Remembering Joseph Giramma

This September marks a year since the passing of Joseph Giramma, resident of West Stockbridge. Joseph was a father, husband, teacher, world traveler, poet, painter, sculptor, and an aficionado of classical music and opera. Despite having lived abroad for many years and traveled extensively to exotic places such as Bangladesh, Egypt, and Burma, Joseph was in love with the small town of West Stockbridge, where he spent the last seven years of his life in his house on Lenox Road.

He was a regular at the West Stockbridge Library, where he taught a conversational Italian class, and good friends with librarians Rachel, Vickie, and Brad. Joseph loved sitting out back along the river at the Stanmeyer Gallery and Coffee House. He liked to play tennis and shoot baskets on the town playground with his son Robert and wife Kelly, regularly strolled the Farmers Market and TurnPark, and practically lived at Tanglewood most summers. Being full Italian, Joseph frequented Trattoria Vesuvio (owned by friend and fellow colleague at Pittsfield High School, Rino Coppola), as well as Amici. He would have been thrilled about the Zucchini Festival coming back this year and surely would have enjoyed meeting and greeting all his neighbors there.



Select Board Meeting Minutes July 10, 2023

Quorum present: Select Board Members Kathleen Keresey, Chair and Andrew Krouss, Andrew Potter, and Town Administrator Marie Ryan.

Kathleen called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM.

Approval of Minutes:

Kathleen made a motion seconded by Andy Krouss to approve the minutes from June 20, 2023. Andy Potter abstained, Kathleen and Andy Krouss approved. Minutes approved.

Citizen Speak:

Truc Nguyen mentioned that she has ongoing concerns in regard to noise in the business district.

Dutch Pinkston and Jack Houghton, Zoning Board of Appeals members updated the Select Board about their current public hearing which was held on June 29, 2023 and has been continued to Monday, July $24^{\rm th}$ at 7 PM.

Annie Kilmer-Lockenwitz presented a letter to the Board with multiple concerns she has in regards to traffic issues. Police Chief Portieri responded that he is aware of ongoing traffic issues in Town and will continue to monitor them.

<u>Employee Handbook – Policies and Procedures</u>: Marie Ryan, Town Administrator

Marie informed the Board that she has been working with Sofia, the Town's Human Resource Employee, Town Counsel and the Policie Union Counsel to put together all the Policies and Procedures already approved by the Select Board into one document, the Handbook. <u>Affordable Housing Trust - Next Steps:</u> Marie Ryan, Town Administrator

Marie informed the Board that the Affordable Housing Trust article that was passed at the 2023 Annual Town Meeting has also been approved by the Attorney General, which means we need to discuss the next steps. Marie said the next steps would be to appoint the Board of Trustees so they can begin their work. She suggested that the Board allow her to post on the website and in the Local Yokel information for volunteers to send a letter of interest to be a member on this Board to her for the Select Board to then review and appoint the members. This will require the Select Board to appoint one Select Board member as well as 4 full-time residents of West Stockbridge. The Board agreed this was the correct next steps and asked Marie to post the request for volunteers on the website and send it to the Local Yokel as well.

Select Board Speak:

Andy Potter would like the Town to place all zoom recordings of meetings on the Town website. This would allow for easy access for members of the community without having to go through the request process.

Andy Potter suggested that all open positions for Boards and Committees be listed on the website for residents to know about and get involved if they are interested.

Kathleen made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Andy Potter at 6:51 PM.

Select Board Meeting Minutes July 24, 2023

Quorum present: Select Board Members Kathleen Keresey, Andrew Krouss, Andrew Potter, and Town Administrator Marie Ryan.

Others Present: Police Chief Marc Portieri

Marie called the meeting to order at 6:00 PM.

Marie asked for a nomination for the position of Select Board Chair. Andy Potter nominated Andy Krouss for the position of Chair, there was no second. Andy Krouss nominated Kathleen for the position. Kathleen 2nd and accepted. All were in favor.

Zoning Board of Appeals Request for Town Counsel:

The Zoning Board of Appeals has requested assistance from Town Counsel during their Public Hearing on July 24 regarding the Building Inspector's decision on the Foundry's Special Permit requirements.

Kathleen made a motion, seconded by Andy Potter, to approve the use of Town Counsel Jonathan Eichman for the Zoning Board of Appeals Public Hearing.

All were in favor, motion approved.

Approval of Minutes:

Kathleen made a motion seconded by Andy Potter to approve the minutes from July 10, 2023. All were in favor. Minutes approved.

