

Board of Selectmen Meeting Summaries

Open Meeting: March 27, 2017

Annual Town Caucus

Joe Roy, Jr. chaired the caucus, announcing for each position the incumbent candidate and asking if there were additional nominees. Bernard Fallon was nominated for Board of Selectman, Andrew Fudge for Planning Board, Michael Skorput for Board of Health, Ed Denham and Andrew Fudge for tree warden [Editor's note: Ed Denham subsequently declined the nomination]. Two vacancies remained for constable. Three volunteers were nominated for the Vacancy Committee: Evie Kerswell, Karen Zick, and Andrew Fudge.

Budget and Annual Town Meeting Warrant Review

The budget is complete except for the Buildings and Grounds position (Dom Luchi has resigned). This year's tax rate is about the same as last year. Mark Webber said all departments got their reports in on time.

Open Meeting: April 3, 2017

Budget and Annual Town Meeting Warrant Review

The fiscal year 2018 tax bill is \$5,059,438, a decrease of \$46,000, or about 1% less compared to fiscal 2017, which Curt Wilton labeled "amazing" and "good news." The warrant was approved and passed unanimously.

Other items:

- Mark Webber reported that Turn Park has requested a one-day liquor license for its opening celebration on May 14.
- Bob Thibeault asked if the town bathrooms will be open on May 14. There was discussion of the role of the custodian and of forcing a funding item onto the town meeting warrant. No action was taken.
- Evie Kerswell asked the selectmen (acting as the Rent Control Board) whether a response had been received from the Gennaris, the trailer park owners, The selectmen said they have not received a response.
- Dana Bixby asked the selectmen about how the Planning Board should handle the request to make Silvermine Lane a town road. The selectmen commented that other towns have made private roads public when approved by their planning boards, and West Stockbridge has done it for Iron Mine and Iron Ore Roads, but the benefits are only enjoyed by the residents on the road and none of the taxpayers.

Open Meeting: April 10, 2017

Police Department Update

Chief Marc Portieri reported that he has added a shift from 12 midnight to 8 a.m. Police are following school buses from 5 to 6 a.m. The selectmen accepted the chief's proposal to hire Tim O'Brien as a new part-time officer. Tim lives in Lanesboro and has paramedic expertise. Peter Skorput



said the Fire Department welcomes Tim's medical assistance. Earl Moffatt welcomed Tim, noting that he is replacing an officer that the department lost. The police have ordered the Plymouth County parking ticket system and plan to go forward with it.

Fiscal Year 2018 Budget and Annual Town Meeting Warrant

The selectmen signed the warrant and noted that the fiscal year 2018 spending budget is down about \$100,000 from 2017 due to lower school enrollment. The Finance Committee has reviewed and approved the budget. A petition article was put in as submitted.

Fire Department Operations

Chief Peter Skorput and the selectmen discussed the status and maintenance of the town's 12 so-called dry fire hydrants. A dry hydrant gets water from an unpressurized pipe connected to a pond or stream; wet hydrants get water from a pipe attached to a pressurized piped water system. West Stockbridge has 12 dry hydrants and no wet hydrants.

The Fire Department tests the water available from hydrants with a meter. Earl and Peter discussed addressing hydrants that don't work well or have not been tested. The selectmen suggested performing drill contests such as a Tanker Shuttle practice where filling and emptying a tanker is timed and a Jaws of Life drill contest on a vehicle. Curt Wilton asked Peter to use this review as a guide to improve and hone Fire Department skills.

In response to Paula Farrell's question about how much the town pays Peter, Curt responded, "very little" but said that Peter could ask for more. Curt said he would love to give Peter more money and a secretary if he asked for it.

Other items:

• Curt said he would like to return the buildings and grounds superintendent position (now vacant) to the way it used to be, with a part-time custodian caring for the Town Offices and a grounds person working full time with the Highway Department.

• Curt reported that Lenox Road is closed for resurfacing following the water line replacement.

• There was discussion about responsibility for the condition of side-walks by the turnpike entrance and State Line Road. \Box



The main reason I decided to toss my hat into the tree warden and Planning Board races is pretty straightforward: I want to give back to the community in a meaningful and tangible way.



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Chamber Players Kick Off Summer Music Season with Benefit Concert for 1854 Town Hall Restoration

On Friday, May 26, at 6 p.m., in what is bound to be another standing-room-only event, Boston Symphony Orchestra members Sheila Fiekowsky, violin; John Holland, violin; Daniel Getz, viola; Oliver Aldort, cello; and Edwin Barker, double bass; will join Linda Toote, flute; and Catherine Hudgins, clarinet, in a concert of thrilling chamber music.

Curated by artistic director Catherine Hudgins, this program will include some rarely heard pieces: Jennifer Higdon's *Soliloquy* for Clarinet and String Quartet; Samuel Barber's String Quartet, Op. 11; Antonín Dvořák's Terzetto in C major, Op. 74; Jerod Impichchaachaaha' Tate's *Toklo (Two)* for American Indian Flute and Clarinet; and Osvaldo Golijov's *Lullaby and Doina*.

