#### **Board of Selectmen Meeting Summaries**

Note: Copies of official board minutes may be read at the West Stockbridge Public Library.

#### Open Meeting: April 11, 2016

(This meeting summary is based on the official meeting minutes by Administrative Assistant Mark Webber.)

#### WiredWest Update

The Board of Selectmen agreed to Steve Sautman's request to send a letter to Governor Baker urging him to get Massachusetts Broadband Initiative [MBI] moving again. Steve had reported that MBI and WiredWest were at an operational impasse and that Governor Baker had frozen the \$40 million funding for last-mile high-speed fiber. It seemed that MBI was looking to reopen past settled agreements and understandings.

#### Visitor's Center

Representing the West Stockbridge Village Association, Roland Dudney asked for an update on the board's recommendation on the construction of a visitor's information center in the public restrooms across from the Post Office.

Earl Moffatt asked if there was any new information such as scale drawings, handicapped access concerns, and types of door. Roland said that information and a draft building permit application had been submitted to the building inspector, who did not note any deficiencies. Earl said he would still like more information before making a decision.

Curt Wilton stated that he does not like the idea of utilizing a public bathroom hallway as an information booth because the uses are inconsistent and inappropriate. Curt said he would work with the merchants to find a better location. Earl also said he understands the need for an information booth but is uncomfortable with the location.

Roland responded that the association had raised about \$5,000 toward modifying the bathrooms to serve as an information center. Asked what type of organization the merchants group is and how it works, Roland said that the West Stockbridge Village Association is a volunteer organization and not a legal entity. The association has 25 to 30 dues-paying members.

Curt said that he feels the best place for the Visitor's Center is right where it has been for the last several years. It has high visibility and is an appropriate size. Curt suggested that the association reopen discussions with the building's owner to see if an equitable deal could be reached. (The owner has asked \$15,000 for the building and property.) Curt pledged the board's assistance but said he cannot support the public bathroom proposal.

#### **Old Town Landfill**

Earl reported on a recent meeting with Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) officials at the site of the Old Town Landfill on Oak Street. DEP officials were pleased with work to date including removing trees from the site and cleanup. Additional testing of private wells in the immediate vicinity may be required in the future. DEP recommends that the town expand municipal

water lines to those properties, eliminating the need for future testing and monitoring wells (testing could be more expensive than extending the water lines). The selectmen will ask the water superintendent to estimate costs to extend water services to those properties. Once cleaned up and capped, the old landfill site could be used for solar energy generation or something else.

#### Meeting with Planning Board: April 25, 2016

Chair of the Planning Board Mitch Greenwald introduced Dana Bixby to present proposed changes to zoning bylaws for downtown West Stockbridge. This presentation will be followed by another meeting for the general public.

Dana said the proposed changes have two main objectives: to maintain the character of the village and to reduce the permitting burden. The changes are based on new data such as the amount of parking available and new tools such as creating a conceptual village core overlay district. There will be no change in building heights allowed but substantial changes to setbacks and density.

Dana said highlights of the changes include (1) making zoning fit current conditions, (2) allowing mixed uses, (3) relaxing parking regulations while being more explicit about shared parking, and (4) changing boundaries to incorporate historical features.

Mitch added that the purpose is to make things more possible rather than less, and to accommodate the unusual town layout that is due to its history and topography. The Planning Board seeks input and support.

In the question and discussion period that followed, it was pointed out that density in the village is good because proximity creates a walking environment. All of the downtown buildings are nonconforming—too close together, too big, and not set back enough. The trick will be "how to get the new to be like the now" and how to capture those qualities in zoning regulations. Zoning is about regulating spatial qualities not visual characteristics. There are limits to the use of zoning to control aesthetics, but there are other methods such as historical districts and demolition delay bylaws. The Card Lake Inn renovation shows that messy vitality can be good. But historical districts can create contentious issues. Other concerns included grandfathering, change of use, parking, increased and new uses (e.g., Six Depot, Turn Park), chain stores, and condos.

#### Open Meeting: May 2, 2016

#### Fire Department

Earl Moffatt read Jim Hallock's letter of April 18 stating that retaliation has continued but he does not want to sue the town. Jim has resigned from the Fire Department and will not return as long as Chief Peter Skorput is in charge. Jim awaits resolution and an

apology. Earl said negotiations with a mediator are going forward. Curt Wilton characterized the situation as unfortunate and complicated. Curt asked the chief if the town is adequately protected against fire. Peter said that although the department has lost two men, the town is protected and he is seeking more personnel.

#### **Charter Cable Update**

Noting the utility trucks that have been seen about town, Mark Webber said that Charter is buying Time Warner and doing a full upgrade of its West Stockbridge system. The new equipment will cover 90% of West Stockbridge with broadband at rates the same as those available nationally. Charter is negotiating with MBI to receive \$300,000 to \$400,000 to extend their build-out to the last 10% of dwellings.