Citizen Speak:

Sheila Thunfors read a letter in regards to the Town healing after a contentious election cycle. She hopes that everyone can work together and get along.

Thom Lipiczky, member of the Vision Committee, stated that the Committee has been gathering information about electric vehicle charging stations. He asked the Board if they want the Committee to continue the process. Kathleen stated that this needs to be an agenda item to be able to discuss. Marie will place this as an agenda item on a Select Board meeting.

<u>TurnPark request for One Day Liquor License on August 11, 2023 – Jared Gelormino, Manager</u>

Jared requested approval from the Board for a One Day Liquor License for a Comedy Night at TurnPark on August 11, 2023. They expect 75-100 people to attend. Jared will have a parking attendant to assist with parking the cars. Andy Potter asked if there will be amplified sound and music and Jared responded yes, it will be amplified but there will not be music and the show should run from 7 PM until 9:30 PM.

Andy Potter made a motion, seconded by Kathleen, to approve a One Day Liquor License for the TurnPark event on August 11, 2023.

All were in favor, motion approved.

Police Department Update – Chief Marc Portieri

Chief Portieri handed out a sheet to the Board with the following statistical information on the Police Department activity for 2023 to date.

The Chief stated that the Department has been extremely busy this year. There has been an increase in heroin issues which concerns him.

The weekend of August 10-12 will be very busy in Town and all officers will need to be working. On August 10th, the Crane Lake Camp will be closing which will create a lot of traffic throughout that day, August 11th will be the TurnPark event which will require a Police Officer for traffic and safety issues, and finally on August 12th is the Zucchini Festival, which will also require several Police Officers on duty. The Department has been working on Traffic Calming with an extra officer working 4 hour shifts during the day to address different traffic violations throughout the Town.

Andy Potter inquired about the percentage of Mutual Aid calls that are from Richmond. Marc stated that about half of them are Richmond calls. Andy Potter suggested that the Board try to have a joint meeting with the Richmond and, possibly, Alford Select Boards to discuss sharing Police resources. The Board agreed and will try to set up a meeting for a discussion.

Marc then handed the Board a letter and information on the status of the Police Chief's salary. The letter requests an increase that is comparable to other Chiefs' in the surrounding towns. He requests that the Board read through the material and discuss it at the next meeting.

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September History Quiz Question:

Every day, we walk or drive by buildings and spaces in town without giving them much thought. The scenery is familiar and comforting, and we give it nicknames of someone's house, or a store's owner, usually when we first became aware of it. Main Street buildings have many colloquial names like that (e.g., Barber Shop, Village Oven, coffee shop, Aggies, store, etc.).

One of the most common spaces on Main Street is the Masonic Lodge building and the parking lot in front of it. These two lots were linked together at one time and served a most important role in town life. What was there, and what was their function?

Select Board Speak:

Andy Potter informed the board that the 8 Town Regional School District Planning Board voted to approve a draft regional agreement which supports the merger of the two school districts. The next steps will include a State review of the agreement for any changes, presentation of the agreement to the 8 Towns' Select Boards and finally a Special Town Meeting in each of the 8 Towns for a vote for the merger in the fall.

Andy Potter has been working on a document of FAQ's (frequently asked questions) which he hopes to have the proper departments review and then have available on the Town website.

Kathleen has worked with Marie and Curt to create a list of tasks to be worked on with different people responsible for each task. She will update it and bring to a Select Board meeting for discussion.

Kathleen thanked Sheila Thunfors' for her letter and hopes that everyone can begin working together for the sake of the Town. Andy Potter agreed that when you work in the public life, there is always an assumption of good intent which is needed.

Kathleen made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Andy Potter at 6:46 PM.

Select Board Meeting Minutes August 7, 2023

Quorum present: Select Board Members Andrew Krouss, Andrew Potter, and Town Administrator Marie Ryan. Absent: Kathleen Keresey

Public Hearing of Transfer of Liquor License for Public Market:

Andy Krouss opened the Public Hearing for the transfer of the All Alcohol Liquor License for the Public Market at 6:00 PM.

Matthew Porter, attorney for Stockbridge Market LLC stated that the new owners would like to have the liquor license transferred to them for the Public Market. They are TIPS certified and will require all employees to be as well. There are no plans to change the hours of operation or the building itself. They plan to complete a few upgrades to the inside of the store, a face lift to the store and the merchandise inventory. Matthew stated there will be no major changes to the business.

Andy Potter asked if they expect to have an increase in alcohol sales over the general grocery items. Matthew Porter stated that is not their plan but they will let the business dictate that as time goes on.

