are still visible in the lot, giving some sense of scale.

On the north end of the lot stood the town's post office and barber shop in a much smaller building. The post office was originally in the Town Hall in the town clerk's office. It was then moved into the small building next door in the 1880s. It remained there until it was moved across the street sometime after the Battistoni fire. The post office has its own story, but that's for another history question.


