

Select Board Meeting Minutes

Select Board Meeting Minutes August 18, 2025

The quorum was present remotely, consisting of Select Board members Chair Andrew Krouss and Kathleen Keresey, and Town Administrator Marie Ryan.

Chair Andy Krouss opened the meeting at 6 PM.

Kathleen made a motion, seconded by Andy, to approve the meeting minutes from August 4, 2025.

All were in favor; minutes approved.

Town Administrator Update

Marie explained that due to Andy Potter's resignation, there is an open position on the Berkshire Regional Transit Authority. She asked the Board if either of them would like to fill that seat. They asked Marie to post the opening on the website and see if any residents would be interested in doing it. If no one shows interest, then Andy Krouss stated he would fill the position.

Marie stated that she would like to add a discussion of a possible Special Town Election to fill Andy Potter's seat to the next meeting agenda. The Board agreed.

<u>Dog Park Update:</u> Mike Bolognino, Chair of Dog Park Committee

Michael informed the Board that the Dog Park is coming along and looks great. He has been very pleased with the work that Clark & Son has been doing and thinks the park is looking even better than he imagined. The only items they are waiting for are the fencing, the benches, and the water fountain, which are all on backorder. The Committee would like to hold a grand opening of the park on Sunday, October 5th. They intend on having face painting, a few vendors, and food. He invited the Board and all to attend.

Department of Public Works Update: Director Curt Wilton

Curt stated that before his injury, he had suggested the Town hire a new Foreman for the DPW after Jamie Boyer's resignation. He would then jump in and assist the crew with their duties as well. Since Curt's injury, he will be out for a couple of months and will be unable to help the crew physically during this time. He now

Upcoming Special Town Meeting to Consider Zoning Changes

By the West Stockbridge Planning Board

West Stockbridge residents will soon have the opportunity to vote on several important zoning changes.

At a Special Town Meeting on Monday, Oct. 20, at 6 p.m.

at the Town Offices, voters will be asked to consider these items:

- New regulations for *short-term rentals (STRs)*
- Revisions to the town's accessory dwelling unit (ADU) zoning, updated to align with new state mandates
- A change allowing the Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) to have three associate members


In addition, the Special Town Meeting warrant has a new general town bylaw for the administration of STRs.


To help residents better understand the proposals, the Planning Board will host an **Informational Meeting** on **Tuesday, Oct. 14, at 7 p.m.** at the Town Offices.

Short-Term Rentals

STRs are a new use and growing trend, commonly known through platforms such as Airbnb, that have outpaced traditional zoning rules. State law defines an STR as any residential rental of a room, apartment, or house for a period of no more than 31 consecutive calendar days. Rentals longer than 31 days are not regulated as STRs.

The proposed regulations have two parts:

- 1. Zoning changes to allow STRs as an accessory use to a primary dwelling, with specific limits.
- 2. A **general town bylaw** establishing registration, fees, and administrative oversight. (Under the bylaw, all STRs must register with the town and pay an annual fee.)

Key aspects of the proposed zoning regulations:

- STRs may only be operated by owner-occupiers or long-term residents. Generally, the owner must live on the property for at least six months of the year. Exceptions allow long-term full-time residents to operate STRs by special permit on property where they do not reside.
- STRs are treated as accessory uses to one- or two-family homes. (Commercial uses such as weddings or business conferences are not permitted.)
- Rental limits:
 - Up to 80 days per year "by right."
 - o 81 to 120 days per year with a special permit.
 - o More than 120 days is prohibited.
- All STRs must comply with state building codes for "transient occupancy" that include health and safety requirements (e.g., inspections and confirmation of compliance). Note: These regulations are not part of zoning, but the proposed bylaw requires compliance with all applicable codes and laws. The building inspector will serve as the point of contact for building code requirements related to STRs.

An aim of the "owner-occupier" requirement is to prevent absentee landlords and corporations from acquiring multiple single-family homes for short-term rentals, thereby reducing the local housing supply.

A key consideration behind the proposed regulations is that, without the owner-occupancy requirement, a short-term rental effectively becomes a hotel business operating in a residential zoning district. An STR is comparable to a home-occupation business activity in that, with limits, the "business" use is allowed by right or by special permit. For both home occupations and STRs in residential districts, the accessory use must be limited and not unduly disturb neighbors.

Accessory Dwelling Units

West Stockbridge first adopted an ADU bylaw in 1992 that has become outdated. For example, the current bylaw does not permit detached ADUs.

In December 2024, a new state law was passed requiring all towns to allow ADUs up to 900 square feet *as of right*. This law took effect in February 2025. The Planning Board's proposed zoning changes will bring West Stockbridge into compliance.

