He is frequently seen in West Stockbridge interpreting the local street scenes and familiar landscapes in the area and is quite famous for painting directly from nature, or "en plein air."

This month, Walt's elegant oil paintings will be shown in the guild's Art on Main Gallery at 38 Main Street that will be open during two long weekends:





Walt says, "My inspiration for plein air painting comes from the works of the early 20th-century American impressionist painters, such as the New Englanders A.T. Hibbard and Emile Gruppe. Most of my paintings are done on location in New England, from the rolling hills of western Massachusetts and mountains of Vermont to the rugged coastline of northern Maine."

An avid student of the fleeting effects of light and shadow on the landscape, Walt's works depict a fusion of current observation and past experience gained from a lifetime of direct observation and painting in the natural world. He values the total experience of searching for a composition in various weather conditions and seasons, working with the material and equipment on location

to capture the effect of light on the landscape, and then making final adjustments to the composition and color in the studio. He finds winter especially interesting because of the bold patterns created by the light snow and dark background of trees and buildings. Because snow reflects the light from surrounding objects, its color can vary with location and time of day.

The Berkshire Hills continue to provide Walt with the perfect home base from which to regularly scout the backcountry, looking for sawmills, sugarhouses, streams, and small villages as subject matter for his paintings. More about Walt Pasko is available at www.paskofineart.com.

#### Board Meeting Minutes January 9, 2023

**Quorum present:** Select Board Members Kathleen Keresey, Chair, Andrew Potter and Andrew Krouss and Town Administrator Marie Ryan

Others Present: Building Commissioner Brian DuVal, Police Chief Marc Portieri and newly appointed Part-Time Police Officer Nate Sermini.

Kathleen called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM and listed Select Board members present.

Andy Potter made a motion, seconded by Andy Krouss, to approve the minutes from December 15 and December 19, 2022.

Roll Call Vote:KathleenYesAndy PotterYesAndy KroussYesMotion Approved.

**Citizen Speak:** None

#### **Building Commissioner Brian DuVal Update:**

Brian reported that inspections have been slow but that he has been busy with zoning enforcement violations in the past few months. He informed the Board that the State adopted new guidelines requiring the use the International Building Code standards in all municipalities in Massachusetts. The Town will need updated International Building code books, which will add about \$600 to Brian's FT24 budget.

Andy Potter asked Brian what his Town Hall office hours were. Brian responded that all permitting is completed in the online permitting system on the website, therefore, he has no set hours. However, by request, he will meet with people by appointment at Town Hall. Andy also inquired about the zoning enforcement complaint process. Brian explained the process as follows:

-A written complaint is received.

-Verification is completed that the person complaining has standing to file a complaint and that the complaint is creditable.

-Notification is sent to the complainant that Brian will be either begin an investigation or not.

-The property owner gets a written notification of the violation.

-The property owner has 30 days to either correct the violation or appeal.

The Board thanked Brian for his update.

#### Police Department Update and Appointment of Nate Sermini as Part-Time Officer:

Police Chief Marc Portieri gave an update of the Police Department from the past year. The Department has been very busy this past year. He stated that arrests, motor vehicle stops, fire calls, domestic abuse calls, disabled vehicle calls and road hazard calls were all up from the previous year.

Chief Portieri reported that the funding for traffic calming still has a balance to be used. This is due to new training requirements and staffing issues the past few months. The department began last year with 11 officers and currently has only 6. With only 6 officers remaining, shifts are not as easily filled to allow officers to attend trainings or work on traffic calming.

There have been new traffic control speed signs posted on Great Barrington Road which seem to be very effective. There have been a few complaints about the flashing lights by some residents which he and Curt Wilton, Director of Public Works, will address by changing the placement of the signs.

#### Vision Committee Update- Joe Roy, Jr.

Joe stated that the Vision Committee meets once a month and has been discussing many topics. Some of these topics include:

- -Sound Control/possible sound ordinance
- -Traffic, pedestrian, parking & crosswalk safety
- -Livability in West Stockbridge
- -Ways to sustain residents, young and old
- -Improvement of education due to the pandemic
- -Coordinate with all Boards/Committees
- -Indexing/listing of all permits needed in various zoning districts

Joe stated that there are two major items he wanted to bring before the Board today;

- 1. Negative effects that the pandemic has had on the education in the schools
- 2. EV charging stations in town

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Joe informed the Board that the Vision Committee is requesting feedback from the Select Board if they have any interest in either of these topics for further research. If the Select Board is interested, the Vision Committee is happy to research further and bring information back to the Board.

