Lou Coco and Jameson Currier, two guild members working in their own unique, colorful, and fanciful folk-art style, will collaborate in showing their work this month at Art on Main Gallery.

Weekends, June 8–18 Reception, Saturday, June 10, 2–4 pm

Both of these artists developed an interest in drawing and painting long before they were able to explore those interests seriously. Both pursued serious careers, Lou at GE and General Dynamics and Jameson at a New York City media company, before venturing into writing and publishing. Both Lou and Jameson are inspired by small towns and rural landscapes in the Berkshires, Catskills, and Hudson Valley.

For example, Jameson's work *Backyard Gardens* combines clouds, hills, fields, and trees in a flattened distance with a tranquil domestic garden scene, along with rocking chairs on a nearby deck waiting for the couple to sit and enjoy their labor. His colorful palette melds all these scenic elements together.


Lou's painting *Let's Dance* shows a fanciful woodland scene with pairs of animals, deer, foxes, and turkeys frolicking to the music,

humorously provided by a red-hatted bear on her pink piano. Lou's work embraces a pointillist style with small brushstrokes of paint dotting the canvas (similar to those of Georges Seurat).


The exhibit "Two Folk Artists" will be open:

Kathleen made a motion, seconded by Andy Krouss, to approve the FY24 Budget Articles with a change to include a \$1000 increase in the Select Board Salary line item for a newly elected Select Board Member, rather than a \$1000 increase for all members as suggested by the Finance Committee.

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2023 Annual Town Meeting and Election Results

The 2023 annual town meeting was held in the Town Offices Gym on Monday, May 1. Turnout included 84 voters, just 7% of the 1,218 registered.

With little discussion, voters approved the FY24 budget of \$6.5 million, an overall increase of approximately 5%, including a \$3.3 million assessment for the Berkshire Hills Regional School District. Other actions taken in the nearly two-hour meeting included establishing an Affordable Housing Trust aimed at attracting young families to the town and helping low- and moderate-income households.


Proposals to change the town clerk and town collector positions from elected to appointed by the Select Board drew vigorous debate and were ultimately tabled for future consideration. The questions remained on the election ballot (which were already printed), but those results are now meaningless because the measures were tabled.

The annual town election was held on May 8. Turnout was 33% with 406 voting of 1,218 registered. In a stunning development, the contest for Select Board between incumbent Kathleen Keresey and challenger Jon Piasecki ended in a tie, the first tie in a Berkshire County municipal election in over a decade. Following state law, a recount was held on Friday, May 19, and the same result was obtained. The process now goes back to square one, with a town caucus to be held on June 12 at 6 pm to select candidates including Keresey, Piasecki, and any others nominated and seconded by registered voters. The election is scheduled for July 17.



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

-Andy K. asked Marc about traffic calming and Marc said that traffic calming efforts are continuing to good effect. His department have been following the school busses as frequently as they can insuring safety for school children.

Select Board Speak:

Kathleen expressed appreciation to the DPW, PD and FD for their outstanding response to the mid-March storm. The departments worked tirelessly until all roads were clear of snow and fallen trees, and power was restored.

Kathleen mentioned that she and Bob Salerno had met with State Representative Smitty Pignatelli with a routine update about the Town, and to hear his thoughts of matters of importance to small towns in general and West Stockbridge in particular. Topics discussed included:

- housing as a major concern for all,
- grant opportunities,
- regionalization of services with other towns,
- the ongoing problems with the Housatonic Water Company for our Town residents who still do not have reliably clean water,
- possible establishment of a Charter Review Committee
- the acquisition of the former National Grid property on Moscow Road
- The Old Town Hall
- establishment of a Cultural Arts District
- future appointment by Governor Healy of a rural affairs director. There has not been a job description for this position, nor has this position been filled.
- Representative Pignatelli is looking to increase Chapter 90 funds to cover dirt roads, which they currently don't. This would be an advantage to West Stockbridge as approximately 25% of our roads are dirt.

Farmer's Market Annual Entertainment License:

Lily Davenport requested that the Board approve an Annual Entertainment License for the Farmer's Market. She stated that they will have 1-3 musicians that will play low volume folk music during the Farmer's Market on Thursdays.

