

"One night, a field mouse with busy hands and smart eyes, heard the beautiful but sad music." (from Soldier by Kara Van Kirk Levin)


Written by West Stockbridge author Kara Van Kirk Levin and illustrated by Vlada Soshkina and Polina Doroshenko, *Soldier* is a prosocial children's book teaching empathy and generosity. In it, a porcupine named Soldier plays beautiful but sad music on the wooden flute his father made for him. Sadly, he can't be hugged by his mother until a field mouse gets her friends to make Soldier a sweater that keeps his quills from sticking up.

I met the author Kara at the West Stockbridge Farmers Market where she had a booth to market and sell her children's books this summer. The illustrators of *Soldier* are two Ukrainian artists who met in Kiev and connected with Kara in West Stockbridge.

Kara lives on Water Street in West Stockbridge and in Brooklyn, New York. She is founder of Little Wooden Flute publishing house and aims to "raise sympathetic little humans by engaging them with thoughtful literature and storytelling."

#### **Board of Selectmen Meeting Summaries**

#### Open Meeting: August 29, 2016

Chairman Curt Wilton opened the meeting, noting that 40 years ago yesterday the tornado hit the town.

#### **Police Department**

In his fourth week of employment by the town, Officer-in-Charge Frank Murphy introduced newly hired part-time officer Cameron Forest. Cameron is from Cape Cod where he graduated high school in 2014 and was lacrosse team captain. (Curt Wilton joked that Cameron will be using a different sort of stick as a police officer.) His parents live in Richmond. He is EMT trained but not certified, and sponsored by Becket. The town now has seven part-time police officers. Cameron will be sworn in by the town clerk and start work in September.

#### **Baker Road Reclamation & Paving**

Highway Department Chief Curt Wilton recommended low bidders Gorman Group of Albany, New York, for the full-depth reclamation work, and Delsignore of Troy for the paving, noting both have done satisfactory work previously for the town. The project will take four weeks starting in late September followed by another treatment next year. The selectmen voted in favor of Curt's recommendations.

#### **Meetings and Hearings**

- The Chief of Police Screening Committee (Joe Roy, Jill Pixley, Kathleen Davis, and Laurence Tonini) will meet in executive session on September 7 at 5 p.m. to select two or three candidates from among the 20-plus applicants to recommend to the Board of Selectmen.
- The selectmen scheduled a liquor license transfer hearing about transferring the liquor license from the Shaker Mill Tavern to the Shaker Mill Tavern Family Smoke House. The hearing will be held on September 12 at 6:30 p.m.
- At the request of Mill Pond Trailer Park owners, Rent Control Board eviction hearings were scheduled for September 12 at 7 p.m.
- Five public hearings across the state have been scheduled for Mass Pike toll booth removals, with one in Lenox set for September 15.

#### **Town Employee Salary Survey**

The selectmen discussed conducting a comprehensive town employee salary survey. Curt recused himself as highway superintendent, and he cited

the "great question" at the last town meeting about how the town determines what to pay employees. Curt said he thinks the town needs to know more about comparative pay and duties for full-time, part-time, and paid appointed employees. Current practice is what has been done in the past, without any comparative basis. Earl Moffatt suggested consulting with Town Auditor Tom Scanlon.

#### **Snow Removal Guidelines**

Curt distributed a draft of snowplowing guidelines from November 2014 that he would like to circulate and update. Curt said the document will help new police employees by eliminating guesswork. Earl suggested including the bylaws on plowing from driveways onto public roads, on sidewalk snow clearing, and on overnight parking.

#### Other Business:

- Administrative Assistant Mark Webber will be on vacation from September 14 to 28.
- Cable TV license renewal status: Mark said he does not have a draft as yet but expects to have a final version within two weeks.
- Earl asked about warranties on new vehicles for the Highway Department.

#### Open Meeting: September 12, 2016

Upcoming Board of Selectmen meetings will take place on September 26, October 3, and 17.