The Vision Committee would like to get information on how the schools are handling the education effects due to the pandemic. The Committee suggested that the Select Board have a meeting with the School Committee Representatives from West Stockbridge, School Superintendent Peter Dillon and the principals at the schools to see what is being done and what the towns could do to assist. The Board agreed this was a good idea and will do so in the near future.

Vision Committee member, Thom Lipiczky, has completed some research on EV charging stations and related that the cost will be approximately \$6,000-\$10,000 per station, which does not include the electrician costs. The stations would need to be located on Town property and have a specific type of electrical pole. There is still more research to be done. The Board agreed that this could be a good idea but they had concerns about the financial impact on the tax payers. The Board agreed they need more solid information before bringing this to a town meeting vote.

Kathleen mentioned that this type of project fits well with the planning being done by the Master Plan Committee, Complete Streets and Community Preservation Committee. She suggested that all the Committees keep working together.

Joe thanked the Board for their time and looks forward to continued productive meetings like this one.

#### Select Board Speak:

Andy Krouss informed the Board that Marie has submitted an application through Berkshire Regional Planning that will allow for more progress in Western Massachusetts on the broadband issues. He would also like to have the new HR person attend a meeting and give the Board for an update.

Kathleen made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Andy Potter at 7:05 PM.

## March History Quiz Question:

West Stockbridge in the early 1800s was a different place than our current town, considering both the obvious, like physical structures, roads, and the landscape, but also what things were called. We were a farming community on the edge of a "howling wilderness" with dirt paths linking to New York State and the Hudson River. Unfortunately, not too many detailed maps show names and places You didn't need a map because you didn't travel far from your farm, plus everyone knew where everyone lived. But by 1838, when the railroad was built, that began to change.

When you do find an early map, it is interesting to see the differences in placenames and actual features. Things people found important then might not be seen the same way now, nor how they were known. Two major bodies of water in the village center show differently in 1841 than now. What are they, and what are the differences?

## Random Thoughts and Crumpled Ravings on Mud Season

It's the annual mud season column from "On the Home Front"! As our climate gradually shifts, this period shows up on our calendars a week or so earlier than it used to—even 20 years ago. Back in the day (I get to say this since I'm officially an old codger), I remember an excavator friend who calculated April 8 as the day the frost left the ground. Nowadays excavation can be done pretty much through the winter. This past winter, as of mid-February when I'm writing this deathless prose, we've had 14 inches less snow than "usual" (a moving target, no doubt.)

But March is still mud season (despite the 50+ degree days we've had in February). I've had to clean up tracked-in mud from my shoes on more than one occasion already. And the lower part of my driveway has some serious ruts in it. The topping is "driveway mix," or "airport mix," an amalgam of crushed gravel and stone dust. For most of the year it's a hard solid surface. But this time of year, as the frost leaves the ground, it's a mix of quicksand (on warm days) and hard-as-concrete ruts on cold ones.

Many of the unpaved roads in our town have the condition, and our stalwart highway crew does its best to keep these passable. Sometimes these roads have to be closed to all but residents. I once remember driving north on Pixley Hill Road with my left tires stuck in a hard deep rut. And then, coming south, heading right toward me, I noticed a very large truck whose left tires were also traveling in the same rut. It was exciting.

Potholes are another feature of this time of year. The freeze-thaw cycle has its way with small holes, widening them as frozen water expands. You may have followed the lively exchanges about potholes in neighboring

Pittsfield in the Berkshire Eagle. Entertaining unless you happen to pop a tire or break an axle or lose a filling.

Frost heaves are caused by the same freeze-thaw cycle wherever water runs under the surface of the road. They can make the roadway as rippled as a washboard.

And as tempting as it is to fantasize about planting my vegetable garden, I try not to walk on my plots so as not to compact the soil. This past fall I followed the advice of master gardener and West Stockbridge resident Ron Kujawski and planted winter rye, which I plan to till under once mud season is past. Then I'll leave the crop to decay and release its nitrogen before planting, once danger of frost is past.

Here are some other mud season chores:

- Check gutters to clear them of winter debris so they'll operate well when the spring rains come.
- Tap your maple trees and boil down the sap for syrup. I think it takes about 40 gallons of sap for a gallon of syrup. (The freeze-thaw cycle of the days helps the sap rise.)
- Take off your snow tires as soon as the roads start to firm up.
- Watch the change in light! It's becoming much more noticeable now, with the sun rising and setting a bit higher in the sky each day. Groundhog Day (February 2) was the cross-quarter day, roughly midway between the winter solstice and the spring equinox. No matter whether the furry animal saw his shadow, the earth has traveled about half of the way between winter and spring, so to my final point:
- Celebrate spring, even if it might snow!