Andy Krouss made a motion, seconded by Andy Potter, to approve the Entertainment License for the Farmer's Market.

All were in favor, motion passed.

Zucchini Festival One Day Entertainment License:

Marjorie Powell, Zucchini Festival Chair requested that the Board approve a One Day Entertainment License for the Zucchini Festival on August 22, 2023. They plan on having low impact, reduced noise fireworks at the end of the festival at 10 PM. She has met with the State Fire Marshall for placement and security for the fireworks. She requested that the Town to get an umbrella policy under the Town Insurance Policy for the event. Director of Public Works Curt Wilton will assist with the parking locations, using Town Hall, Card Pond, Wastewater Treatment Plant and the cemetery. There will be shuttles to assist getting people to and from the parking lots to the downtown area. The Berkshire Bank parking lot will be reserved for vendor parking. All parking lots will have an attendant to assist with parking. The Festival will have music and dancing that will end by 10 PM prior to the fireworks. Marjorie spoke with Police Chief Marc Portieri and secured Police Detail coverage and with Fire Chief Steve Traver for Fire Department coverage for the fireworks. Marjorie also received approval from the Conservation Commission to have a duck race.

Joe Roy, as a representative of the West Stockbridge Village Business Association, has informed all local businesses about every aspect of the Festival. He has not received any responses back from anyone, but he assured the Board that everyone has been informed.

Andy Potter made a motion, seconded by Andy Krouss, to approve the One Day Entertainment License for the Zucchini Festival.

All were in favor, motion passed.

Marjorie thanked the Board and she will come back to the Board and keep them updated as plans progress.

Department of Public Works Update:

Curt Wilton presented an update of the Complete Streets Program. The Committee submitted 15 total projects for approval to proceed with attaining grant funding from Mass DOT. All 15 projects have been approved as feasible for grant funding. The next step will include public input by way of surveys and an open meeting. Then the Committee can determine which projects they will submit for grant funding in the fall with assistance from Nick Russo from Berkshire Regional Planning.

Curt also discussed the roads in Town that he feels should no longer should be Town roads. Curt stated there were 7 roads that he felt should be abandoned by the Town and no longer maintained by the Town. Curt believes to maintain these roads is not cost-effective, they are essentially driveways. The roads being considered are:

VanShaak Road Oak Street Moscow Road Beach Street South Street Bryan Road Easland Road

He suggested that the Board allow he and Marie begin the process of deleting these roads from the list of Town roads by contacting Town Counsel. The Board agreed this was a good idea.

Municipal Officials April Meeting Update:

Andy Potter attended a Municipal Officials Meeting in April. One of the main discussions at this meeting was in regards to the inequalities between the funding given to eastern Massachusetts towns versus western Massachusetts towns. He specifically mentioned the PILOT program where towns receive money for state owned land. In the eastern part of the state some towns receive \$1000 per acre while towns in the western part receive only \$129-200 per acre.

Andy also recently attended a meeting in Pittsfield at the Berkshire Innovation Center involving discussions about green energy and potential funding. The USDA representatives were also in attendance and they specifically talked about funding to assist with water treatment infrastructure. Andy will gather more information about their rolling applications for grants and long-term low interest loans for treatment plants.

Select Board Speak:

Andy Krouss informed the Board he is still working on the broadband issue and will update the Board when he gets new information.

Andy Potter mentioned that he would like to discuss changing the agenda process at their next meeting by including Citizen Speak during the meeting to enable people to be involved as the Board discusses each item.

The 8 Town Regional School District Planning Board has come up with equity formulas for paying for the new high school and how that will work to allow fair payments by each town. The Board has done some great work and will be presenting that information soon to the Towns.

Kathleen asked the Board if they would be open to having a joint meeting with the Select Board of Great Barrington and Stockbridge to discuss the Housatonic Water Company issues. The Board agreed and Marie will set the meeting up.

Kathleen asked the Board if they would be interested in the possibility of being involved in the joint Stockbridge and Lee Fire Department which is in the early process of forming. The Board agreed this maybe a good idea to look into if this is feasible for West Stockbridge to join them. Kathleen will write a letter of interest to be sent to Stockbridge and Lee.

