The Shaker Mill Barn: An Historic Structure Put to New Use

For generations of locals, the Shaker Mill has been a landmark structure in the center of town adjacent to the dam and bridge crossing Shaker Mill Pond. Now, thanks to the vision and creativity of Shaker Mill Books owner Eric Wilska, it has taken on new life as a "playful and whimsical" addition to the bookstore.

The story goes back to 1805 when Enoch Thayer moved two barns to the site and joined them together to create a grist mill (for grinding grain into flour). Shakers purchased the property in 1818 and operated the mill until 1851. A later owner used electric power generated by the dam on the Williams River to power the mill and provide the town with electric lights.

Arthur Baldwin purchased the mill in 1933 to use as a hardware, feed, and lumber business. Then, for several decades beginning in the 1970s, the building served as an antique shop. In 2013, Eric Wilska bought the four-story barn along with the adjacent building on Depot Street, to house a bookstore. The adjacent building became Shaker Mill Books that boasts an extensive collection of used, rare, and out-of-print books.

Now the barn has been opened to the public to showcase, as Eric puts it, "Great books in no particular order in a great old building." The building is, indeed, extraordinary and a history lesson in itself: a celebration of the timber framer's art with massive beams and numerous artifacts from over 200 years of use.

More than 50,000 books are stored in the upper reaches, and the ground floor (open to the public) features an

eclectic selection of books for sale including many great bargains, cleverly displayed to take advantage of the architecture and historical artifacts. A cozy reading area offers comfortable chairs and

a grand view of the dam, spillway, and Williams River just yards away.

Assisted by employees Lauren Losaw and Jeff Wheeler, Eric is planning events for the barn including readings, art, music, and movies. Now through mid-October (when the unheated building will have to close un-

til spring), weekend visitors can watch bookbinder Ken Gilbert at work repairing valuable old books. Currently, open hours are 11 to 4 Sunday through Thursday and 11 to 5 on Friday and Saturday. September History Quiz Question:

In 1852, Massachusetts was the first state to legislate compulsory primary-level education. (Mississippi was the last state in 1918.) This law did not seem to be a burden in West Stockbridge because our first district schools were established in 1826. Before that, the most basic education was provided by the Congregational Church, heavy on Bible studies and religious education.

By 1826 West Stockbridge had set up school districts located in and around the town's hamlets. (No school buses and travel on dirt roads made consolidation difficult then.) The school year was based on the farming season because the children were needed for planting and harvest chores. Also, winter weather could mean many "snow days" off. Some homes also set up so-called private schools, basically home schools to teach reading and writing skills to the neighborhood children. Childhood education was rudimentary and practically based for future farmers and quarry workers.

What was the status of schooling in West Stockbridge when this compulsory education law was passed in 1852?







You Win Some, You Lose Some...

To sell a property that has a private "sewage disposal system," a.k.a. septic system, the system must be inspected by a licensed Title V inspector. (Title V is the Massachusetts law governing septic system installation and maintenance.)

As my faithful readers know, we're in the process of building a new house in town, and we're hoping to sell our current house next spring. So we contacted Korey Leonard, a Title V inspector from Mt. Everett Sanitation, in a proactive move. We were due to have the tank pumped out anyway (every 3 years is recommended), so we decided to have our Title V inspection done now.

Korey's crew arrived to uncover the tank and check out the field. The 1,000-gallon tank and so-called dry well were installed in 1988 by Marshall Gaston, a local excavator and septic system installer. It worked just fine for 30 years, so we certainly got our money's worth out of it. But the drywell (where the liquids from the tank are dispersed into a gravel-lined pit) failed the inspection. That called for a—gasp—new septic system.

To locate the new leach field (the modern equivalent of the drywell, where the liquids, or leachate, from the septic tank are dispersed harmlessly into the ground), Korey returned with Mike Parsons (of Kelly Granger Parsons, civil engineers and surveyors in Great Barrington). Mike and Korey (along with a backhoe operator) were joined by our Board of Health agent Earl Moffat to do a perc (short for percolation) test in our yard.

The perc test determines the ability of the soil to absorb and disseminate the leachate coming from the septic tank. One or two deep pits are dug, about 6 to 8 feet deep, to show the engineer, the inspector, and the health agent the likely groundwater level and the composition of the soil. Then a shallow hole is made at the level just below the topsoil layer, and a pipe with inch gradations is inserted in the dirt. The soil is soaked with water (Mike brought his own special Great Barrington water!), and then the pipe is filled. The number of minutes it takes for 3 inches of the water to be absorbed into the soil determines the quality of the perc. The first test was 28 minutes. Not great, but it would pass. But a leach field placed there would have to be larger to handle the slower perc.

The second test, uphill from the first, was quite good, 2.3 minutes. But putting the leach field there would mean cutting down several trees, and because the field was uphill from the tank, it would require an additional chamber between the tank and field. In this chamber is a pump that—um—pumps the liquids uphill to the new field. It would add about \$4,000 to the system including the wiring for the pump and an alarm in case it fails.

The third test was, as Goldilocks would have said, *just right*. An 8-minute perc, and it appeared it could be gravity fed from the tank! And best of all, it meant that much of our treasured plantings and trees could be saved.

Mike could now design a new system for that spot, and Korey could install it, clean up, and reseed the grass. The cost for a new system depends on how much sand and fill is required, as well as whether pump chambers, new tanks, distribution boxes, and channels are required. The range is anywhere from about \$12,000 to \$30,000. Start buying lottery tickets now.

In the meantime, over at the new house site, excavation began! Thanks to Andy Williams of Chris Williams Excavating and his crew, there's a big hole in the ground where our new house will go. And Andy is also a licensed Title V installer, so he'll be doing our new septic system as well.

History Quiz Answer:

According to Joseph Holland's 1855 History of Western Massachusetts, West Stockbridge had five primary schools in the hamlets and one primary and two higher schools in the town center. The census during that time shows many children, both immigrant and native born, attending school. West Stockbridge also had two private schools for men and one for young ladies.

In this recently discovered 1854 advertisement, the West Stockbridge Academy was one of the two male private schools. It was promoted as a college preparation instructional program or "for any of the active pursuits of life." The advertisement encouraged pupils from outside the area with boarding and railroad access.

Nathan Benjamin, the academy principal (and major selling attraction), belonged to the prominent Egremont Benjamin family. Nathan was a graduate of Williams College class of 1850, and although he lived in Egremont, he managed to run the private men's school in West Stockbridge. We don't know exactly where in town the West Stockbridge Academy was located; however, there are some references to private schools above the Queensborough store and Stone House Realty buildings.

In August 1862, Nathan enlisted in the 131st New York Volunteers as a first lieutenant at age 32. He was killed in a frontal assault of a Confederate battery in the Battle of Port Hudson, Louisiana, in June 1863.






