Citizen Speak:

Bob Salerno informed the Board that there has been a circle of old stones uncovered next to the Shaker Mill. He would like to have this real property secured and possibly on display as part of the Town's history. Bob will get more information and report back to the Board on a process to maintain these historical markers.

Planning Board and Master Plan Update - Dana Bixby

Dana Bixby state that the Planning Board has been working on two zoning bylaws, the Short-Term Rental Bylaw and the Accessory Dwelling Bylaw. They are close to completion and will require further public input. Dana will be sending a draft to the Select Board, the Building Commissioner and the Zoning Board of Appeals for input as well.

The Planning Board is working on an update to the Accessory Dwelling bylaw. The original bylaw was voted on in 1992 which requires a special permit for an in-law apartment on the

Annual Town Budget and Warrant Highlights FY 2024

To the Townspeople of West Stockbridge:

The Select Board and Finance Committee have worked extensively with the various town departments to control costs. Many thanks to those department heads who took great care to be as frugal as possible while striving to maintain the excellent services our townspeople expect.

The FY 24 total budget increased approximately 5% over last year's budget, mostly due to items beyond our control. School assessment, contract requirements, debt service increase, and rising costs for fuel and supplies added to the increase.

Where possible, we rolled over previous expenses, so the tax base wouldn't be charged again for items not spent. We also used free cash to ease capital costs where practical.

We have invested some of the budget to maintain the service level in the Protection, Personal & Property section. We are working on grants to offset those increases. We are also working to forecast and budget in the capital areas and thus avoid greater future capital costs for items like roads and equipment. This year will show a concerted effort to tap into new grant opportunities, as available.

A few articles in the town meeting warrant are new.

Article 10 asks for a vote to establish a special-purpose fund, called the Opioid Stabilization Fund. It allows the town to use money received in litigation against opioid manufacturers or distributors to counteract the opioid crisis affecting many of our communities.

Article 36 asks the town to make the first expenditure from the Community Preservation Fund. The current recommendation from the committee is to appropriate \$22,500 to the Historical Society to renovate two bathrooms in the Old Town Hall.

Article 41 calls for a vote to create an Affordable Housing Trust in West Stockbridge.

We look forward to a discussion of all of these topics at the annual town meeting on May 1.

The Candidates: In Their Own Words

Kathleen Keresey

Candidate for Select Board

I was born and raised in West Stockbridge, a proud fifth-generation resident. Following family tradition, it has been a privilege to serve the town as a Select Board member. As many before me, I have worked hard to help determine how best to shepherd West Stockbridge into the future, while also respecting the town's history and traditions. I hope to continue this work and ask for your support.

Prior to my tenure on the Select Board, I served on the Finance and Vision Committees, experiences which provided important preparation for work with the Select Board. Some highlights from my last three years:

- Overseeing shared-services agreements with the town of Richmond, including paid professional EMT staffing and a shared Fire Department. These shared services make our town safer and stronger, while also saving money.
- Publicly standing in support of town residents of Housatonic who are subject to difficulties in procuring clean water from the Housatonic Water Company.
- Making a concerted effort for public funding, resulting in a Green Communities grant of \$127,000 making our town operations more efficient. During the pandemic, I secured a \$140,000 Shared Streets grant, which allowed our restaurants and cultural institutions to operate outside and offering many improvements to the downtown.
- After a 3-year+ process, the town has identified 15 potential projects to improve overall safety and accessibility in our downtown and we have applied for a Massachusetts Complete Streets grant of up to \$500,000 to cover costs.
- We are near completion on the first Master Plan since 1959, supported by another \$50,000 grant, addressing important issues like open space and recreation, reliable broadband service, transportation, and the pressing need for elderly and affordable housing.

Thank you for your support, as I hope to continue to represent the best interests of the town fairly, independently, and respectfully.

Candidate for Select Board

I am excited to be running for your Select Board. I live in Williamsville. I served on your Conservation Commission and on your Planning Board. My most important town role was as the Official Zucchini Weigher.