Kathleen recently meet with Representative Smitty Pignatelli and discussed different shared services. He would like to attend a Select Board meeting for further discussion. Marie will reach out to Smitty to get some possible dates for a meeting.

Andy Potter made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Andy Krouss at 7:30 PM.

All were in favor, meeting adjourned.

What's New from the West Stockbridge Vision Committee

This past year, WSVC has focused on these topics:

- Traffic and pedestrian safety (especially downtown: parking and crosswalks)
- Sound control (possible ordinance or bylaw)
- West Stockbridge "livability"
- Sustaining residency of young adults and seniors
- Improving access to information about education
- Coordinating with other town boards
- Indexing permits needed in various zoning districts

Many other timely subjects were on our posted agendas this year too. Just to name a few:

- Creating "Welcome to West Stockbridge" signs
- Erecting a pavilion (or two)
- Researching new sidewalks and parking
- Learning more about EV charging stations
- Studying the long-term consequences of the pandemic on our school system

Our most recent involvement was closely following the accomplishments of the town's Complete Streets Committee that has successfully submitted 15 projects approved by the state for future applications related to our parks, sidewalks, traffic calming and speed control, pedestrian and intersection safety, bus stops, town beach area, and municipal parking opportunities. These are all topics that the Vision Committee has an interest in improving.

WSVC currently has eight full-time voting members: Chair Joe Roy Jr., Vice Chair Bill Barth, Clerk and Webmaster Steve Graham, Karen Carmean, Champika Fernando, Frank Landsberger, Thom Lipiczky, and Doane Perry. Carter White and Peter Thorne are emeritus members.

June History Quiz Question:

We learned from the recent "Baseball in the Berkshires" exhibit and talk at the Old Town Hall that from the late 1880s through World War II, baseball was a major form of entertainment in West Stockbridge. No Netflix, streaming, ESPN, or other amusements were invented yet. Baseball was a way for people to get outside and communities to gather and be entertained. Traveling teams, local teams, Negro teams, semi-pro, professional, college, and all levels of teams came through town to play here. Crowds were large, and people came from all over to watch the games.

Most prominent was the Troy's Garage team, a semi-pro team prominent in the 1930s. The recently dedicated Keresey Field on Route 41 was the home of Garrett Troy's team. But there were other baseball fields in town. How many existed in town, where was baseball played, and where are they?

A recent article in the *Washington Post* about urban beekeeping made me curious about the plight of *Apis mellifera* these days. Back in 2006, the number of native honeybee hives started to see a precipitous decline due to a mysterious illness called colony collapse disorder. This alarmed farmers, of course, because much of the pollination of our native plants requires insects (and sometimes birds). In some areas, mobile honeybee hives are transported to monoculture orchards (like almonds) at just the right time so pollination can happen. Ultimately, no bees, no fruit trees. So, colony collapse disorder is very troubling.

The article focused on how urbanites have tried to help the situation by starting new hives on balconies and rooftops. But beware the curse of unintended consequences. As the newcomer bees started foraging for food (pollen in tree blossoms, flowers), it became clear that urban environments just didn't have enough flora to support the overall pollinator population. Natives started disappearing. But the smaller number of honeybees has been noticed here in Berkshire County as well.

Last June in my *Local Yokel* column, I wrote, "Pollinators (bees, wasps, some moths, etc.) are not doing well. The insect population of the planet (roughly 80% of all animals) is, by some measures, down 40% over the past 30 years. This is due to habitat change and insecticides used for commercial farming. We're doing what little we can to help out the pollinators. Without them, our food crops would crash quickly, and that's not a good thing, especially given what the current crisis in Ukraine is doing to grain and cooking oil supply for many in the Eastern Mediterranean and in Africa. And a shortage there will doubtless have ripple effects elsewhere, economically, and politically."

One solution is "less lawn, more meadow." Although the clovers and other plants often found in our lawns do provide some food for bees and other pollinators, it's nowhere close to the bounty of the native meadow. There's a huge smorgasbord of different plants providing lots of pollen for honeybees, bumblebees, moths, wasps, butterflies, and hummingbirds.