#### **Police Chief Search Update**

The Search Committee has had one good meeting and has gone through half of the 22 applicants. Committee members will review the rest on September 21 and 28, and they will give the selectmen three finalist recommendations by October 3, at which time the names will be made public.

#### **Cable TV License Renewal**

Town counsel recommends that the Board of Selectmen accept the Charter plan, which is similar to the previous agreement, and was achieved through several months of negotiations between town counsel, the town Cable Committee, and Charter. The selectmen will review the plan.

# Chamber Players Harvest Concert: Benefit for Campaign to Restore 1854 Town Hall

On Sunday, October 23, at 2 p.m., the 1854 Town Hall will be filled with music as brilliant and colorful as the season itself when the West Stockbridge Chamber Players perform their second annual Harvest Concert. This world-class ensemble, led by clarinetist and artistic director Catherine Hudgins, is made up of Boston- and Berkshire-based musicians who regularly perform with the Boston Symphony and other prestigious orchestras. They have given benefit concerts for the West Stockbridge Historical Society several times a year since the start of the campaign to restore the 1854 Town Hall. The Sunday afternoon program will feature six outstanding musicians: Sheila Fiekowsky, violin; Catherine Hudgins, clarinet; Katherine Matasy, accordion; Elizabeth Morse, harp; William Rounds, cello; and Linda Toote, flute.

The first half of the concert—including several rarely heard pieces—will feature two of Astor Piazzolla's Tango-Etudes for violin, Jacques Ibert's Entr'acte for violin and harp, Carlos Salzedo's *Chanson dans la nuit*, Osvaldo Golijov's *Omaramor*, and Heitor Villa-Lobos's *The Jet Whistle*. After an intermission, the concert will continue with Camille Saint-Saëns's *Fantaisie for Violin and Harp*, Op. 124, and conclude, as it began, with a work by Piazzolla: Three Tangos, written for clarinet, cello, harp, and, for the first time in a concert by the West Stockbridge Chamber Players, accordion.

As always, a reception downstairs will follow the program where the audience will have the opportunity to talk to the musicians. Please note: These extraordinary events routinely sell out weeks before the actual concert, so please make sure to get your tickets in advance! Although the date has passed for this concert, members of the Historical Society can purchase tickets before they go on sale to the public, so do consider becoming a member.

Apple Pressing at the Johnson Barn Canceled

Host Don Johnson has announced that there will be *no* apple pressing this year due to a shortage of apples, putting prices out of reach for the benefit event. Hopefully weather will be more cooperative so there will be a good crop next year!

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#### **Facility Use Requests**

The selectmen approved the following requests to use space in the Town Offices complex:

- A town resident was given permission to use rooms for educational seminars on five Thursdays, 4 to 6 p.m., from September 29 into December.
- The Richmond-West Stockbridge Artists' Guild was given permission to use rooms on Wednesday, October 19, 5:50 to 6 p.m. for an Artist-to-Artist program; on Wednesdays, November 2 and December 7, 4 to 8 p.m. for a demonstration and meeting; and on Thursdays, October 13 and November 10, 4 to 6 p.m., for positive critique sessions. The five meetings are open to the public.

#### Withdrawal from WiredWest

The Board of Selectmen voted to withdraw formally from WiredWest, having decided instead to partner with Charter and the Massachusetts Broadband Institute to provide high-speed Internet. Curt Wilton commented that this approach avoids taking on debt and is "free" except to the subscribers.

#### Other Business:

- Mark Webber said the town has received notice of a past fuel spill on the turnpike.
- The selectmen agreed to fill a vacancy on the Zoning Board of Appeals with Ed Sporn of High Street. Baker Street will be closed September 15 and 16 for full depth reclamation, which will make it a gravel road for two weeks before being paved.
- A resident of Oak Street asked for an update on no parking signs. Curt answered that parking a vehicle in a travel lane is an infraction. He will

research whether the signs are legal but advised that whether no parking signs are enforceable is up to the court.