Highlights of the proposal:

- ADUs up to 900 square feet are permitted by right in connection with one- and two-family homes.
- Larger ADUs may be allowed by special permit.
- ADUs may be rented as STRs if they meet STR requirements. (This was discussed at the public hearing held for ADU zoning changes, where the Planning Board decided to proceed with this aspect of the proposal to give individual property owners more flexibility in generating income from their properties. ADUs must remain as a use that is accessory to the principal residential use on the lot and cannot be sold separately.)

These changes aim to expand housing options while preserving the character of residential neighborhoods.

Zoning Board of Appeals

Over the past several years, the ZBA has faced a heavy workload, with multiple appeals and frequent recusals due to conflicts of interest. To ease this burden, a proposed zoning amendment would allow the board to appoint three associate members instead of the current two. This would provide more flexibility in filling seats when recusals occur.

Next Steps

The Planning Board encourages all residents to learn about the proposed changes and participate in the decision-making process. The proposed zoning amendments can be viewed in the Warrant for the Special Town Meeting, posted on the town's website at www. weststockbridge-ma.gov/sites/g/files/vyhlif4031/f/agendas/stm warrant 10-20-25.pdf.

suggests that the Board hire a new Highway Superintendent to fill Jamie's position. John Lyford has been temporarily promoted to foreman but does not wish to continue in this role. Curt requested that the Board allow him and Marie to get an ad posted and get started with the search and hiring process. Both Board members agree that this is a timely issue.

Curt informed the Board that Andy Potter had asked Curt to work with him to complete a T-Mobile grant application. This grant was to pay for electrical upgrades to the Town Hall gazebo. Curt was recently notified that the Town did not receive the grant. After this news, Curt said he would try to work out a plan to complete the upgrades at some point.

Town Charter Discussion: Kathleen Keresey

Kathleen requested that the Board skip over this agenda item. She stated it may be better if the Board waits and has Town Counsel attend a meeting to explain the process of creating a Town Charter and what the benefits would be for the Town. Andy agreed.

Housatonic Water Litigation Discussion:

Andy stated that Great Barrington has recently withdrawn its appeal against the Housatonic Water Company, allowing the Company to secure financial support to complete the required projects. Kathleen noted that the Board had previously decided to follow Great Barrington's lead regarding the Housatonic Water Company, as they have the most significant interest in the issue.

Andy made a motion, seconded by Kathleen,

I move that the town withdraw its appeal to the Single Justice of the Supreme Judicial Court in *Town of Great Barrington and Town of West Stockbridge v. Department of Public Utilities*; SJC Docket No. SJ-2024-0312).

All were in favor; the motion was approved.

Select Board Speak:

Kathleen noted that the Zucchini Festival was terrific this year. She thanked all of the volunteers and the Police for doing such a great job.

Andy also agreed that the Zucchini Fest was a great success and thanked everyone involved.

Andy motioned to adjourn, seconded by Kathleen, at 6:39 PM.

Select Board Meeting Minutes September 2, 2025

Kathleen stated she would like more time to review the meeting minutes and requested to move to approve at the next meeting. Andy agreed.

Citizen Speak:

Frank Landsberger suggested that the Board appoint a Citizen Committee to create a Town Charter. He also commented that the Board should be a five-member board and the Town should have a Town Manager who can have increased responsibilities.

Town Administrator Update

Marie stated the Planning Board intends to hold an informational session on October 14th to discuss the upcoming Special Town Meeting articles regarding Short-term Rentals and Accessory Dwelling units. The Board already has a scheduled meeting on that date; therefore, Marie asked them if they would approve moving the Select Board meeting to the following evening, October 15th. Kathleen and Andy agreed.

Library Update: Rachel Alter, Librarian

Rachel informed the Board that the Library business has been steady. They average approximately 100 people per month coming to the library. Some upcoming events involving the Library include the Farmers Market on October 2 and the Parks & Recreation Commissioners' Halloween party.

She stated that the Library currently offers Cyber Senior Assistance, where seniors can drop by the Library for free technical assistance during certain hours. Rachel secured five internet hotspots, which she will provide to five families at no cost for use in their homes for up to twelve months.

Rachel's primary concern is that the statewide funding may be cut for libraries, which could specifically imperil the e-books and streaming of audiobooks. The state has helped fund that cost for years, and without their assistance, the library may not be able to offer them. She hopes things will work out; however, she has been searching for additional funding just in case.

Police Department Update: Chief Nicole Miller

Chief requested that the Board appoint two new police officers to the Department. She introduced Dave Lupiani, a former West Stockbridge Police Officer. He had left due to scheduling issues; however, those issues are not a problem now, and she would like to have him back in West Stockbridge as a Part-Time officer. The second officer she requested to be appointed is Donald Rhodes. He is new to the area, currently in the process of moving here from Texas. He is closing on a house in mid-September and has already been trained and certified in Massachusetts. He requested to work the night shift and can start by the end of September as a Full-Time officer. She stated that both officers are extremely community-oriented and will be a great addition to the Department.