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
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## 8 Town Regional School District Planning Board Update

#### GET THE FACTS. BE INFORMED. YOU DECIDE.

**Merger Model under Consideration:** In April 2022, the 8 Town Board voted (16 to 6) to continue developing the model recommended by our research team: merging the Berkshire Hills Regional School District and the Southern Berkshire Regional School District into a single PreK–12 district, maintaining the existing elementary and middle schools as they are but creating a new merged 9–12 high school to be built on the Great Barrington campus.

**CVTE Focus:** Enhancing Career Vocational and Technical Education (CVTE) opportunities for South County students continues to be a high priority. In 2022, South County had only two Chapter 74 CVTE programs (automotive and horticulture, both offered at Monument Mountain), serving about 47 students. By comparison, more than 500 students are served by Chapter 74 CVTE programs in both North County and Central County.

Fifty percent of our high school graduates do not earn a college degree, and upon graduation, most of those do not earn a living wage. An 8-town merged district could more than triple our current Chapter 74 offerings, with up to six to eight comprehensive CVTE programs. A CVTE advisory group drawn from our local employers, schools, workforce/economic development groups, and colleges is evaluating over 16 possible CVTE programs, looking at local workforce needs, student interest, available partners, space requirements, and earning capacity. We expect to report that group's recommendations later this spring (For more information about CVTE, look for a link to the video on the RSDPB website home page, https://8towns.org.)

**Educational Visioning:** With support from the Barr Foundation, we have been working with two skilled facilitators to explore what possibilities community members see for a merged high school. At site visits, interviews, focus groups, and community gatherings, our facilitators have asked these questions:

- What are the strengths of the two districts?
- Where are the gaps?
- What might we be able to do better together? What innovations are possible?

An interactive in-person community session was held at the Sheffield Senior Center on January 21; a second session is scheduled at the Great Barrington Senior Center on March 18. A larger community meeting is targeted for mid-May. To register for the March 18 meeting, visit the RSDPB website home page, https://8towns.org.

**Continued Work on an 8 Town Regional School District Agreement:** Our 8 Town board continues to make solid progress on the governance and other operational provisions of an 8 Town regional agreement. The finance subcommittee continues to analyze various options for assessment methodologies for operating and capital costs, and that subcommittee expects to present recommended approaches to the full board in March.

**Timeline:** The complexity of the assessment methodology work has pushed our targeted date for a board vote back to April/May. This new timing works well with the input of Select Board members that if the RSDPB makes a recommendation to merge, it could be put before the voters at special town meetings this fall (rather than at the annual meetings in May/June) to allow sufficient time for presentation and discussion.





#### History Quiz Answer:

We recently came across an 1841 map of the Western Railroad, the main line from back east through Pittsfield, Richmond, and connecting to the Albany and West Stockbridge Railroad at State Line. The map (shown here) is fascinating. The few maps from that time just showed the rail line and station stops. This is one of the earliest maps showing details of West Stockbridge when the town had begun to transition from a farming to a quarrying center. Unlike other maps place-names, physical features and their major owners are listed.

Looking specifically at West Stockbridge, Crane Lake was called Tuller Pond after William Tuller, one of the early farmers in town. He was the first "fence viewer" when the town government was founded in 1774. (The fence viewer inspects new fences and settles disputes arising from trespass by livestock that have escaped enclosure. This was like our current Planning Board or building inspector?) William owned the land around most of the lake that was an important source of water for the early steam engines.

An earlier map of Indiantown (i.e., Stockbridge) shows Crane Lake as Great Quapuakuk. That roughly translates from Mahican into "at the place before the pond" or perhaps "at the pond before." It can also be translated, "as far as the pond." The first map with the name Crane Pond is the Woolford map of 1855. We have no record of who or how "Tuller" became "Crane," and the pond didn't become a "lake" until the 1900s.

The second noteworthy feature on the map is the shape of Shaker Mill Pond. The map shows it as a long skinny waterway with no label, not as wide as it is now. On the 1838 Barber engraving of the town, it is barely shown. On some of the early maps, it was titled "Mill Pond," and not until 1904 was it shown as "Shaker Mill Pond," long after the Shakers sold the mill.

Looking at the few early maps available, we find other roads, physical features, and inns that were deemed essential. They give us vital clues about what our town looked like and how it functioned 200 years ago.