I worked as a landscape architect and stone mason for two decades. I pivoted to become a licensed cannabis farmer. It is an absolute blast and has allowed me to contribute financially to the new Zucchini Festival!

I love West Stockbridge. I raised my kids here. I think our town is the best place to live in the Berkshires. But COVID has taken a toll. The unity and civility I recall has abruptly diminished. One business is vacant now. A number are struggling. We miss the restaurants.

property. The updated bylaw would allow a detached structure of limited size, within a limited distance from the main dwelling.

When the Planning Board has a draft of all of their changes, Dana will forward them to the Select Board for review.

The Master Plan Committee has a draft Plan, which includes an Open Spaces & Recreational Plan, thanks to the assistance of the Community Compact Grant and the Berkshire Regional Planning Commission. The Master Plan will also require public input. Dana said that there is a need for a paid consultant to take the lead and give a final push to get this completed.

Dana informed the Board that the Planning Board has also been working on revising the Sub-Division Control Regulations. The document is almost complete and will need to be adopted by the Planning Board.

Affordable Housing Trust Fund - Andy Potter

Andy Potter requested that the Select Board include an article on the Annual Town Meeting Warrant to adopt Chapter 44, Section 55C, the Affordable Housing Trust Fund. The Town may use funds from this Trust to create housing on Town owned property. The Trust Fund can provide money for building new housing, rehab existing housing and renter insurance for low-income families. The funds can build up over time and the Trustees could also work alongside the Master Plan Committee on housing issues in Town.

The Trustees are an independent board, appointed by the Select Board consisting of 5 voting members including one Select Board. The Town Administrator will serve as an ex-officio member.

The Board agreed this was a good idea and Marie will include this article in the Annual Town Meeting Warrant.

Select Board Speak:

Andy Krouss informed the Board that he attended a meeting of the Municipal Digital Equity Planning Board and Berkshire Regional Planning Commission in regards to broadband. Several towns are applying for grant money together as a joint application to assist in improving broadband locally. He will keep the Board updated.

Kathleen made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Andy Krouss at 7:32 PM.

Merger Model Under Consideration for Berkshire Hills and Southern Berkshire School Districts

The Regional School District Planning Board (RSDPB), composed of community members from the Berkshire Hills Regional School District (BHRSD) and the Southern Berkshire Regional School District (SBRSD), is diligently working toward strengthening public education across the eight towns it represents. The RSDPB, formed in early 2020 in accordance with Massachusetts General Law, Chapter 71, Section 14, has been actively engaged in conducting research, soliciting feedback from the community, and exploring collaboration and consolidation possibilities.

In April 2022, the RSDPB voted 16 to 6 to continue developing a merger model recommended by their research team. The proposed merger model entails combining the BHRSD and SBRSD into a single pre-K-12 district while maintaining the existing elementary and middle schools. However, the plan also involves creating a new merged 9–12 high school to be built on the Great Barrington campus. This proposed consolidation would streamline and optimize educational resources across the eight towns, ensuring that students receive the best possible education.

A key focus of the RSDPB is to enhance Career Vocational and Technical Education (CVTE) opportunities for students in South County. Currently, South County has only two Chapter 74 CVTE programs, namely automotive and horticulture, both offered at Monument Mountain, and serving approximately 47 students. In contrast, North County and Central County boast more than 500 students enrolled in Chapter 74 CVTE programs. The RSDPB believes a merged district could significantly expand the CVTE offerings in South County, potentially offering six to eight comprehensive CVTE programs that would cater to local workforce needs, student interest, available partners, space requirements, and earning capacity.

To further develop their educational vision, the RSDPB has been working with skilled facilitators, supported by the Barr Foundation, to gather input from community members. Through site visits, interviews, focus groups, and community gatherings, the facilitators have

been seeking input on the strengths and gaps of the two districts, as well as exploring opportunities for collaboration and innovation. The RSDPB held an interactive in-person community session at the Sheffield Senior Center on January 21, with a second session held at the Great Barrington Senior Center on March 18. A larger community meeting is targeted for mid-May, providing ample opportunities for community engagement and input.