Hearing no other questions, Andy Krouss closed the Public Hearing.

Andy Potter made a motion, seconded by Andy Krouss, to approve the transfer of the Liquor License to Stockbridge Market LLC.

All were in favor, transfer of the Liquor License was approved.

Andy Potter made a motion, seconded by Andy Krouss, to approve the pledge of the license for the Public Market with Eastern Funding.

All were in favor, motion approved.

Approval of Minutes:

Andy Potter requested a correction to a typographical error in the name of Thom Lipiczky in the minutes.

Andy Potter made a motion, seconded by Andy Krouss, to approve the minutes from July 24, 2023 with the correction noted.

All were in favor. Minutes approved.

Citizen Speak:

Karden Rabin and John Cambell, residents in West Stockbridge, requested that if there are any future discussions in regards to decommissioned streets or roads in Town that the residents be included. Andy Potter informed them that the discussion in regards to this issue is a process and that residents would be included.

Conservation Commission Member David Evans:

Marie explained to the Board that a member of the Conservation Commission has resigned and that the Commission is requesting the Board appoint David Evans, a current Alternate Member, to a Full Member status.

Andy Potter made a motion, seconded by Andy Krouss, to appoint David Evans as a Full Member of the Conservation Commission.

All were in favor, motion approved.

Zucchini Festival Update: Marge Powell:

Marge Powell informed the Board she has over 40 volunteers for the Zucchini Festival this Saturday. She has met with the Police Chief and Fire Chief as well as the Department of Public Works for planning purposes. Her volunteers plan beginning set up on Friday. The Police will make sure that there is 20-minute parking available on Main Street in front of the businesses for their customers during the day. The parking lot on Main Street will be used as a handicap accessible parking lot. There will be a shuttle running all day from the Town Hall, the cemetery on Albany Road, Card Pond, the Church parking lot and Main Street.

Marge requested approval from the Board to have the DPW assist them with moving some picnic tables on Depot and Center Streets, they agreed.

The Board thanked Marge for all her hard work on this event for the Town.

Select Board Speak:

Andy Potter made note that Sarah Schaeffer is now working parttime for the Library and has resigned as a Trustee. He will submit a name to the Board at the next meeting for an appointment of a new person to fill that Trustee position until the next Annual Town Election.

Andy Potter made a motion to adjourn, seconded by Andy Krouss at 6:28 PM.

All were in favor, meeting adjourned.

Transportation for All in West Stockbridge

The TriTown Connector is a new transportation service for everyone in the towns of Egremont, Great Barrington, and Stockbridge, now also with service to West Stockbridge and Monterey. *This service is not restricted to older adults*. And it serves residents and nonresidents alike.

Hours of operation:

- ⇒ Egremont, Great Barrington, and Stockbridge: 6 am to 9 pm weekdays; 7:30 am to 8 pm weekends
- Service to Monterey: 8 am to 6 pm weekdays; 10 am to 4 pm weekends
- Service to West Stockbridge: 7:30 am to 8 pm weekdays; 9 am to 7 pm weekends

Just call (413) 591-3826. Tell them where you are and where you want to go. A TriTown Connector van will pick you up and take you where you want to go within the participating five towns.

One-way fares:

- ⇒ Travel within one town: \$2
- ⇒ Travel between towns: \$4
- ⇒ Children under 5 ride free when accompanied by a paying adult

Discounted tickets for 10 one-way rides can also be purchased by residents of all five towns (Egremont, Great Barrington, Stockbridge, West Stockbridge, and Monterey) at the Claire Teague Senior Center transportation office in Great Barrington, weekdays from 8 am to 4 pm. Tickets may also be purchased on the vans and at local senior centers.

Prices for these discounted tickets are \$15 for travel within one town, a 25% discount, and \$25 for multi-town trips, a 38% discount.

Weekly Workforce Passes are available for residents, providing travel between any of the communities for \$15/ week. This pass provides one daily round trip for 7 consecutive days.

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





"Mothing" in West Stockbridge

Moth enthusiasts gathered at the MassWildlife Flat Brook Wildlife Management Area in West Stockbridge on Saturday, August 5, for a tutorial on using a light sheet for mothing (i.e., using a light to attract moths and observe them at night). This tutorial was led by Matthew Ramkiewicz and organized by Berkshire Environmental Action Team (BEAT) to help spread awareness and admiration for these essential insects and pollinators, whose global populations are rapidly declining. Some of the highlights from that evening were the small-eyed sphinx moth and the painted lichen moth. 