Mark said that the town has been pursuing parallel tracks with WiredWest and Charter for the last two years, but that now WiredWest is in trouble and gone. (WiredWest deposit refunds are available from their office in Northampton: WiredWest, Old Courthouse, 99 Main Street, Northampton, MA 01060.) Mark said he was glad the town would avoid the \$130,000 debt service for WiredWest.

The selectmen thanked Steve Sautman and Carol Kuller for representing the town with WiredWest and Charter.


#### **Police Department**

The town and the chief of police sent Officer Santana to the police academy, but he was injured on the second day and withdrew. Officer Santana has received medical clearance and is serving as a part-time officer but is very disappointed.

#### Mill Pond Park

Evie Kerswell reported that water pressure dropped suddenly for the 30-plus residents. The owners (the Gennaris) have been responsive and diligent but have not found the cause of the problem. Pressure had been 50 to 65 pounds per square inch (psi) and has dropped to 21 psi. Earl suggested contacting the attorney general who has jurisdiction in the park.





#### **Annual Town Meeting & Election Results**

The annual town meeting was held at the Town Offices gymnasium on Monday, May 2. As reported by the Berkshire Eagle (May 6, 2016), only 85 of 1,104 registered voters, or less than 1%, participated.

Voters approved the town's \$5.1 million fiscal 2017 budget, representing a 3.3% increase over current spending. They also approved the town's share of the \$2.87 million operating budget for the Berkshire Hills Regional School District, a 2.6% increase. Voters also authorized the borrowing of \$150,000 for replacement of the Highway Department's one-ton plow sander, a pickup truck for the superintendent of buildings and grounds, and a new van for the Council on Aging.

An article to purchase sound equipment to make town meetings more audible was tabled after Administrative Assistant Mark Webber said he could fix the problem by upgrading existing equipment at less expense. No action was taken on another measure to adopt term limits for all town boards after Moderator Gene Dellea commented that the proposal would conflict with state law and require legislative action. Voters approved in amended form an article providing for "citizens speak time" at town board and committee meetings, with implementation to be worked out by each board or committee.

In the town election on May 9, incumbent Peter Skorput was reelected to a three-year term as selectman, defeating write-in candidate Robert Powell 102-58. Powell was the only write-in candidate; there were no declared challengers to any of the incumbent officeholders.

Other incumbents reelected included Gene Dellea as town moderator, Ronni Barrett as town clerk, June Biggs as town collector, Amy Butterworth to the Board of Assessors, Michael Skorput to the Finance Committee, Mitch Greenwald to the Planning Board, Scott Sawyer to the Board of Health, Catherine Nihart as library trustee, and Marion Loring to the Cemetery Commission.

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#### Summary of Proposed Changes to the West Stockbridge Zoning By-Laws

4/11/16

The Planning Board has been working on changes for the Zoning By-Laws for the Village Center. In anticipation of reaching out to key boards, stakeholders, and community members, we have prepared the following summary of our work. This work has been guided by two key purposes:

- Providing regulations that better enable the Village Center to maintain, replicate, and reproduce its inherent character
- · Reducing the permitting burden

Our current zoning regulations are a product of an era when no one thought about making regulations that actually related to the physical characteristics of the village. As a result in the Village Center most lot sizes and setbacks, which are products of the historical development of the village, are nonconforming. These nonconformities trigger the need for variances or special permits for most changes to existing buildings. A reduction in this permitting burden is one of the key concerns that we hope to address with these new regulations.

The proposed zoning changes for the Village Center are in four areas:

- Expanding the commercial district boundary to encompass the old Town Hall, Wisdom lodge, and former Card Lake Inn. (There is a map attached to show the proposed new boundary.)
- Creating a "Village Core Overlay District" (VCOD) zoning district for the center of the village with
  new dimensional requirements for lot sizes and setbacks within the overlay district. The intent of
  the proposed changes is to make more of the existing fabric of the village core conforming, and to
  enable new development to more easily recreate the village fabric as it is. (There is a map
  attached to show the proposed VCOD boundary.)
- Making changes in the table of uses to allow mixed uses. We believe mixed use is key to the vitality of the village and to reducing the nonconformity of existing mixed uses.
- Providing improved parking regulations, including better mechanisms for shared parking and relief from onsite parking requirements in the VCOD where most of the lots are very small.

The full draft of the proposed changes is included with this summary for your review.

We have done our work with the help of Berkshire Regional Planning Commission. BRPC has contributed research about existing conditions in our town, provided information about what other similar towns have done to update village zoning regulations and has helped with drafting and review the proposed zoning bylaw changes.