#### **Transfer of Liquor License Public Hearing**

Acting as the local licensing board, the Board of Selectmen approved an application to transfer the all-liquor license from the Shaker Mill Tavern formerly owned by Dom Luchi to Shaker Mill Tavern Family Smoke House owned by Jim Hallock. Curt observed that the town had a few barrooms in the old days, but they have come and gone. The number of licenses allotted to a town is determined by population, and several are now available in West Stockbridge.

#### **Rent Control Board Public Hearing**

Acting as the Rent Control Board, the Board of Selectmen unanimously voted to authorize the owners of the Mill Pond Trailer Park (Pam Bartlett, Lois Gennari, Chris Gennari, Charlene Gennari, and Diane Lenhart) to proceed with evictions as petitioned. Of the four residents the owners want to evict, three have received notices and signed for them, and one has refused receipt. The three owners present said the tenants to be evicted have been notified and are still delinquent. Curt said the outstanding rents of \$241 per month have been unpaid for five to six months. Mark said that this is his first eviction hearing in West Stockbridge, but that he has learned proper procedures in the other town where he works.

Asked if they had any other issues, the owners said they have a problem with unregistered vehicles parked in the park. The selectmen said that the owners should contact West Stockbridge Police to ticket the vehicles. After three tickets, the vehicles can be towed. Curt said that the Highway Department has pulled a lot of cars out of the bushes.



#### Election 2016 Tuesday, November 8

West Stockbridge Town Clerk Ronni Barrett wants voters to know:



- ❖ Early voting will begin statewide on October 24 and end November 4. During that period early voting will be available to all registered voters at the town clerk's office during regular office hours Tuesdays and Thursdays, 1:30 to 4 p.m., and also on Saturday, October 29, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m.
- Polls will be open at the Town Offices on Election Day, November 8, 7 a.m. to 8 p.m.
- Requests for absentee ballots may be made in writing using forms provided outside the town clerk's office and available online. Reasons for absentee voting are absence from town on Election Day, physical disability preventing you from getting to the polling place, or religious belief. The deadline to apply for an absentee ballot is noon the day before the election, but it is recommended that applications be submitted as soon as practicable. #### October History Quiz Question:

West Stockbridge has always been very proud of having the first railroad in Western Massachusetts (1838). For over 120 years, the railroad ran through the center of town. It employed many residents and was an important component of our local industries. Limestone and crushed lime were shipped to the Hudson River and west, and milk was sent to New York City. We received bulk feed and coal for the farms, and even California grapes during Prohibition for local wine and grappa. The railroad was also convenient to commute to school in Pittsfield or to church services in Albany, for example.

Railroads also had a downside. Smoke, air pollution, and track fires were common. However, the biggest problem was the danger of hitting or being hit by a train. The mass and momentum of an engine and string of cars, loaded or unloaded, meant that anything hitting a train didn't come out well. Over the years a number of accidents involving the train occurred, but one was probably the most tragic. When was it, and what were the circumstances?



## Mindful Eating: Apples—Not Just Delicious, Anymore!

I have *always* loved the fall. Since I was a young woman, I welcomed fall graciously by lighting fall-scented candles, cooking and baking seasonal delights, and going apple picking. I love visiting the apple orchard, sitting on bales of hay on an old red farm tractor, and knowing that at the end of my visit, I will have a variety of delicious and nutritious treasures—apples! Here in the Berkshires, many varieties of apples are grown locally. I cannot think of anything that symbolizes fall more than the apple. OK, well maybe the pumpkin comes in a close second!

