Local Talent Key to Building Turn Park Art Space

With its opening scheduled for May 2017, the Turn Park Art Space (named as a word play on "turnpike") on Moscow Road is taking shape. The gatehouse and parking lot are especially handsome lit up at night, and two large sculptures are already installed. One aspect of the project that may not have received sufficient attention is the significant role played by local businesses, artisans, and professionals.

The master plan, architectural plan, and landscape design were developed by Moscow-based designer and artist Alexander Konstantinov in collaboration with Grigori Fateyev of AF Architecture. Fateyev has designed multiple residential, commercial, and municipal projects in Berkshire and Columbia Counties. In addition to his work as an architect, he will serve as a director for Turn Park Art Space.

Steve Mack of Foresight Land Services, who designed the downtown West Stockbridge sidewalk and street crossing project, did the civil engineering for Turn Park. Based in Pittsfield, Foresight Land Services provides clients in the four-state Berkshire region with coordinated engineering, surveying, planning, and environmental permitting services. Vern Tower of Tower Stone, a marble-cutting and stone fabrication firm in Richmond, built the amphitheater designed by Alexander Konstantinov. Tower is an accomplished stone mason and marble historian with 40 years of experience. His expertise ranges from fine art to engineering; stone cutting, setting, restoration and preservation; and land-scape design and heavy construction.

Landscape architect and stonemason Jon Piasecki assisted Tower in building the amphitheater. Piasecki's design/build company, Golden Bough, is located in West Stockbridge. His sculptural earth and stonework are widely recognized nationally and internationally.

Fateyev recognized the following local businesses and individuals who also helped to bring the project to fruition:

- Lori Rose and Randy Thunfors of Stone House Properties of West Stockbridge and lawyer Lori Robbins with Heller and Robbins who facilitated the purchase of the property.
- Allegrone Construction of Pittsfield with Jim Culliton, principal in charge, Brian Turton and Aaron Singer as project managers, along with the rest of their talented team.

- Billy Kie's West Center Construction Company in West Stockbridge carried out the "terraforming project" where most of the land in the park was reshaped according to plan, a "gargantuan effort."
- The West Stockbridge Board of Selectmen and Planning Board supported the project.
- The law firm of Hellman, Shearn and Arienti in Great Barrington, especially Catherine Chester and David Hellman, spearheaded the approvals.
- Gardener/Landscape designer Naomi Blumenthal helped select a grass mix, trees, and shrubs for the project and provided planting assistance and instructions.
- Bill Barry of Barry Engineers & Constructors in Pittsfield oversaw structural engineering; Hesnor Engineering Associates of North Adams provided mechanical, electrical, and plumbing plans.

Turn Park Historical Background

According to West Stockbridge Historical Society president Robert Salerno, the Turn Park site on Moscow Road was once the Bona family farm. The quarry on the site produced limestone. Moscow Road became a town road in 1930 or 1931. Where the name Moscow Road came from seems to be completely unknown. Grigori Fateyev speculates the name derives from a "quarry shanty town populated mostly by Eastern European immigrants in the early part of the 20th century."

Lisa Landry and Flavio Lichtenstein purchased the property that includes the building that is now Six Depot Coffee Roastery and Café together with the 14-acre quarry. They then sold the quarry and surroundings to Turn Park founders Igor and Katya Gomberg. There is a story going around that the Gombergs chose the West Stockbridge site for their Russian sculpture park because it is on Moscow Road. Grigori says, "Not exactly! Igor and Katya did not realize the fortuitous name of the road until the purchase. They were attracted to the beauty of the quarry and the culturally rich Berkshires area."

Board of Selectmen Meeting Summaries

Open Meeting: October 24, 2016

Chief of Police Search

The selectmen announced two finalists for chief of police: Marc Portieri from Becket and John Carbone from Clinton, Connecticut. Curt Wilton thanked the members of the search committee, who narrowed the field of 24 original applicants, and he asked the selectmen to conduct their own independent follow-ups on the candidates and to schedule public interviews during the board's November 7 regular meeting.

Truck Plaza Solar PILOT

The town will receive \$30,000 per year for 20 years as a payment in lieu of taxes (PILOT) according to an agreement approved by town counsel and the town's principal assessor. There will be an additional 2% premium payment in each of the final 19 years. Curt called the solar power project and the payment agreement a huge gain for the town.

Other Business:

- Mark Webber told the selectmen that the replacement van will be delivered to the Council on Aging on or about November 3.
- Mark told the selectmen that the firm General Code of Rochester, New York, will give the town an estimate for codifying the town's bylaws.
- Curt informed the selectmen that the final toll ticket will be issued on October 28 at 10 p.m., after which decommissioning of Turnpike Interchange 1 will begin in earnest and will continue around the clock.

Open Meeting: November 7, 2016

Police Chief

Marc Portieri became the lone finalist after John Carbone, the other final candidate, withdrew. Marc has been a police officer for 24 years, mostly in Becket where he is a sergeant. He is a certified emergency medical technician (EMT), a graduate of Lee High School needing only six credits to get his associate's degree, and is married with three children.