History Quiz Answer:

The corner of Hotel and Main Street was the hub of commercial aspirations when the railroad first came to West Stockbridge in the early 1840s. The current Card Lake Inn was built as a hotel for the expected business and tourist travelers who would come by rail to visit the town. Although we had other inns in town (including the current Stone House Properties realty office), and West Center had five at one time, this location was the largest place to stay.

According to an old story, a Mr. Jones, who owned the hotel, was refused permission to have a bar in it because of its proximity to the church and school. So he opened the "West Stockbridge Hotel" on the lot on the northeast corner of the street. (An early map labels it as the West Stockbridge Railroad House.) This building was larger and grander than the Card Lake Inn, four stories tall with a carriage house in the rear on Hotel Street.

The hotel building was the largest structure on Main Street. Its footprint covered most of what is now the town parking lot. It served as a hotel, barroom, and commercial space through the 19th century and, most importantly, included the town's only funeral parlor. This location was very convenient because the town's hearse was kept in a barn further up Hotel Street. By the early

1900s, the building became a residence on top and fully commercial on the lower floors. It housed the Battastoni furniture store, a grocery and other merchandise, and even a travel agency.

The smaller building in the back, on Hotel Street, is now the Masonic Lodge. It was built to be the carriage house and barn for the hotel. Early maps show the structure connected to the hotel building, although by 1904, it appears as a separate building. Construction is estimated between 1858 and 1876. Some of the visible foundation is leftover marble and lime from the quarries, and the six-over-six windows on the front and west sides are not regularly spaced like they would be if it was constructed as a residence or shop.

The large "Battastoni" building burned in a major fire in the 1930s, one of two large fires on Main Street in that era. The space has been a parking lot ever since.



The Town Vegetable

I'm writing this on the Monday after the dust has settled on the historic resurrection of our world-famous Zucchini Festival. Today with a tear in my eye, I saw our stalwart crew from the Department of Public Works taking down those amazing zucchini banners that graced our Main Street for the last few weeks

Thanks to Marge, Bob, and Chris Powell for their fearless leadership and excellent organizational skills in bringing back the much loved event after years of hiatus. And for all the great volunteers!

So, this month I write not about the latest in energy technology for the home or changes in the building codes or how to put up a mailbox. No, this month I celebrate Cucurbita pepo! Yes, everything you ever wanted to know about the zucchini but were afraid to ask. And a special thanks to my wife Anne for researching many of these fascinating factoids.

Like all squashes, the zucchini originated in the Americas but was brought to Europe in the 1600s. I think it was on a Tuesday. The Italians bred them in the 1800s into the vegetable we know and love.

Then, between 1880 and 1920, more than 4 million Italian immigrants came to North and South America, bringing their zucchini with them. Many settled in West Stockbridge to bring their prodigious skills in stonework to the quarries and building projects here. And because it was easy for non-Italians to say "zucchini," the name stuck.

It's a vegetable (fruit, really, but let's not quibble) that's found all over the world. The Brits call it courgette using the French, German, and Dutch name. But when it gets bigger, it's a "marrow," whereas South Africans pick it as small as an index finger and call it "baby marrow." Mexicans call it calabacita, and the Icelanders call it kurbit (interesting to think of Icelandic zucchini, I know . . .).

Zucchini grows well in Berkshire summers. So well that (as Marge Powell has reported), the only reason to lock your car around here this time of year is so people don't put zucchini in it. Chief Portieri,

take notice!

And it's remarkably good for you too, boys and girls. Lots of vitamins, minerals, antioxidants, fiber, and it's low in calories.

I'm sure both of my readers are a bit tired of reading zucchini recipes this time of year, so I won't bore you with more of that. No, I'll share with you the news that ever more uses for zucchini have recently been developed. Engineers have found that mixing shredded zucchini in concrete makes a much stronger garage floor. In the continuing efforts to bring cold fusion into the mainstream, scientists have been using zucchini extract to control the extreme temperatures required. And on the biology front, a complete genome of the zuke reveals that we share not just the 50% of our DNA (as with bananas!), but close to 95%. And anthropologists suggest that early relatives of Homo sapiens used zucchini in their religious rites.

Let's leave the zucchini flags up on Main Street! Let's salute the noble fruit (er, vegetable, but it really is a fruit).



Reception: Saturday, September 9, 2-4 pm.










(From top) Watercolor by Bruce Shickmanter. Oil Painting by Mike Coyne. Ceramic Piece by Mike Coyne.