We plan to meet first with the Select Board, the ZBA, the Historic Commission and subsequently with business owners and the general public for informal discussions about the proposed changes. With the feedback we get from this process we will then make final recommendations for zoning changes to the Select Board, from which they would be able to make their formal vote to initiate the zoning change process, including a public hearing before the Planning Board and a Town Meeting vote.

In the course of this work we have at various times discussed other zoning issues and whether or not this round of zoning changes should be expanded to encompass other issues beyond the Village Center. We have chosen to keep this round of proposed changes focused on the Village Center. We anticipate addressing zoning issues beyond the Village Center at a future date.









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
#### June History Quiz Question:

It's hard to imagine now, but the triangular area between Swamp Road and Lenox Road was part of a large farm plot in the early 1800s. There were also a couple of small lime/marble quarries on the properties.

The houses along Swamp Road were built in the 1840s and 1850s as West Stockbridge village developed and became prosperous. They housed the farm owners, many of whom had businesses in the village center.

One of the historically important houses is on the northeast corner of the intersection of Swamp and Lenox Roads. It was built by one of our important but relatively unheralded residents, Lyman Hinman. Who was Lyman, and why was he important?

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## Mindful Eating: Summer's Here and I've Got the Fever for Salads!

As a dietitian, I know that salad is a great way to eat a variety of foods, especially vegetables and fruit. One average meal-size salad provides about three cups of greens and another cup or so of vegetables, which is almost half the goal for daily servings of fruit and vegetables and a good amount of our daily fiber intake. Salads without high-calorie dressings are a nutrient-rich addition to any mindful eater's diet!

Salads are usually lower in calories and higher in fiber and antioxidants. These plant-based dishes are also a great vehicle for healthier fats, whole grains, and proteins. According to the *Journal of the Academy of Nutrition and Dietetics*, people who enjoy a predominantly plant-based diet usually have reduced disease risk, lower body weight, longer life expectancy, and even better sex lives!

Summer in the Berkshires offers many ways to help make a variety of salads—farmers markets, local farm stands, and even your own gardens! Some of the local summer goodness right at your salad-making fingertips are beans, beets, berries, cabbage, cucumbers, greens, peppers, corn, stone fruit, and fresh herbs, just to name a few. With help from the Cleveland Clinic, here are some tips for healthy salad making:

- Choose dark, leafy greens (Tip: Limit lighter colored lettuces that have fewer nutrients)
- Add crunch with celery, edamame, raw thin-sliced asparagus, nuts, seeds, cabbage, cucumber, snap peas, broccoli, or cauliflower (Tip: Limit nuts and seeds to no more than 2 Tbsp.)
- Load your salad with lots of rich-colored fruit and vegetables such as colored bell peppers, red cabbage, asparagus, avocado, carrots, tomatoes, beets, and berries. (Tip: Add no more than 2 Tbsp. calorie-dense corn, avocado, or peas)
- Add protein-rich foods such as grilled chicken, canned tuna or salmon in water, hard-boiled eggs, tofu, or cheese (Tip: Limit full-fat cheese to no more than 2 Tbsp. to reduce saturated fat)
- Top with fresh fruit to add crunch and a touch of sweetness with berries, apples, pomegranate seeds, pears, or citrus fruit (Tip: Remember that dried fruit is higher in sugar and calories and should be kept to no more than 2 Tbsp.)
- Include items from the pantry such as beans, chickpeas, artichokes, or capers (Tip: Some items may be higher in sodium/salt, so always drain and rinse when appropriate)
- Be smart about the dressing by using a syrupy balsamic vinegar alone or a homemade dressing made with 2 parts vinegar/citrus juice or other acid and 1 part extra-virgin olive oil to watch total fat and calorie intake (Tip: Creamy dressings are usually higher in fat and should be limited if losing weight is your goal)

If eating salad doesn't appeal to you, but losing weight does, try making salads two to three times per week and then eventually moving up to a goal of one good-size salad every day. Be creative and try other types of salads such as quinoa, wild rice, or orzo salad, and remember the tips listed here to make it a healthier salad. Fruit salads are a wonderful dessert option with loads of combinations to satisfy any sweet tooth. Summer is here, so get making salad—your body and stomach will love you for it!

To paraphrase Dr. Seuss, "Oh, the salads you'll make!" Enjoy!

#### Governor Lifts "Pause," Charter Merger Approved

Governor Baker has lifted "the pause" for the broadband last-mile program. The Baker-Polito Administration has announced a major reorganization of its approach to overseeing the Last-Mile Project aimed at jump-starting progress on delivery of broadband to unserved residents in Western Massachusetts. On May 4, 2016, Housing and Economic Development (HED) Secretary Jay Ash announced two new appointments to help lead the project. Peter Larkin will be serving as special advisor to the secretary on the Last-Mile Project, and Bill Ennen will serve as HED last-mile implementation liaison. Larkin will also assume the duties of chair of the MBI board.