We've been converting sections of our grass monoculture lawn to wildflower gardens. We cover sections of grass with plastic sheets and large pieces of cardboard in the fall to kill off some of the grass. Inevitably, we have to get down in the dirt in the spring and dig out roots of grass and weeds. Next comes the wildflower pollinator mix, widely available from online sources. It's recommended to mix the seeds with sand for easier broadcasting. Keeping the new seeds moist until they germinate and get a few inches tall is important. And a light layer of straw helps keep the moisture in and some of the birds out.

Now that it's June, we have started to see a wide variety of native plants starting to pop up, offering not only food for pollinators but a beautiful display of color and texture for us humanoids. If you're intrigued about keeping bees, Berkshire Botanical Gardens in Stockbridge hosts a monthly meeting of local beekeepers.

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Complete Streets Committee Nears Finish Line, Needs Public Input



West Stockbridge is committed to pedestrian-oriented planning through the Commonwealth's Complete Streets program. With technical assistance from the Berkshire Regional Planning Commission, the town has identified 15 projects to enhance transportation for locals and visitors. These projects prioritize safety, public health, livability, equity, and usability for all street network users. The town seeks public input to prioritize the projects for potential construction funding of up to \$500,000 in four-year cycles. With state approval of the proposed projects, West Stockbridge is progressing toward creating a safer and more accessible community for all.


Complete Streets represents a commitment to providing safer and more accessible means of travel between home, school, work, recreation, and retail destinations. Complete Streets envisions roadways designed to accommodate all users safely and comfortably, regardless of age, ability, or mode of transportation. In addition to providing safety and access for all users, Complete Street design treatments consider accommodations for disabled persons as required by the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA).

The Complete Streets Committee of West Stockbridge submitted a Tier 2 list of projects to MassDOT that includes only town projects. The state determined that all 15 proposals met its criteria, marking a significant step forward for West Stockbridge's Complete Streets initiative. The committee prioritized the projects based on factors such as safety, public health, increased livability, equity, and usability for all users of the street network, as well as overall budgeting based on an anticipated \$500,000 for construction funding.

The next step in the process is for public outreach, allowing the community to provide input on which of the 15 projects the town should prioritize. This effort is an important opportunity for the residents of West Stockbridge to help shape the town's Complete Streets program and ensure that it meets the needs and priorities of the community. With the state's approval of the proposed projects, West Stockbridge can make its streets safer and more accessible for all residents.

History Quiz Answer:

Keresey Field on Route 41 was the main stadium (as it were) through the 1930s with semipro and pro teams regularly coming through to play Garrett Troy's team of paid college and post-college athletes. It helped promote Garrett's large Ford dealership in town too. West Stockbridge also had one softball field (60-foot baseline) and three other hardball fields (regulation 90-foot baseline) in town.

The small softball field was located between the village and Catholic cemeteries and active after the Second World War. Known as Veterans Field, likely some people are around who remember playing there or know about relatives and friends who played there.

As for hardball, amateur teams regularly played baseball in the open field across Route 41 from Keresey Field, south of and next to the town cemetery. This land is now occupied with

new homes. Another baseball field is behind the Town Offices and still in use. It also serves as a soccer field, skateboard park, and one winter even had a cross-country ski track around the perimeter.

The fourth hardball field was a surprise. We learned at the exhibit that during the early 1900s, a major ball field called Blinn's Field was located next to Card Pond. According to the 1900 census, Charles Blinn was a farmer. The 1904 map shows his house on the west side of Great Barrington Road. The field next to Card Pond was larger than it is now. The pond was altered to accommodate the MassPike when it was built in the late 1950s. Blinn's neighbors were all listed as laborers or tradespeople, so he probably owned and farmed the land on both sides of the road. The baseball field was a large flat, open space, perfect for a summer game.

The *Eagle* reported that on May 23, 1903, the West Stockbridge second team beat the Stockbridge second team, 45 to 9, at Blinn's Field. The article also reported that "the Village Baseball Club will give a social and dance at the Town Hall Friday evening."

Semi-pro and local club baseball was a major social activity during the turn of the century, growing until the Second World War. Changing lifestyles replaced it with school and Little League teams.



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