Andy made a motion, seconded by Kathleen, to appoint Dave Lupiani as a new Part-Time Officer and Donald Rhodes as a new Full-Time Officer.

Both were in favor, and the motion was approved.

Chief Miller then discussed the possibility of the Department having a Comfort Dog. She explained that the Manager at Crane Lake Camp, up the hill, contacted her and stated they would like to donate a puppy they had been fostering to the Town as a comfort dog. She went there and took the puppy home with her. She believes that this dog could be an excellent comfort dog for the Town. She would like to get it trained and be the handler. She would send the dog to Board and Train, where it would stay for 3-4 weeks to be trained. After that, she would also undergo training. The cost of this would be approximately \$3000-\$4000. The dog is current on her shots and is a very calm and sweet dog. Nicole also suggested the Town get health insurance for the dog.

The Board stated they would like Nicole to create a policy and procedure document to include all the responsibilities regarding the dog. The Board would also like to have input from Town Counsel, the employees working at Town Hall, and our Town insurance. Nicole agreed that this was all the information they needed before she would request the Board to vote on this issue. She will return to the Board with further details at a meeting for their approval.

Marie noted that the Town's Emergency Management Director, Lou Oggiani, had recently passed away. She stated he was an asset

Berkshire Nature Talk Series:

Slow Wood: Having Our Forest and Cutting It Too


Join us for a program on Friday, October 17, at 7 pm at the Old Town Hall, 9 Main Street, sponsored by the West Stockbridge Historical Society. Professor Brian Donahue presents a radical approach to healing the relationship between humans and forests through responsible, sustainable use of our local Berkshire woodlands.

Drawing from his acclaimed book *Slow Wood* and his personal experience building a timber-frame home using trees from his own land,

Professor Donahue will explore how we can address the modern housing crisis while protecting our region's diverse forests. Rather than relying on lumber from global extraction systems, he advocates for "worst first" forestry, a sustainable practice that allows us to have both healthy forests and the wood we need for building.

In this talk focused specifically on the Berkshires, Donahue will share stories of our local trees—sugar maple, black cherry, black birch, and hemlock—and examine how our region's history reflects the broader American story of our evolving relationship with forests. He'll discuss how the rise of industrial resource extraction broke the traditional bond between local communities and their woodlands, and present practical solutions for restoring a more sustainable approach to both forestry and building in our area.

This presentation offers both a blueprint and a stewardship plan for living more responsibly with the Commonwealth's woods, grounded in ecological wisdom and community values.





finished product. Her favorite subjects include brightly colored feathered or scaly beasts.

Pat Frik's small-scale fiber art derives from patterns and textures found in nature. She uses hand stitching to enhance and reinterpret imagery, sometimes in whimsical ways.

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

History Quiz Answer:

The early 1960s experienced underlying social changes that persisted throughout the next two decades and even later. Demographics were trending younger as the baby boomers reached their teen years. West Stockbridge saw that increase in numbers of young people like the rest of the country. For these teenagers, emphasis was shifting away from parental cultural values and their traditional view of the world. Partly it was reflected in music, dance, movies, and dress.

As part of regular youth activities, the American Legion Auxiliary sponsored "record hops" in the Village School gym. These dances were a new phenomenon. LPs and 45s became available and popular in the late 1950s, along with equipment to play them on, enabling affordable, portable, and loud enough music for dancing. The dancing was energetic, with rhythm and blues, rock 'n roll, and all kinds of new styles, definitely not the crooning music favored by the older generation.

In May 1962, a local minister preached against local record hops and the local decline of moral values and irresponsible secular conduct. He cited a dance in the Village School gym where some preteen children stayed up too late. Plus the parents didn't stay around at the dance to supervise. He claimed in his sermon that the adults in charge were not entirely sober and that these dances reflected a moral decline in the community and a failure of responsibility of the parents in his congregation. Following up on his first homily, the following week his sermon was titled "The Current Absence of Morals in Municipal Life in Massachusetts."

Apparently, West Stockbridge was going downhill. The music played at record hops was likely the popular "Twist" by Chubby Checker and the "Peppermint Twist" by Joey Dee & the Starliters. The play list for dances also included Little Eva's "The Loco-Motion" and "Twist and Shout" by the Isley Brothers. These were clearly signs of moral decline!

West Stockbridge responded in traditional fashion with a large emotionally charged meeting at the church. The consensus was that such preaching was beyond "legitimate ministerial areas," and it was also bad for local business. Our citizens didn't care to be lectured on their moral values. The minister served another year before moving on to a more traditional church in the state, and the dances continued for another year or two.