On May 10, Governor Baker, Lieutenant Governor Polito, Senate president Rosenberg, and MBI officials met with local officials and legislative leaders to discuss a strategic pathway forward for the Last-Mile program. The MBI will be building a more flexible framework that will help all unserved towns achieve broadband access, allowing for a range of project models including multi-town collaborations, locally owned networks, and industry partnerships. Many technology and operational choices will be supported, as long as they meet core speed, affordability, and sustainability standards.

For West Stockbridge, our fate is changing with the Charter Communications acquisition of Time Warner Cable. The FCC approved the merger, expected to close on May 18. Trucks have already been seen around town installing power boxes on telephone poles and stringing new cables. We expect Charter to present a proposal to the town on its plan to upgrade its system to full HDTV with digital phone and Internet services in June. With Charter upgrading its system to include high-speed Internet, our town switches categories with MBI and becomes a "potential cable expansion" town.

MBI is looking to accelerate projects for these partial cable towns extending their broadband coverage that is included in its state funding. Charter has already been talking with MBI to receive some of these state funds to extend their build-out. West Stockbridge will need to work with both MBI and Charter to reach an acceptable plan and coverage. Our Board of Selectmen appointed Town Administrator Mark Webber as the West Stockbridge contact with MBI. The Cable Commission will also need to approve any new contract with Charter.

An avid group of gardeners attended the Friends of the Library presentation of Molly's gardening talk on Friday, April 30.

Molly organically gardens  $2\frac{1}{2}$  acres on the Baldwin property. This is her third year as a Community Supported Agriculture (CSA) gardener. CSA farming entails a partnership between the farmer and community members who purchase seasonal shares in the farm's produce. Shares are purchased prior to the growing season, which assists the farmer in seed and equipment purchases. Shareholders partake in weekly provision of an abundance of fresh vegetables.

In addition to her CSA Farm, Molly also provides her organic products to local restaurants, the West Stockbridge Farmers Market, and various other farmers markets.



#### West Stockbridge History Quiz Answer:

Lyman Hinman came from impressive stock. He was the son of an early town resident, Enoch Hinman (who served in the Revolutionary War in the Massachusetts militia). His great-grandfather Edward served as sergeant of arms to Charles I. Edward wisely left for Connecticut after Cromwell beheaded Charles.

Lyman was born in West Stockbridge and became a successful farmer, millwright, and merchant. He was also the justice of the peace.

Lyman and his brother bought the farmland between Swamp and Lenox Roads and built the house on the corner at 2 Swamp Road.

We don't know if he or his brother lived there because the Hinman family also lived on Maple Hill. In 1839, Lyman was converted to the Mormon faith by the preaching of William Hyde along with Daniel Spencer and others from West Stockbridge.

By 1842, Lyman had liquidated all his properties and business in

town to move to Nauvoo, Illinois. His leaving wasn't quite amicable. Reports were that local townspeople formed angry crowds and tried to stop him, even tipping over his wagon. He did make it to Nauvoo and even became a homeopathic doctor there.


In 1847, Lyman and the family started the trek across the prairie as part of the great migration to Salt Lake. Perhaps his most important act was writing a long letter, addressed to "Brother and Sister Taylor from the Winter Quarters," describing their trip. It documented the difficult conditions of disease, starvation, scurvy, hostile Indians and white settlers, rampaging bison, and the general misery of the journey. This letter is very important as one of the best chronicles of the difficulties encountered in the Mormon migration.

Lyman and the family reached Salt Lake in 1848. He became an elder and also worked as a carpenter and master millwright, building numerous mills throughout Utah until his death in 1864.

## GREEN SALAD WITH PEACHES, GORGONZOLA, AND CRANBERRY DRESSING

This is one of three of my favorite salads *ever*! Wonderful peaches are available in local grocery stores now, so take advantage while you can. It's a wonderful salad with grilled chicken too, and drizzling some of the cranberry dressing over the chicken makes it all that much better. Julienned pears work nicely too—or use both. Anything goes!

#### **Salad Dressing**

½ cup balsamic vinegar 3 Tbsp. sugar ½ cup dried cranberries

½ cup olive oil2 tsp. Dijon mustard½ tsp. salt¼ red onion, peeled and sliced thin½ cup frozen cranberries, defrosted¼ tsp. pepper

#### Salad

Salad greens

Arugula

1 cup toasted pecans or walnuts, chopped (I roast them in butter and sugar)

- 2 peaches, peeled and sliced into strips as best you can depending on ripeness
- 1 cup Gorgonzola, crumbled (sometimes I use feta)
- 6 slices thick-cut bacon, cooked and diced into ½-inch pieces

For the dressing, place all the ingredients in a blender and mix until smooth. Toss the greens, peaches, cheese, and bacon together in a bowl and moisten with the dressing. Enjoy!