The concert not only kicks off the summer musical season, but also the next phase of the West Stockbridge Historical Society's campaign to turn the 1854 Town Hall, which anchors West Stockbridge's downtown, into a community center, history museum, and acoustically perfect home for the West Stockbridge Chamber Players.

Okay, neighbors, let's see what's in the old Home Front fake mail bag today. Ah, here's a question from A.L. She asks, "*Which projects require a building permit?*"

According to the Massachusetts State Building Code (780 CMR, Section R105.1), building permits are required to "construct, reconstruct, alter, repair, remove, or demolish a building or structure; or to change the use or occupancy of a building or structure; or to install or alter any equipment for which provision is made or the installation of which is regulated by the Massachusetts State Building Code." So you need a permit issued by the town building department if you want to do the following, among others:

- Construct a new habitable structure or an accessory outbuilding larger than 200 sq ft
- Make any structural changes, such as moving a wall or load-bearing support
- Change or install a window or door (including storm windows) or skylight
- Install new shingles or apply new insulation, sheetrock, or new siding
- Put in a swimming pool
- Add or alter a fireplace or wood-burning appliance
- Do other building, repairs, or alterations listed on the town website "application instructions"

Also, if electric or plumbing need to be upgraded, separate permits are needed, although because these changes must be performed by licensed professionals, they'll take care of the permits as part of their services.

As a homeowner, you can apply for your own permit, but you assume the liability for having the work done properly, and it's usually safer to have a licensed contractor handle this for you. Per the Building Code, "The building permit is your assurance that whatever is done under its description complies with current codes, and thus, is safe, legal, efficient, and meets quality standards sometimes called 'workmanlike."

There is a category of work called "ordinary repairs," such as painting, landscaping, and tiling, that are not structural or do not affect egress, fire protection, or energy conservation, for example. If you're not sure you need a permit, talk to the West Stockbridge building inspector, Brian Duvall, whose hours are at the Town Offices, Saturdays from 10 to 1.

A.L. also asks, "Do I need an architect for, say, a small addition?"

As long as you can provide three sets of clear plans showing details of the proposed construction, you don't *need* to hire an architect. Many local designers and contractors who offer design/build services can do construction drawings. You do need someone with both the construction knowledge of what *can* be built along with a design sense of what will make your small addition look and feel great. Licensed architects and structural engineers are often called in to do calculations that are not plainly covered in the building code—situations where unusual structural loads require steel I-beams or the like. And architects may have a more experienced "eye" for what will work in a situation.

But if your drawings can clearly show setbacks (distance from the proposed structure to property lines), floor plans (with dimensions, points of egress, smoke detection, etc.), elevations (what the structure looks like from the outside), and sections (slices of the proposed showing structural details like piers, headers, wall thickness, rafters, etc.), most building inspectors will approve the project.

Don't forget to check in with the Conservation Commission and the Board of Health (if you're adding a bedroom that increases the demand on the septic system).






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Mud Day News!

West Stockbridge History Quiz Answer:

In the early 1800s, our first wave of immigrants was from Lower (or French) Canada, now the province of Quebec. They came to cut charcoal for the Richmond Furnace, and some worked in the iron mines that were just starting to develop. Lower Canada at that time was fully under the control of England, and power rested with the Anglo merchants in Toronto and Montreal. Lower Canada was not a booming economic area and in some cases actively discriminated against. The newly formed United States had a growing economy and offered a work opportunity in fields they knew, lumbering and charcoal production. The early census did not list them as citizens or even temporary residents, so the actual count is hard to determine.

The second and larger group was the Irish immigrants

who came in the 1840s and 1850s as a result of famine, discrimination, and economic hardship in Ireland. Looking at the 1850 and 1860 U.S. census, their impact on our town seems significant. The 1850 census was the first year that country of origin was listed, and 152 people listed Ireland as their place of birth. The town's total population was 1,702. Digging deeper, most of the 152 were men, working as laborers in the lime and iron quarries, as farmhands, or as so-called washwomen. Very few were children. They were our industrial workforce.

By 1860 our Irish immigrant population had increased to 200, and the total number of people in town was down to 1,580. The profile continued to be mostly adults, primarily quarry laborers, some farm workers, and servants. It appears that our mining industries could not have thrived without the Irish laborers. When the Freedley quarry shut down in 1867 after a major accident, the five workers killed were Irish immigrants.

The third wave of immigrants was the Italians. According to the 1920 census, 129 people of our population of 1,058 identified Italy (or Italy/Austria) as their place of birth; many of those were children and housewives. The men worked in the lime or iron quarries or as laborers for the railroad. By 1924 the U.S. Immigration Act had imposed quotas by country, and Italian immigration was severely restricted. After that our Italian population grew more through our own growth and not through immigration.