Curt Wilton commented that Marc's small town background is what West Stockbridge needs. He wants Marc to make a commitment to one town "24/7/365" and to "get good men."

To Peter Skorput's question whether Marc would be available "at 2 a.m.," Marc, who lives 17 minutes away from town, answered, "Of course." Peter said he wants Marc to respond to all EMT and fire calls, and to interact with people, be visible, get to know young people, and serve as a deterrent if needed.

Public comments and questions:

Paula Farrell asked Marc if he would participate in community programs, and he said he would. Paula commented that police officers visiting the Farmers Market has "made a difference."

Joe Roy commented that merchants are happy with the police presence in response to the busy traffic downtown and the challenges of Main Street parking. Joe said there is a joke circulating that some West Stockbridge parkers "took their lessons on another planet."

One of the town's part-time police officers complimented Frank Murphy who has served as officer in charge and has set a good example in "getting out of the cruiser." Marc agreed that getting to know people is important.

The selectmen voted unanimously to hire Marc Portieri as chief of police. He is expected to start work in the second half of December 2016. His contract is pending negotiation.

Stockbridge Requests Assistance

The Stockbridge Board of Selectmen has requested help from Mark Webber in preparing next year's budget (there is a history of budget cooperation among the towns). Mark said he is willing if the task is limited in scope and time. All of the selectmen said they approved and are glad to help Stockbridge.

Winter Parking

Curt Wilton asked the *Local Yokel* to publish the town's winter parking ban, which extends from 11 p.m. to 7 a.m., November 1 through April 30. Curt also urged residents to clear their sidewalks and not to plow driveway snow onto the road.

Regional School District

Mark reported that the regional school district has provided a draft of proposed changes to the district funding plan. The district requests a date to review the plan and a special town meeting to vote on the plan.

Tree Warden

Mark informed the selectmen that a Robin Road resident is frustrated with the town tree warden's response about a tree: whether it is on town property and is a hazard. Curt said Tree Warden Jim Hallock needs to make a determination.

Cable Commission Resignations

Curt commented that the resignation of the cable commissioners was an "unfortunate situation" due to a "communications gap," requiring the selectmen to appoint new members to the cable commission. During discussion of the cable commission's responsibilities, Richard Squailia, who videos the Board of Selectmen meetings, said he is prepared to do the cable system Channel 2 programming.

Other Business:

- Mark reported that he will attend a public procurement recertification class
- Mark also reported that the Alcohol Control Commission has approved transfer of a liquor license to the Shaker Mill Tayern.

Winter Parking Ban

No overnight parking along town roads November 1 through April 30 from 11 p.m. to 7 a.m.

Young Artist Captures Heart of 1854 Town Hall **Restoration Campaign**

Zina Greene, a West Stockbridge Historical Society board member, decided she wanted to do something different—something graphic and engaging—for the solicitation she was sending out to raise funds for the

next phase of the 1854 Town Hall Restoration. "We're going to need to raise \$100,000 to match a state grant we're applying for. That's a big amount, and I knew I had to get people's attention. Another letter was just not going to do it."

She had an idea of what she wanted—an image of a heart that represented the goodwill and contributions that people have already made to the restoration and why their

ongoing support is so important. "The campaign's been about community from the very beginning," Zina explained. "And I wanted something that would illustrate that idea in a straightforward and meaningful way." She asked Lee Appelbaum, director of the West Stockbridge library, if she knew of anyone who could help her with the project. Lee immediately thought of Adam Boscarino, a 14-year-old freshman at Monument Mountain Regional High School and a West Stockbridge resident, who volunteers at the library and is a gifted artist.

After meeting with Zina and discussing the concept, it didn't take Adam long to come up with a rough draft of exactly what was wanted. He and Zina shared it with members of the West Stockbridge Historical Society's board, who loved it, and then Adam worked to refine and finalize the artwork. Printed in bright colors, the mailing piece featuring Adam's drawing arrived in the mailboxes


December History Quiz Question:

The fourth one is the most interesting, the Rockdale Cemetery located on Route 41 two miles south of town, north of Pixley Hill and Glendale Roads. 



Mindful Eating:

Keeping on Track This Holiday Season A Guide to Mindful Eating, Drinking, and Being Merry

Hard to believe it is holiday time again with more parties, more eating, and less physical activity. Weight gain during the holidays is a universal concern, according to a study in the New England Journal of Medicine that looked at weight gain during Christmas in Japan, Germany, and the United States. The first 10 days after Christmas led to the highest weight gain in all three countries. Although participants lost half the weight gained almost immediately after the holiday, the other half of the weight remained well into summer and even longer. Repeating this year after year can lead to an ever-expanding waistline and increased health risk.