The RSDPB has also been actively working on the governance and operational provisions of an 8 Town regional agreement. The finance subcommittee has been analyzing various options for assessment methodologies for operating and capital costs and is presented recommended approaches for consideration to the full board in the first week of April. The timeline for a board vote has been adjusted to May/June due to the complexity of the assessment methodology work. This timing aligns with the recommendation of Select Board members to present the merger recommendation to voters at special town meetings in the fall, allowing sufficient time for presentation and discussion.

The RSDPB remains committed to its mission of strengthening public education across the eight towns by exploring opportunities for collaboration, consolidation, and innovation. The proposed merger model and focus on enhancing CVTE opportunities aim to provide students in South County with a comprehensive and robust education that prepares them for success in the workforce and beyond. As the RSDPB continues its work, community engagement and input remain crucial in shaping the future of education in the region.

West Stockbridge is represented on the board by Sarah Bourla, Marie Ryan, and Andy Potter.

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




not get any response, and we have decided to table our efforts on that front for now. However, the Dog Park has piqued quite a bit of interest.



May History Quiz Question:

Before electricity and smart refrigerators that alert you when you need milk and dump ice cubes out of the front door, keeping food cold was a challenge. Rural areas had outdoor cold cellars, but towns rarely had the space for an outdoor cold cellar and tried to keep perishables cool in the basement. Throughout the 19th century, ice blocks were an important commodity for food preservation and summer relief. By the early 20th century, before electricity, the icebox became a popular kitchen appliance. An early refrigerator, using blocks of delivered ice, kept milk and meat cool, particularly in the summer.



Harvesting ice blocks to supply the iceboxes could be a profitable business, especially in the warmer months. Fresh water and proximity to a railroad were key to a successful ice business, and West Stockbridge had both. Where were our three known icehouses?

Have a Plan in Place Before You Get Bitten

Determine which ER to go to for tick removal or which Lyme-literate medical professional you will see. You can find Lyme-literate doctors at lymenet.org, ilads.org, or lymediseaseassociation.org, or email berkshirelyme@yahoo.com.

Learn treatment protocols for healing swiftly to avoid chronic Lyme disease and other tickborne illnesses multiplying inside you.

History Quiz Answer:

West Stockbridge has five freshwater ponds or lakes (plus the Williams River and numerous streams). Two have good access to the railroad or the main streets. Ice was harvested from the ponds, cut into blocks, separated with sawdust, and stored in an icehouse until ready to be shipped.

Many farmers likely harvested ice from small ponds on their property for personal use. The earliest known town building identified specifically as an icehouse is on the 1855 Woodford map. It was located on Albany Street, in the lot currently housing Soma Catering and Flourish Market and adjacent to the railroad tracks. There are no remains of the structure or foundation, and we don't have a record of who owned it or sold the ice.

On the northwest corner of Crane Pond, buried in the weeds, are the remnants of a large icehouse that once harvested from the pond and shipped via the railroad. We don't have a record of who owned and managed it, but it was likely part of the Keresey farm that operated on that property.

The third icehouse was located right on Main Street, just east

of the bridge over the Shaker Mill Pond dam. The building on the left in the photo was also an early icehouse. The structure shows up on the 1855 map. The house next to it is dated circa 1848, and it's likely the icehouse was built around that time. We don't know when the building came down or what caused its collapse. It possibly lasted until the 1920s when ice harvesting was beginning to be replaced by refrigeration.

The availability of ice and icehouses helped our local dairy industry in the early 1900s. Fresh milk could be stored and shipped out (but that's another history question). By the 1930s, electricity became available in homes. Ice harvesting, delivery by the iceman, and the home icebox all ended. The icehouses are all gone now, with no signs of that earlier era.