Apples are wonderful in sweet dishes like pies, turnovers, and cakes, but they are also appealing in savory dishes accompanying roast pork, in soups, and especially delicious are apples and onions. It's not surprising that apples are good for you too. They are a good source of both insoluble and soluble pectic fiber, vitamin C, and potassium. But the real powerhouse nutrients are the apple's antioxidants found predominantly in the skin. Quercetin is the primary antioxidant, along with catechin. These antioxidants may play a vital role in protecting against heart disease and cancer, in helping prevent blood sugar spikes, and in boosting our immune system.

Apples aren't just Delicious (i.e., the variety). They come in many sizes, colors, and flavors. This list is adapted from the U.S. Apple Association and PickYourOwn.org:

**Braeburn:** Yellow and blush with red stripes; crisp firm bite; balance of sweet and tart flavors; great for baking and snacking.

**Cortland:** Dull red apple with soft white flesh; juicy all-purpose apple; great in salads due to low browning.

**Empire:** Cross between McIntosh and Red Delicious; firm, round, and red; crisp, sweet, and tart; great cooking apple.

Fuji: Blush red apple with yellow stripes; sweet, spicy, and crisp; great for snacking, salads, and freezing.

**Gala:** Red-orange, yellow-striped apple; very sweet, juicy, and crisp; great for snacking, salads, and baking.

**Ginger Gold:** Green-yellow apple has a slight blush; sweet, tangy, and juicy; great all-purpose apple; good on salads due to low browning.

**Golden-Delicious:** Yellow-green apple; crisp and juicy; holds up well to cooking; also a good eating apple.

**Granny Smith:** Bright green apple with occasional pink blush; crispy and very tart; sweetens up somewhat when cooked; great in savory dishes; also good for baking, snacking, and salads.

**Honeycrisp:** Mottled red over a yellow background; sweet, tart, and crisp; a good all-purpose apple (one of my favorites).

**Idared:** Light red apple; sweet, tart, and tangy; white firm flesh; best for snacking and sauces.

**Jazz:** Cross between Royal Gala and Braeburn; very sweet; great for eating, applesauce, and apple butter.

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

**Jonagold:** Red with yellow-orange stripes; rich and full-flavored; good all-purpose apple. Season: October to May.

Jonathan: Light red stripes over yellow or deep red; tender and juicy; good for snacking, pies, and sauce.

**Macoun:** Deep red over a green base; named best tasting apple by many; juicy white flesh with a more complex flavor of strawberries, honey, and spice; can be used in cooking but best eaten off the tree; tends not to store well.

**McIntosh:** Red and green; most tender-fleshed apple; a favorite New England apple; best for snacking, sauce, and apple butter.

**Northern Spy:** Larger deep red apple with red stripes; strong sweet flavor and crisp texture; good for eating, drying, and juicing.

**Paula Red:** Firm-fleshed red apple with yellow stripes; sweet, and tart flavor with hint of strawberry; good eating and cooking apple, especially for sauce. Does not store well.

**Pink Lady:** Pink-blush color over green apple; firm, crisp, and honey-sweet; good for eating, cooking, and sauce. Keeps for several months in refrigeration.

**Red Delicious:** Top-heavy apple, striped to solid red; most popular U.S. apple; sweeter and juicier when grown in New England; creamy white soft flesh and best for snacking and salads.

Our New England fall offers some of the best tasting apples you can sink your teeth into, not just *Delicious* apples, but many varieties! Remember to include the skins when you eat an apple because they contain much of the nutrition. Apple juice is not a good substitute because it usually contains added sugar and no fiber.

Happy fall—pick and enjoy APPLES!










## West Stockbridge Cultural Council Invites Grant Proposals for 2017



Her talk will include an introduction about coffee sourcing all over the world, visiting growers, how coffee grows, history, roasting coffee in house (the process), and coffee preparation.



#### Remembering Herbert J. Stein

1917-2016

Herbert J. Stein of West Stockbridge, Massachusetts, and Miami, Florida, died at his apartment in Miami on April 20, 2016, at 98 years old.