Consider these helpful strategies:

- Start today: Studies show that people who keep a food journal lose twice as much weight as those who do not. Use a online calorie tool to figure out how many calories you should be consuming to maintain your weight. Tracking means accountability—you think before you put something in your mouth. For accuracy in tracking, measure portions too.
- **Keep it light on party days:** During the day of a party, eat light by choosing fruit and vegetables, salads without heavy dressing, and limiting grains and high-fat, high-sugar foods.
- ❖ Move more: The American Heart Association recommends that adults get 150 minutes per week of moderately vigorous or 75 minutes of vigorous exercise to promote health and weight management. Activities such as walking briskly, bicycling, and doubles tennis is moderate; running, aerobics, singles tennis, and uphill hiking are considered vigorous activity. Choose activities you like so you stick with it, and remember that fun activities such as sledding and ice skating count too. Even snow shoveling counts!
- ❖ Cook and bake a little healthier: Making a few substitutions can cut fat, sugar, and calories. Replace ½ cup of butter (one stick) with ¼ cup plus 2 tablespoons of olive or canola oil and ¾ cup butter with ½ cup plus 1 tablespoon oil. Use low-fat cream cheese, sour cream, or milk. Use up to half the sugar in a recipe, but add vanilla, cinnamon, or other spices to intensify flavor. For savory substitutions, try lean prosciutto instead of bacon, leaner loin cuts of beef, and dark leafy lettuces instead of iceberg. Choose whole-wheat pasta, brown rice, and more vegetarian recipes and limit salt but not taste by adding fresh herbs, spices, and citrus zests.
- Slow down: Most of us have "fast-eating syndrome" (I know I do). Research shows that those who eat quickly do not register that they are full, which promotes overeating. And those who eat slower tend to eat fewer calories and stay full longer. This is the basis of mindful eating. Slow down, put less on your fork, and put your fork down between bites. Take the next bite only after you've swallowed completely and enjoy every bite! Perfect advice during the holiday season in many ways: slow down!
- ❖ Lastly, imbibe reasonably: People tend to drink more during the holidays but forget the calories that beverages contain. A 1.5-ounce shot of liquor, 5 ounces of wine, and a regular 12-ounce beer have about 100, 120, and 150 calories, respectively. Plus many holiday drinks are very calorically dense like alcoholic eggnog, a creamy white Russian, or mulled wine that contain between 300 and 400 calories in just 1 cup, over 250 calories, and over 200 calories, respectively. Choose a smaller glass and mix with club soda or just a splash of juice or make trade-offs like exchanging eggnog for a dessert. Know your limits, drink plenty of water, and drink reasonably and responsibly.

Incorporating some or all of these strategies will help you stay on track for a mindful holiday season. Good luck and happy holidays!

A reception will follow the concert, where the audience will have the opportunity to mingle with the musicians.




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Alchemy to Perform at No. 6 Depot

Recipe Corner by Lynn Ryan

CRANBERRY CHRISTMAS CAKE

Yield: Up to 16 servings

A very simple old-fashioned recipe. Sometimes simple is better, and this cake is delicious!

3 eggs 2 cups sugar ³/₄ cup butter (1½ sticks), softened 1 tsp. Baldwin's vanilla 2 cups all-purpose flour 12 oz. fresh cranberries

Preheat oven to 350° F. With a mixer, beat the eggs with the sugar until slightly thickened and light in color, about 5 to 7 minutes. The mixture should be almost double in size. The eggs work as a leavening agent, so don't skip this step. It should form a ribbon when you lift the beaters out of the bowl. Add the butter and vanilla and mix 2 more minutes. Stir in the flour until just combined. Add the cranberries and stir well. Spread the batter in a buttered 9×13 pan. Bake 40 to 50 minutes or until lightly browned and a toothpick inserted comes out clean. Cut into small squares. Enjoy!

Burials in early New England were difficult in the rural areas. Initially many farms, particularly in the hill towns and in Berkshire County, had small family plots in the back of the property. As the population grew and churches were established, local cemeteries were established as part of the church property.

The Rockdale Cemetery, the second oldest after the one in West Center, is in many ways the most remote. It began as a family and neighborhood plot by the Slauter family. The Slauters had farms along the Williams River and operated a quarry and mill along Great Barrington Road, just north of the cemetery.

In 1813 they sold a half acre of land for their neighbors to use as a neighborhood cemetery and include the families of Williamsville, Freedleyville, and Rockdale. Many of the prominent families from the early 1800s are interred there. Spencer, French, Barnes, Boughton, Cobb, Kinne, Pixley, and Comstock are all early family names with prominent plots. (The earliest grave is 1783, likely transferred there from a family plot.)

The location is telling of how active and populated that area was back then. There were multiple dams along the Williams River. Williamsville and Rockdale had many manufacturing operations driven by the river. More people lived in that area than in

the town center. The nearest church was either over one hill in Stockbridge or up the other hill to West Center, both a long distance for a hearse to travel. Locating the cemetery there made sense.

As the town center grew and the Congregational Church became active there, a cemetery was established on the lawn next to it. (It was later relocated to the present town cemetery on Route 41.) The roads improved, the population shifted, and the Rockdale Cemetery was used less. It is now a quiet contemplative place with many interesting stones and markers.