Born August 30, 1917, Herbert was raised by parents Augusta and Barnet in the Bronx, New York, and graduated from New York University at The Heights in 1938.

A CPA by training, Herbert worked in the home furnishings textiles business for most of his life. In 1966 he formed a company to represent the best European textile mills at his showroom in New York. He retired only when he was well into his 80s.

Herb was known for his bon vivant spirit. He loved music—especially opera—and played classical piano. He was an avid skier and raced International One Design sailboats for years. Herb eagerly and continually traveled the world well in to his 98th year. Herb loved and admired the five women who accompanied him through life until 2015—wives Marjorie Goldstein and Naomi Daniel, and partners Dana Jacobi, Muriel Russell, and Muriel Rudolph.

Following retirement, Herbert collected, designed, and constructed large outdoor sculptures that he erected on his estate in West Stockbridge.

He is survived by daughter Ellen Weaver, son Barney Stein, grandson Marc Davies, great-grandsons Zach, Owen, and Sam Davies, "bio-grandson" Nuriel Gutman, "second son"/caretaker since 2013, Kreston Johnson, and canine companion, Jimmie.

"I never meant to be a painter. It just happened. I learned about form and color during my years as a sculptor and potter. I carved marble and alabaster, created clay vessels, learned what makes colors sing, and drew and drew and drew, slowly learning how lines twist and turn and dance across paper, turning into forms, becoming sacred spaces containing endless puddles of color. Matisse, van Gogh, O'Keeffe, Calder, Kelly, Klee, Miro, Kandinsky, and the Fauves all inspire me, and of course David Hockney, who introduced me to the wonders of painting on the iPad.

"Whether with paint, on paper, or finger painting on an iPad screen, my work is always the same: an exploration of line and color, pattern and light, density and transparency. I don't have any preconceived idea of where the painting is going or what it will look like when it is finished."

Nina Lipkowitz received her degree in art history and later studied almost everything offered at the Art Students League. She has been a sculptor, a potter, a painter, and a yoga teacher. Today, living in Great Barrington, MA, she has found her voice painting watercolors and cutting-edge abstract iPaintings painted in light on the touch screen of her iPad and printed as limited edition archival pigment prints. 
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

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#### West Stockbridge History Quiz Answer:

West Stockbridge had the branch line that connected Boston and Albany at State Line to the New Haven Railroad in Housatonic. While there were regular passenger trains, by the mid-1900s the line carried primarily freight. The trains didn't always run on a predictable schedule. Although they didn't travel that fast, you had to be careful around the tracks. The railroad had a few major road crossings: Baker Street, Albany Road, Main Street, Moscow Road, and Great Barrington Road. Modern gates and flashing signals, common today, didn't exist, only unlit crossing signs.

On Christmas evening 1940, a young Connecticut husband and wife were driving north on Albany Road (Route 41). The rail line crossed Albany Road just before the bridge that feeds Flat Brook into the Shaker Mill Pond. The spot was known as Elkay's Crossing and had a reputation for being tricky. Locals knew to be careful there.

As a switch engine was approaching from the south (town center), the auto stopped, waiting for it to pass. For some reason, the driver started up when the engine hadn't completed going through the crossing, and the car was hit and dragged about 100 feet along the embankment. The wife was killed instantly and the husband critically injured.

This accident had a number of especially tragic components: Christmas night and the husband was only 23 years old, a student at Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute in Troy. His wife graduated from Vassar College in June and they were recently married. The train crew were local, Harold McDermott and Frank Johnson. Investigation by Deputy Sheriff Garrett Troy, and later the railroad, cleared the crew of any wrongdoing.

There were other accidents on the line during its existence, but this one was the saddest. The *Berkshire Eagle* and *Berkshire Courier* both carried letters of condolences from the community. The railroad through West Stockbridge was abandoned in 1961 and the tracks removed in 1964. Flashing lights and gates were never installed at Elkay's Crossing.


